

Understanding Historical and Modern Population Terms

Union of Saints

These terms describe different peoples, historical developments, legal concepts, political positions, and patterns of settlement. They are not interchangeable because each has its own historical, cultural, legal, or political meaning. Understanding these distinctions helps create clearer discussions about history, identity, immigration, and public policy.

Indigenous Peoples

The original peoples of a land whose histories, cultures, languages, and communities existed long before European settlement and the formation of modern nation states. Indigenous peoples maintain distinct identities that continue to the present day.

Acadians (Early Settler Society)

A distinct early settler society that developed in Acadia beginning in the early 1400s-1500s. Acadian identity emerged through French settlement and longstanding relationships with the Mi'kmaq, creating a unique people with their own language, customs, traditions, and culture. Although Acadia began as a French settlement, the Acadians gradually developed into a people separate from France, placing greater importance on their own communities, neutrality, local autonomy, and shared Acadian identity than on the interests of competing colonial empires.

Historical Colonials

Individuals or populations who established, governed, or expanded colonies on behalf of a colonial power. The defining characteristic of colonial societies was their relationship to an imperial government and the expansion or administration of colonial territory. While some colonial settlements later developed their own identities, the term "colonial" primarily refers to participation in a colonial system of governance.

Immigrants

Individuals who move from one country to another with the intention of living there permanently or for an extended period. Immigration has occurred throughout history for reasons including family reunification, employment, education, religious freedom, humanitarian protection, and economic opportunity. Immigration may occur through a variety of legal pathways depending on the laws of the receiving nation.

Modern Immigrants

Individuals who immigrate under contemporary immigration systems and policies. Modern immigration reflects today's legal foundations, international agreements, labor markets, refugee programs, humanitarian protections, and national immigration laws.

Mass Migration

The movement of a large number of people into or out of a region over a relatively short period of time. The term describes the scale of migration rather than the legal status, nationality, or motivations of those involved.

Proponents of Mass Migration

Individuals, organizations, advocacy groups, or policymakers who support policies that encourage or expand higher levels of migration or immigration. Their reasons may include humanitarian concerns, labor needs, economic development, demographic changes, international cooperation, or political philosophy.

Political Negligence

A criticism that elected officials or government institutions failed to adequately carry out their responsibilities, resulting in preventable harm, ineffective governance, or inadequate public administration. Whether political negligence has occurred depends upon the specific facts, applicable law, and public evaluation.

Globalists

A political term generally used to describe individuals who support larger international movement, multinational institutions, global trade, and increased political or economic integration among nations. Because the term is used in different ways by different speakers, it is helpful to define its intended meaning within any discussion.

Modern Colonialism

A term commonly used to describe contemporary forms of political, economic, cultural, or demographic influence that resemble aspects of historical colonialism. The concept is applied differently by historians, political scientists, and commentators depending on the circumstances being discussed.

Invasion

Historically and legally, an invasion generally refers to the entry of an armed military force into another nation's territory through the use or threat of force. In political and policy discussions,

some speakers also use the term to describe rapid population movements, large scale unauthorized border crossings, or the establishment of organized groups operating within another country's territory. Others reserve the term exclusively for military conflict. Because the word has both legal and rhetorical uses, the intended definition should be clearly identified within any discussion.
