

The Holocaust and World War II: Victim Numbers Overview

1) Holocaust Victims (Targeted Genocide)

The Holocaust refers specifically to the systematic persecution and mass murder carried out by Nazi Germany under Adolf Hitler during World War II.

Total Holocaust Victims

- **Approximately 11 to 12 million people**

Jewish Victims (Primary Target)

- **Approximately 6 million Jews were killed**

Jews were the central focus of Nazi ideology and the only group targeted as an enemy for complete annihilation across all Nazi-controlled territories.

Non-Jewish Victims (Estimated 5 to 6 Million)

- **Soviet civilians and prisoners of war:** ~2 to 3 million
- **Non-Jewish Polish civilians:** ~1.8 to 2 million
- **Romani people (Roma and Sinti):** ~220,000 to 500,000
- **Disabled individuals:** ~200,000 to 250,000
- **Political opponents:** tens of thousands
- **LGBTQ+ individuals:** ~5,000 to 15,000
- **Jehovah's Witnesses:** ~1,000 to 2,000
- **Other victims:** including resistance members, clergy, and civilians targeted in occupied territories

2) Additional Victims of World War II (Not Classified as Holocaust Victims)

These groups are part of the broader human cost of the war but are not typically included in Holocaust-specific totals.

German Civilian Deaths

- **Approximately 1.5 to 2.5 million civilians**
- Causes include aerial bombing, ground combat, displacement, and starvation

- Example: Bombing of Dresden

United States Military Deaths

- **Approximately 416,800 deaths**
- Occurred in both European and Pacific theaters
- Example: D-Day

Other Major World War II Losses (Approximate Totals)

- **Soviet Union:** ~24 to 27 million (military and civilian)
- **China:** ~15 to 20 million
- **Poland (total):** ~5 to 6 million (including ~3 million Jewish victims)
- **Japan:** ~2.5 to 3 million
- **United Kingdom:** ~450,000
- **France:** ~600,000

Key Distinction

- **Holocaust:** A targeted, state-organized genocide (\approx 11 to 12 million victims)
- **World War II Total Deaths:** A global conflict resulting in **approximately 70 to 85 million deaths**
