

# Iran Strikes U.S. — Over \$800 Million in Damages

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## AI Overview

In March 2026, Iranian forces launched attacks against U.S. military interests in the Middle East, striking communication infrastructure and targeting facilities in Bahrain, Kuwait, and Qatar. 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## Confirmed Timeline of Events

### Main Wave — U.S. Bases in Gulf Region

- **February 28, 2026** → Start of large-scale Iranian retaliatory strikes on:
  - Bahrain
  - Kuwait
  - Qatar

- This marks the core event tied to direct U.S. military targets.
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## Follow-on Escalation — Early March 2026

### Kuwait

- **March 1, 2026** → U.S. troops killed in drone strike
- **March 2, 2026** → Continued attacks and air incidents

### Qatar

- **March 2–4, 2026** → Missile waves and strike on Al Udeid Air Base
- **March 3, 2026** → Missile confirmed hitting U.S. base
- **March 18, 2026** → Major strike on gas infrastructure

### Bahrain

- **March 9, 2026** → Major drone incident resulting in civilian injuries
  - **March 12, 2026** → Additional strike on fuel and storage facility
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## Saudi / Regional Energy Infrastructure (Separate but Related Phase)

- **March 18–20, 2026 (approx.)** → Iran targets oil and gas infrastructure across the Gulf, including Saudi Arabia, as reported by Reuters

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## Big Picture Timeline

- **February 28** → Initial retaliation, U.S. bases hit
  - **March 1–4** → Heavy follow-up strikes, casualties, and base impacts
  - **March 9–12** → Continued drone and infrastructure attacks
  - **March 18 and onward** → Shift toward energy and economic targets across the region
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## Bottom Line

- The U.S. base strikes and Saudi-related strikes are part of the same conflict timeline.
  - However, they occur in distinct phases:
    - **Phase 1:** Direct military retaliation (February 28 through early March)
    - **Phase 2:** Broader regional and economic warfare (mid-March onward)
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# Costs

Category	Estimated Amount
Direct Iranian damage to U.S. (bases, systems)	~\$800 million
Total U.S. war cost (so far)	\$18+ billion
Projected long-term cost	Could reach \$100B+ to \$1T

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## Key Insight

- Iranian attacks are asymmetric and low-cost (e.g., drones)
- The U.S. response is extremely high-cost

### Example:

- Iranian drone: ~\$50,000
- U.S. interceptor missile: \$4M–\$12M each

👉 Iranian strikes trigger massive U.S. spending

- \$800 million = confirmed damage from Iranian strikes
  - \$18+ billion = actual cost to the United States so far
  - The financial burden is driven far more by U.S. response than Iranian damage
