

Furniture Contamination– Fipronil (Reproductive Health Killer, Men and Women)

Foam is one of the hardest materials to decontaminate reliably because it is highly porous. If a liquid pesticide actually contacted or soaked into foam, cleaning the surface does **not necessarily mean the pesticide has been removed from inside it**. NPIC specifically notes that porous materials can carry contamination deeper into the material and that sometimes they need to be discarded rather than cleaned. ([National Pesticide Information Center](#))

For **fipronil/Termidor in particular**, I would distinguish between *possible environmental exposure* and *known direct contamination*. If the foam was simply inside your apartment while Termidor was applied outdoors, that does **not automatically mean the foam is contaminated**. If spray, runoff, contaminated shoes/hands, or another direct pathway contacted it, the concern is greater.

Important Note: *It is important to note that even a small drop can be fatal to breathe.*

For removable foam such as a **mattress topper, couch cushion insert, memory foam pillow, packing foam, or mattress foam**, I would not saturate it with bleach, alcohol, vinegar, solvents, or another chemical in an attempt to neutralize fipronil. There isn't a standard household procedure proven to decontaminate pesticide-contaminated porous materials, and adding solvents can potentially move residues farther into the material. NPIC specifically says there are **no standard cleaning rules** for unwanted pesticide residues in building materials. ([National Pesticide Information Center](#))
