

Support for Financial Regulations Governing Foreign-Supporting Nonprofits and Churches

To whom it may concern,

We apologize to these communities, and we were once humbled to provide economic support. The truth is, however, that it took everything Americans had to figure out what went wrong during the pandemic and afterward. Today, we look around and wonder what happened to our citizens and why the demographic landscape appears so altered. This is the truth as we see it. Whether people are able or ready to face this truth is not up to us. However, the reality aligns with the evidence, and even the available evidence does not capture the full scope of the situation. We lack many elements of the data needed because our systems are already exhausted and overwhelmed.

America is still a young country, and yet the pressure and force that, have harmed Native Americans, particularly White Native Americans, through the actions of foreigners have been so significant that we have debated the appropriate term to describe it. Overall, we have arrived at our findings, and along with these findings comes both a sense of peace and a sense of terror. To us, it resembles politics mirroring a Cold War. Sadly, because it is solely race-supporting while also race-degrading, there is no way around it. It places Americans in danger. Its sole purpose is power, and it has functioned as nation-building within our own nation rather than healthy and amicable assimilation.

While many Americans are incredibly giving by nature, donating to charities, helping friends of all races, supporting nonprofits, and providing assistance wherever they can, there is no doubt that many Americans have been misled and led astray. Where they are targeted, they should not give. It has become clear to us that mass immigration has been used as a form of instrumentalization and as a weapon, one that is dismissed by foreign and left groups over and over again. This gaslighting and blame-shifting are, yet another tactic of the greater conflict. Americans must now weed through thousands of articles of propaganda that lead us astray and alter the cultural fabric of our home, our heritage, our culture, and everything we hold dear.

All that we love has been placed at risk because it has been placed in the hands of foreigners and newcomers whose goals and aims are not fully aligned with U.S. interests, but rather with the interests of their own cultures, as we understand now, foreign federations. Many of these coalitions have actively targeted U.S. citizens, including public servants, ICE agents, Border Patrol agents, public officials, and private citizens. The results have been deadly, have contributed to widespread tragedies intertwined with politics, and have cost Americans billions upon billions of dollars. The harm caused to Americans is incalculable.

Where 60% of Hispanics themselves, know an undocumented immigrant, the evidence, becomes more clear. Furthermore, where some individuals within the Hispanic community claim that American territory belongs to Mexico, the position of those individuals also becomes more easily understood. They are assisted by what we are now calling the modern "Jewish Bund," as well as others who aim to "curve the arc" or challenge what they

refer to as "White supremacy." What we understand simply as our home, our people, and our culture, a people who, by my own ancestry, have been historically repressed, marginalized, and far outnumbered by the global population and the U.S. Hispanic population.

Financially, for the most part, local Native Americans have never seen numbers as great as 121 million. Yet this amount and more are afforded to Hispanic and immigrant communities through the Hispanic Federation alone. Americans are only now becoming aware of these privileges.

Race discrimination has never appeared more evident to us than today, in the issues between the Hispanic population and the White population, even when many people did not realize those experiences existed, they have "ballooned." Predominantly, one group is denied recognition of its humanity and victimhood, while the other is consistently recognized within human rights spaces and political discussions, even when one is victimized by the other. Of course, this reality is shared, as both Hispanics and Whites can experience hatred and hostility from members of the other group. This experience is influenced by historical demographics within the United States, racial pressures, and modern demographic changes.

Whites struggle, with the repression of their voices, while also witnessing extreme and rapid population shifts in which populations that were once over 90% in many regions and states have been dramatically reduced, in some places by half or more. Even census data struggles to keep pace with these changes. Some Americans are still unaware of what happened. Some losses were due to disease, some to suicide, still, politics and political movements have also played a major role.

Territorial and demographic shifts of this magnitude are not typically celebrated by local and native populations. More often, the opposite is true. Yet Americans navigate these experiences cautiously, while other groups celebrate rapid demographic changes. The facts, as we interpret them, remain that one side experiences sorrow and dissonance while feeling disadvantaged within social rights spaces, while the other celebrates social, political, monetary, and immigration-related victories. The scales are uneven.

Many Americans may have previously voted to financially support minority populations. However, if they themselves feel attacked and are actively being forced into minority status through relentless attacks, cruelty, and harm, this opinion often changes. My opinion has changed. After a lifetime of voting Democratic and, frankly, enduring a myriad of abuses, including stalking, doxxing, verbal assaults, and other forms of harassment, I believe reforming monetary conditions that exploit the American people and abuse them in order to support foreign populations is the right and just decision. It is unfair for Americans to experience human rights abuses while also being expected to finance them.

For these reasons, I support the newly proposed regulations regarding federal financial assistance. I believe America should either end race-based PACs and nonprofits or establish greater protections and sovereignty for Native American people. Specifically those who are relentlessly targeted by what the left is calling "New America," and the modern Spanish Empire of New Americans, which have made its views toward US citizens clear. Americans

have been degraded and dehumanized, replaced and race targeted, even while compassionately sharing territory that our families have called home for more than five centuries.

In Summary

We miss our people and our home. Our goal has never been to replace our people with foreign groups, and certainly not with ones that relentlessly attack and terrorize us. The cadence has been like the air we breathe, except instead of air, we breathe the copper of American blood. The opinions we hold today are like the caskets we carry, the burden is too heavy. Too many lives have been lost. A foreign flag was raised, and so now we raise ours. America is ours. It is our life, our home, and our people. It is not here to support the creation of foreign cultures or those who are willing to steal from us.

We urge the Office of Management and Budget to ensure that the federal budget is administered in a manner that safeguards the American people. American safety and security must never again be compromised. The time to act is now.
