Closing Position Statement

US position is that some forces are “unseen,” but still experienced. White population shift is one of those forces, and the position of US (after serious research and consideration) is that there is more to a modern civil war than meets the eye.

Losing our loved ones and people within our whole American community is disheartening. Our findings: Underground wars are political and extremist activism-related in many cases. Some of our experiences are “natural,” but much of the foreign and domestic “crime-wave movement” or “war” could be prevented with more awareness.
