The tactics used by Facebook, while concerning, may not always be considered "psychological warfare" in a traditional military sense. - “Riot Aliens” (LA 2,200 people arrested on 4 June, 2025) Over 1,000 deportations resulted from the Los Angeles riots of 1992. Government agencies like the LAPD and the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) coordinated to target and deport undocumented immigrants during the unrest, referring to them as “riot aliens”. The Webster Commission papers reveal that 86% of the over 1,200 “riot aliens” received by the INS from the LA County Jail, LAPD, and other law enforcement agencies were ultimately deported. These deportations included people who were indiscriminately targeted, including everyday residents going about their lives, resulting in more than a thousand expulsions from the city. It is important to note that these actions occurred in the spring and early summer of 1992 and were implemented with limited public attention due to the other pressing issues of the time.

Lack of Enforcement: Insufficient oversight and enforcement of H-1B1 regulations can allow employers to engage in fraudulent practices with little consequence. Specific examples and concerns: Wage Theft: Some companies may misclassify workers or not pay them the prevailing wage, leading to wage theft, as highlighted by the Economic Policy Institute. Job Displacement: The H-1B1 program has been criticized for facilitating the displacement of qualified American workers, particularly in the tech industry.
