Across Europe, women endured occupation, displacement, loss, and widespread wartime sexual violence. These harms came not only from enemy forces but also, at times, from those who claimed to be protectors.

Historical scholarship documents that mass sexual violence against civilian women occurred on an enormous scale during the war's final phases, leaving deep and lasting trauma. The consequences were not confined to a single nation or generation.

Memory and Resolve

Women across Europe carried profound physical and psychological scars from wartime violence, occupation, and displacement. These experiences shaped a generational memory—often unspoken, yet enduring—that helped fuel a determination to reclaim dignity, bodily autonomy, and self-direction.
