

White Suicide & Biased International Race Based Reporting

Research indicates that suicide rates among white young women ages 15 to 24 have risen significantly, increasing by 87 percent between 1999 and 2017, with an additional rise of approximately 3 percent following the pandemic.

White males represent the highest risk group, accounting for roughly 70 percent of all suicides in the United States. The highest rates are observed among individuals living in rural areas, veterans, and those over the age of 65.

Bias in race based reporting continues to be a concern. While it is essential to care for all individuals experiencing depression or suicidal thoughts, the language used in public discussion often reflects race polarization. There is a growing perception that the experiences of white individuals are minimized or insufficiently addressed within broader narratives, creating a sense that these issues are overlooked in political and social discourse.
