Official Definition of the American Spirit

The American Spirit

By the Union of Saints, the **American Spirit** is defined as the spirit, soul, culture, family, nature, traditions, and heritage of the Native peoples, First Settlers, and the anthropological peoples of America, faithfully preserved and passed down through generations.

The American Spirit constitutes a sincerely held religious belief and religious practice. It is expressed through volunteerism, the preservation of heritage and culture, community-building, historical understanding, gratitude, service, stewardship, and love of neighbor. It calls individuals to honor those who came before them, strengthen the communities in which they live, preserve the nation's historical and cultural inheritance, and serve the American people with compassion, integrity, and respect.

The Union of Saints, its members, and members of the American community who embrace and practice the American Spirit exercise this sincerely held religious belief under the protections afforded by the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, including the Free Exercise Clause. The Union of Saints further asserts the protections provided by applicable federal, state, and local laws safeguarding religious belief, religious exercise, freedom of conscience, and freedom from unlawful religious discrimination.
