

Statement of Damages and Demand for Lawful Reparations

Following the completion of my case studies, initiated in 2019, I formally set forth the damages for which I seek lawful redress.

Information campaigns directed against Americans, together with the enabling of hostile, lawless, and foreign-aligned guerrilla-style assemblies, have caused measurable and sustained harm to the American people. This era must end. Harassment must be held accountable. Laws broken against Americans must be repaired and enforced, and civic order must be restored.

I seek reparations through lawful and constitutional means for the damages inflicted upon Americans by hostile and foreign-aligned political, corporate, and institutional actors that have failed in their duty to protect the people, uphold the rule of law, and safeguard civic order.

Categories of Harm and Accountability (1–20)

1. Slavery, Human Trafficking, and Forced Exploitation

All actors involved in slavery, human trafficking, forced labor, or sexual exploitation must be held accountable, and victims must receive reparations from their perpetrators, including those who knowingly aided, abetted, facilitated, concealed, or profited from such systems.

2. Pornography and Trafficking-Enabled Industries

Corporations and entities that knowingly profited from or facilitated exploitation, coercion, or trafficking through pornographic production or distribution must be held accountable and required to pay reparations for the resulting harm.

3. Hospitality, Transportation, and Logistics Accountability

Hotel franchises, trucking companies, shipping firms, and transportation corporations that enabled, ignored, concealed, or failed to prevent trafficking, forced labor, illegal hiring, or exploitation within their operations or supply chains must be held accountable and required to pay reparations.

4. Corporate Labor Violations and Worker Displacement

Corporations that knowingly hired illegal immigrants over, or in preference to, qualified American workers—thereby violating employment law, suppressing wages, displacing lawful labor, or evading regulatory obligations—must be held accountable and required to pay reparations for the economic and civic harm inflicted upon Americans.

5. Border Facilitation and Unlawful Activity Harms

All parties that aided, financed, encouraged, or shielded unlawful border activity or illegal conduct resulting in harm to Americans—including increased exploitation, crime, or labor degradation—must be held accountable and required to pay reparations.

6. Animal Trafficking and Extreme Cruelty

Any individual, organization, or corporation that engaged in, facilitated, profited from, or willfully ignored animal trafficking or the infliction of cruel suffering through torture, abuse, or inhumane treatment must be held accountable and required to pay reparations for societal and moral injury.

7. State Abuse of Prisoners

All state actors who, under color of law, inflicted unlawful harm upon prisoners—including physical abuse, psychological torture, medical neglect, inhumane conditions, or violations of due process—must be held accountable and required to pay reparations.

8. Sabotage of Career, Livelihood, and Personal Reputation

All foreign and domestic actors that deliberately sabotaged careers, livelihoods, or personal reputations through defamation, blacklisting, coordinated harassment, false allegations, information warfare, or abuse of institutional power must be held accountable and required to pay reparations.

9. Information Warfare and Psychological Harm

Actors who conducted or coordinated information warfare, psychological operations, coercive propaganda, or harassment campaigns designed to intimidate, silence, destabilize, or economically harm Americans must be held accountable for non-kinetic harm inflicted upon civil society.

10. Financial, Institutional, and Platform Enablement

Financial institutions, payment processors, platforms, insurers, donors, intermediaries, and regulatory actors that knowingly financed, laundered, insured, concealed, monetized, or otherwise enabled the harms described herein—through action or willful negligence—must be held accountable and required to pay reparations.

11. Fraud Against the American People

All individuals, corporations, nonprofits, political organizations, or state-linked entities that committed fraud against the American people—including financial fraud, benefits fraud, charity fraud, academic fraud, data manipulation, or systemic deception—must be held accountable and required to pay reparations.

12. Medical Negligence and Abuse of Public Health Authority

All actors who committed medical negligence, malpractice, coercive medical practices, falsification of medical data, denial of informed consent, or abuse of public health authority—resulting in injury, disability, death, or psychological harm—must be held accountable and required to pay reparations.

13. Civil Rights Violations and Discriminatory Enforcement

All actors who violated civil rights through discriminatory enforcement, denial of equal protection, selective prosecution, or unequal access to education, employment, housing, or public services must be held accountable and required to pay reparations.

14. Education System Harm and Academic Sabotage

Institutions and actors that degraded educational standards, misused public funds, imposed ideological coercion, falsified outcomes, or deliberately disadvantaged American students through discriminatory or corrupt practices must be held accountable and required to pay reparations.

15. Environmental Harm, Pesticide Exposure, and Public Health Endangerment

Corporations, agricultural operators, or state actors that knowingly polluted land, water, or air; misused or concealed the dangers of pesticides, herbicides, or chemical agents; or exposed communities, workers, or children to toxic substances resulting in illness, neurological

damage, infertility, cancer, or ecological destruction must be held accountable and required to pay reparations.

16. Housing, Zoning, and Community Displacement Abuses

All parties that engaged in unlawful zoning practices, housing discrimination, land seizure, fraudulent development, or policies that displaced Americans from their communities through corruption or coercion must be held accountable and required to pay reparations.

17. Surveillance Abuse and Privacy Violations

Actors who unlawfully surveilled, tracked, databased, censored, or digitally profiled Americans—through government overreach, corporate data exploitation, or foreign-aligned intelligence practices—must be held accountable for violations of privacy, civil liberty, and personal security.

18. Targeting, Harassment, or Endangerment of Federal Officers

All individuals, organizations, or foreign or domestic actors that targeted, harassed, obstructed, threatened, doxxed, incited violence against, or otherwise endangered federal officers in the lawful execution of their duties must be held accountable and required to pay reparations.

19. Judicial, Prosecutorial, and Administrative Misconduct

Judges, prosecutors, regulators, or administrative bodies that engaged in corruption, malicious prosecution, evidence suppression, procedural abuse, or denial of fair process must be held accountable and required to provide reparations for institutional harm.

20. Cultural Erasure, Historical Falsification, and National Destabilization

Actors who deliberately erased, falsified, or weaponized American history, culture, language, or national identity—through propaganda, institutional coercion, or hostile influence operations—must be held accountable for long-term civic and societal harm and required to pay reparations.

Conclusion

These reparations are sought as lawful remedy for documented harm, systemic failure, violations of public trust, and the erosion of civic order. Accountability is necessary to repair damage done to the American people, restore justice, protect human dignity, and reestablish lawful governance and civil stability.
