

“Racism Is Racism”

The problem with some forms of “global” and “minority” activism is that they treat Whites as a single category to overcome.

Whites are people. We are not one category. We are individuals with different histories, cultures, beliefs, and communities. The American melting pot worked because people supported one another while building a shared national culture.

Today many Whites feel they are being pushed into artificial subcategories. This destabilizes the unity that the melting pot once represented. Many feel pressure to change their culture or identity in order to fit a new social or political expectation.

People are not comfortable with intimidation or pressure that tells them they must become something different. We value the culture and traditions we grew up with and we want the freedom to preserve them.

Because of this, some Whites are beginning to focus more on supporting their own communities instead of investing in the new definition of “melting pot” that now pressures American life. Many feel they are being left with little choice when they experience cultural, social, or economic marginalization.

Concerns about rapid demographic change and mass migration have intensified these fears. Many people see large population shifts happening within their lifetime and feel that their communities are being reshaped without their consent: **force, fraud, coercion.**

We are not comfortable with forced mass migration and we view it as a serious injustice against our nation and communities.

Minorities supporting minorities is understandable. Communities often support their own. However, when political systems or institutions support some groups while excluding or disregarding Whites, that is discrimination. When access to opportunity or economic support is shaped by politics or identity, it becomes economic warfare and a form of social control, even *economic slavery*.

A stable society must recognize the rights of all people. No group should be reduced to a stereotype or treated as an obstacle to overcome. A nation remains healthy when its people are respected, its communities are protected, and its culture is allowed to exist without coercion.
