

Statement on Public Health Harm Associated With High Potency Pesticide Spraying in Florida

Residents of Florida are experiencing a public health crisis associated with the use of high potency pesticide sprays marketed as luxury products, including Permasease 4 4. These sprays are designed to kill insects and small animals and are capable of damaging healthy human cells through permeation and systemic exposure.

Women are five to eight times more likely to develop thyroid cancer. Communities such as Apopka Florida have suffered severe health consequences over time. Residents have died, and advocates have repeatedly raised concerns without meaningful response. At the same time, legislative actions have moved to restrict or eliminate the ability of individuals to bring lawsuits against pesticide manufacturers, silencing public accountability.

These products are produced by global enterprises, many manufactured in China, and financially benefit the same corporate structures that profit from chemotherapy pharmaceuticals vaccines and agricultural pesticides. This convergence of interests raises serious ethical and public health concerns that warrant scrutiny.

Historically, industrial pesticides have been used against human populations. Jewish communities were sprayed with industrial pesticides that attacked the heart and nervous system. While not classified as nerve agents, these chemicals caused systemic bodily failure. The historical name given was, "Gift-Gas," or Zyklon gas. This precedent demonstrates that pesticide chemicals are capable of mass human harm.

The cumulative burden on the human body is not theoretical. Vaccines pesticides chronic stress and chemical additives in food compound physiological strain and contribute to early onset illness and premature death. This pattern is reflected in population health data.

I support the current administration because it acknowledges these realities and acts in alignment with evidence based public health and national interest. The data does not lie.

I am currently undergoing medical evaluation, including a biopsy of skin lesions caused by exposure to this spray. I am actively addressing damage to my skin heart thyroid and lymphatic system.

The harm was not limited to my body. Porous household items absorbed the chemical despite not being directly sprayed. Proximity to these items caused neurological reactions including tremors and seizure activity. As a result, all porous belongings had to be discarded. I replaced everything, relocated to another state, and began a detoxification process to remove chemical burden from my body. I have also reduced environmental electromagnetic exposure to support neurological recovery.

This experience caused substantial economic loss. If one sought to conduct economic warfare against civilians, forced destruction of personal property through environmental contamination would be an effective method.

I am not an isolated case. Others report similar symptoms and are asking the same question; “Are they trying to kill us?”

If health autonomy is denied, the condition is slavery. If it is slavery, it is war. Environmental spray programs must end. American lives, clean air, bodily autonomy, and environmental liberty must be protected.

Hundreds of Birds Killed in Florida

April 30, 1999

Nearly 800 birds, primarily white pelicans, have died since pesticide-contaminated farmland was flooded in July 1998 to create a marsh near Lake Apopka in Florida. Experts fear the death toll may be even higher since thousands of migratory birds have fed at the wetland restoration project. State officials managing the lake, however, say they have no plans to monitor it for pesticides.
