

American Culture vs.

American culture surpasses all other cultures, and yet it is one of the most **attacked** cultures. I like American culture more than I like Mexican culture. Why? Because one supports diversity, while the other primarily supports vegans. I like American culture more than I like Republican culture. I also like American culture more than I like Democratic culture.

I like my culture. However, I believe it is important to understand that, as it currently stands, my culture is being framed, protested, constantly violated, harmed, and attacked. Civilians who identify with American culture are targeted by these other cultures. Therefore, I feel that the choice is quite clear.

If Americans are afraid of these other cultures because they are being attacked by them, then these are not cultures at all, they are **violent fronts**.

What Is a Terrorist Organization?

*A **terrorist organization** is a structured group that uses or threatens violence against civilians or non-combatants to achieve political, ideological, religious, or social objectives. The purpose of such violence is typically to create fear beyond the immediate victims in order to influence governments, institutions, or broader populations.*

Whether a group is officially labeled a “terrorist organization” depends on legal designation by governmental authorities. Legal designation often triggers criminal penalties, sanctions, travel restrictions, and asset freezes.

Have you felt fear? ← Y/N?

I answer this question truthfully, have I felt fear? **Yes**. I am afraid of genocide, eugenics and hostile sabotage, “values,” these movements seem to instill. I am afraid of what their hostile actors are capable of. As we have witnessed, these movements, whether synchronized or asymmetrical, are not only violent, they are murderous. *I do have fear.*

I do feel intimidated, I do feel coerced, and I do feel forced. I feel subjugated, suppressed, silenced and harmed, also, by these “activist” movements. I also felt enslaved. And so.

Common Terms

- **Terrorist Organization**

The most formal and widely used legal term. Refers to a group officially designated by a government as engaging in terrorism.

- **Terrorist Group**

A neutral descriptive term for a group that engages in terrorist acts, whether formally designated or not.

- **Extremist Group**

A broader term describing a group that holds radical ideological views outside mainstream norms. Not all extremist groups engage in violence.

- **Militant Group**

A group that uses or advocates force to advance a cause. Militant groups may target military or governmental actors and are not automatically classified as terrorist organizations.

- **Insurgent Group**

An organized movement that seeks to challenge or overthrow a government, often through armed conflict. Insurgency can overlap with terrorism depending on tactics and targets.

- **Cell**

A small, secretive operational unit within a larger organization. Cells often function semi-independently to limit exposure of the broader network.

- **Network**

A decentralized system of individuals or semi-autonomous groups connected through shared goals rather than rigid hierarchy.

Groups and Concepts

- **Black Hebrew Israelites (Black Israelites)**

Black Hebrew Israelite supremacist group who are a part of a religious movement whose members believe that African Americans (and sometimes other groups) are descendants of the ancient Israelites.

• **Underground Confederacies**

Secretive alliances or covert networks operating outside public institutions.

These may include:

- *Hidden political or religious alliances*
- *Covert coordination between actors*
- *Informal conspiratorial structures*

Supports violence intended to intimidate or coerce civilians or governments for political or ideological ends.

Examples

Extremism is the most harmful culture of all. At the very least, American culture has a place for everyone. American culture has *ground rules*. In contrast, other cultures often support one group while harming another. Not only do these other cultures harm those outside their group, but they also target the most beautiful and diverse culture of all. They target the people who genuinely love, embrace, and honor their American culture, as if those Americans are obstacles to overcome, people to subjugate, suppress, or reign supreme over.

→ **Americans are being targeted by these extremist groups.**

So, if I am asked whether I support these activist movements and their cultures, quite frankly, the answer is **n-o**. I do not support what is called “multiculturalism” or their idea of “diversity,” because, in my view, it is not true diversity. Instead, it resembles blind faith or blind culture, hostility is normalized, and they harm everyday Americans. **Hostility is normalized.**

In American culture, the goal is peace. By its people, by its government. We are the most welcoming, diverse and kind culture of all, hence why we are so diverse. But extremism cannot replace our humanity.

As some of these groups burn the American flag, may we hoist it higher. The American spirit, no matter how much others aim to invert, twist, or break it, remains one of the strongest spirits of all.

And I want to be clear here, Americans are not an activism or political movement, we are a country, a territory, a people, a spirit. We do come with military, at times bearing arms. Americans have every right to stand their ground and protect themselves; This **right** is imprinted in our spirits, and it lives in the constitution: 2nd!

Activists, are you sure you want to continue your hostilities towards Americans? Is this really the path you are choosing to take? Did you get lost out there? Bring it home, please. Before you or someone else gets hurt. It is not worth it.

I support Americans, the American spirit and the American culture.
I also support our right to defend.

U.S. states with Stand Your Ground laws (laws that remove the duty to retreat before using force in self-defense when you are lawfully present).

What “Stand Your Ground” Means

A Stand Your Ground (SYG) law generally allows a person to use force (including deadly force, under certain conditions) without a duty to retreat if they reasonably believe it is necessary to prevent death, serious bodily harm, or sometimes certain felonies.

This differs from “duty to retreat” states, where a person must attempt to safely withdraw before using deadly force (if retreat is possible).

Important Note: Castle Doctrine

All states recognize some version of the Castle Doctrine, which removes the duty to retreat inside your home.

Stand Your Ground expands this principle to public places where you are lawfully present.
