

Legislative Proposal

The North American and New England Ancestral Continuity and Community Protection Act (AACCPA) **To Protect The American Spirit**

Purpose

To recognize, preserve, and protect the cultural, historical, and community continuity of Americans whose ancestry demonstrates long-term presence in North America and the United States, defined through anthropological and genealogical continuity of approximately **200–400 years**, while upholding the constitutional rights of all citizens and maintaining national unity, community stability, lawful governance, and public safety.

Findings

Congress finds that:

1. Many American families and communities have maintained continuous presence in North America and the United States for multiple centuries.
2. Anthropological continuity of approximately **200–400 years** represents sustained generational roots, cultural adaptation, and community participation within the nation.
3. Preservation of long-standing community heritage strengthens social stability, historical knowledge, and national resilience.
4. Recognition of ancestral continuity supports lawful community organization, responsible land stewardship, and intergenerational continuity.
5. Protection of historically rooted communities contributes to public safety, economic development, and national cohesion.

Definitions

Anthropological Continuity

Documented generational presence of individuals, families, or communities within North America or the United States spanning approximately **200–400 years**, demonstrated through historical, genealogical, cultural, community, or institutional records.

Ancestral American Community

A voluntary association of United States citizens sharing documented historical continuity, cultural practices, or lineage within North America or the United States across multiple generations.

Community Sovereignty

The lawful authority of a community to organize its cultural, social, educational, and institutional affairs consistent with the Constitution and laws of the United States.

Eligibility for Recognition

A community seeking recognition under this Act shall demonstrate:

- Evidence of ancestral continuity spanning approximately **200–400 years**
- Documented historical presence through records such as census data, land or residency records, church or community registries, military or community service documentation, immigration or settlement records, or genealogical archives
- Organized community identity or shared heritage
- Lawful governance or leadership structure
- Ongoing participation in community life
- Compliance with federal, state, and local law

Rights and Protections

Recognized communities shall have the right to:

1. Preserve and transmit ancestral heritage and historical records
2. Establish lawful community governance and leadership bodies
3. Maintain genealogical and cultural archives
4. Acquire, own, and manage property for lawful community purposes
5. Operate cultural, educational, and historical institutions
6. Receive protection from discrimination, exploitation, displacement, or unlawful interference
7. Participate fully in civic, economic, and public life

Community Land Boundaries and Territorial Stewardship

Recognized communities may establish defined geographic boundaries for the purpose of cultural preservation, community organization, and responsible land stewardship.

Community boundaries may include:

- Community-owned land
- Historically significant settlement areas
- Cultural or heritage districts
- Designated community development zones
- Rural or urban community territories

Community boundaries shall:

1. Be documented through legal land records, surveys, or municipal designation
2. Be registered with appropriate state or federal authorities
3. Remain subject to the Constitution and laws of the United States
4. Support lawful governance, public safety, and responsible land management
5. Not constitute independent national territory or state-level sovereignty

Community Protection, Security, and Emergency Defense

Recognized communities shall have the right to lawful protection and coordinated security measures to preserve safety, continuity, and stability during times of threat, emergency, or national crisis.

Protection may include:

- Preparedness and response planning for invasion, terrorism, civil unrest, or natural disaster
- Protection of community members, property, infrastructure, and cultural institutions
- Cooperation with law enforcement, emergency management, and public safety agencies
- Reporting and prevention of criminal activity, organized harm, or threats to community stability
- Protection from unlawful violence, exploitation, trafficking, or coordinated disruption

Communities may take reasonable and lawful measures to safeguard residents from individuals or groups who engage in harmful or criminal activities, regardless of origin or status.

All protective actions shall comply with the Constitution and laws of the United States.

Federal Administration

This Act establishes the:

Office of North American Ancestral Continuity (ONAAC)

The Office shall:

- Maintain a voluntary national registry of qualifying communities
- Provide guidance on documentation and heritage preservation
- Support historical research and archival development
- Coordinate community safety and civil protections
- Facilitate partnerships with state, tribal, and local governments

- Promote responsible stewardship of cultural and historical resources

Safeguards

Nothing in this Act shall:

- Grant territorial sovereignty over states or federal lands
- Create separate citizenship status
- Override the Constitution or civil rights protections
- Limit the rights of any individual or community
- Authorize secession or independent national authority
- Establish paramilitary or unlawful governing structures

Expected Outcomes

- Protection of long-standing American communities
- Preservation of multi-generational heritage and historical records
- Strengthened civic participation and community stability
- Improved historical documentation and national memory
- Enhanced intergenerational continuity and cultural resilience
- Increased cooperation between communities and government institutions

Effective Date:

This Act shall take effect immediately after enactment by Congress.
