I know many of us like to take trips to the beautiful and touristy city of Gatlinburg. I remember the trips I would take there with my family. We would take a route with lots of tunnels! I loved it! At each one, my sister and I would usually draw a deep breath the second before we entered the tunnel, and would hold it until we exited the other side.

The short tunnels were easy to make, but some of those tunnels were really long and that little light at the end of the tunnel would slowly get bigger. One tunnel we took had a curve and did not even offer a glimmer of light until halfway through. Knowing this, I accepted the challenge and took a deep breath.

And I held it.

And held it.

And held it. “Where is this light??” I asked myself.

It was too dark to see, but I am sure my face was getting red. I was getting desperate for that little light to grow, letting me know that I was getting closer to the end of the tunnel so I would be able to breathe again. Finally, a small light appeared.

“OH, FINALLY! There it is! There’s the light!” I became so encouraged (and a little impatient!) as the light grew bigger and bigger! “I’ll be able to breathe again in just a minute!” What a relief when we emerged from the tunnel in full daylight! The new oxygen in my lungs was invigorating.

Of course, that was just a game. There is greater depth to the phrase “light at the end of the tunnel”. It is an idiom that we have used since the 1880s to indicate hope and the possibility of success after a difficult experience.

This pandemic has been a difficult experience. Are you seeing a light at the end of the tunnel yet? I hope you do. It may be small; it may look faint, but it is there. We have had months of masks, staying at home, and social distancing.

I know we are all ready to come back into the sanctuary to see each other! It will take time for us all to get vaccinated, but we are on our way! It may be difficult waiting in these winter months. We may feel more isolated and lonelier than we would during the summer. We miss seeing our friends and family, freely moving about, giving hugs and handshakes. We miss seeing people and being out in public together.

In these winter months, know that we are together. We are not alone. We are getting through this together and God is with us. Just like oxygen, we may not be able to see it, but we know it is there. We may not be able to see God, but God is all around us, supplying for our needs beyond our comprehension.

Jesus, the light, has come into the world. Christ is the light at the end of the tunnel and is ushering in the ever-present, and not yet Kingdom of God. This kingdom is one of unity, peace, joy, and reconciliation. It is one with a full and noisy banquet table where everyone is present. A table where everyone is fed and the Holy Spirit of God effortlessly breathes through us all. It is true blessedness.

While the light at the end of the pandemic tunnel grows brighter, but is still far off, we can participate in this Kingdom of God. When we feel lonely, it might be that we are waiting for someone to contact us. However, our relief may lie in our outreach to someone else.

In our loneliness, we can reach out with a phone call, a letter, or a text. In our pain, we can heal it by asking someone else about theirs. In our need, we can bless someone else in their storm. That is bringing light. You are a bearer of light, a source of warmth, welcome, and reconciliation. YOU are the answer to your prayer and somebody else's!

Ash Wednesday and Lenten Services

This month, we will enter the Season of Lent with Ash Wednesday on February 17th. We will stream our Ash Wednesday Service at 7 pm on Facebook. For the imposition of ashes and Holy Communion, you are invited to drive-thru on Sunday, February 14th to pick up your individual packet of ashes and Holy Communion element packets. You may hold on to these until our service on Wednesday.

*An important note about the ashes you will receive for our Ash Wednesday Service. On the 14th, you will receive a small container of dry ashes. A little goes a long way! For the proper consistency, mix the ashes with a small amount of oil until it forms a thick paste. You may impose ashes on yourself or impose ashes on each other in your family when the time comes during the service. When it is time, you may dip your finger in the ashes and make the sign of the cross on the forehead, saying, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

We will also stream our Evening Lenten Services at 7 pm on Sundays during Lent. Tune into Facebook for our sermon series. More information about our Lenten services is coming!

“Six Weeks on Money”

Did you know that:

- More than 50% of American households are living from paycheck to paycheck?
- 157 million are paying off credit card debt?
- 7 in 10 have cried about money sometime in their lifetime?

Even if you are in perfect financial health, money management can be difficult, especially when financial education is not readily available. Christians especially may have a tenuous relationship with money, receiving mixed messages about how we relate to the world with our wealth.

For our Lenten study this year, we have the opportunity to participate in a digital course that will give us a new way to think and feel about money. It is one of the first programs created in partnership with the ELCA. It is called *Six Weeks on Money*. This course intends to encourage us to develop a healthy relationship with money.

The course will start February 17th and will conclude shortly after Easter. The instruction includes two 30 minute audio files and one weekly group Zoom session. Weekly group Zoom sessions will take place every Thursday during Lent, starting February 18th, at 7 pm.

Joe called the meeting to order via Zoom at 7:10 pm with 12 current council members and 4 new council members in attendance. Rick had devotions.

Minutes from the November Council Meeting were read with no changes from the Council. Motion was made by Rick to accept the minutes, Carolyn seconded the motion and the motion carried.

The Treasurer's report was given by Joe. The General Fund balance was \$3,414.28 as of October 31, 2020; the Building Fund balance was \$5,844.67, the Cemetery Fund was \$1,437.69. The General Fund balance was \$9,389.25 as of November 30, 2020; the Building Fund balance was \$6,388.66, the Cemetery Fund was \$1,437.69. Ken made a motion to accept the Financial Report as read, Kathy seconded, motion carried.

Pastor Adrienne gave her monthly report included below:

Grace and Peace to you in the name of God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ.

Advent blessings! I hope everyone had a safe and wonderful Thanksgiving. Thank you to Terry Bledsoe for livestreaming our Thanksgiving Eve Service and to Tim Whitener who played his dulcimer for the prelude! It was a beautiful service of gratitude and hope. I watched it from home as I self-quarantined while awaiting my COVID test results. Thankfully, I was negative!

At our last council meeting, we decided to act on Bishop Smith's suggestion to follow-up on the Boy Scouts proof of claim form. Joe, Dwayne, and I gathered the most information we could and submitted it before the deadline. This will be a good safeguard in case anything comes up relating to Sardis association with the Boy Scouts of America.

As the church year has begun and the calendar year is coming to a conclusion, I would like to say thank you to our council members who are rotating off this year, including our council chair, Joe Biggerstaff, who has led us safely through this pandemic. We have had to make several difficult decisions regarding our plans and responsibility of keeping people safe. Welcome to our newly elected council members!

As the Nativity of the Lord is approaching, we continue to await Christ's second coming. Late have many guidelines to follow for this covid19 season. We have gotten excellent guidance from our governor, ELCA, and synod regarding safe conduct this precarious time of pandemic. In addition, I was curious what other churches and denominations were doing and came across a letter from a United Methodist Bishop who was writing his churches about this Advent Season. He wrote:

In my last pastoral letter, I also said that you need to be making plans that include the distinct possibility of on-line Advent and Christmas worship. This is now more than a distinct possibility. Today, I am asking you in the strongest way possible to refrain from in-person indoor worship for the Advent and Christmas seasons. I am deeply grateful for all the ways you have encouraged the wearing of masks, social distancing, and handwashing. It has helped. Yet, community spread has become so prolific that we need to do more to protect public health, promote the common good, and care for others' well-being in the name and spirit of Jesus.

In reading this, it struck me that at the birth of our Lord Jesus, the angels, the shepherds, and the wise men worshipped the newborn Christ outside. While I have always known this, it seems particularly meaningful as we are gathering for worship outside on a regular basis. How interesting to be encouraged to refrain from indoor worship for the Advent and Christmas season. In this heavy and concerning time, there are lights of revelation and gifts of faith along the way. The incorporation of our new radio transmitter, however, may be contemporary and welcome addition to our outside service.

Pastorally, this remains a difficult time for all. It is disappointing that we cannot spend holidays with family and friends as we normally do. It appears that covid cases have increased at troubling levels. Schools are starting to close and Governor Cooper has issued stricter guidelines a curfew. Life is stressful for everyone as we live and work as safely as we can.

The Heart of God and the Greatest Commandments

For our Lenten series this year, we will be exploring the commandments Jesus said were the greatest: to love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength; and to love your neighbor as yourself. Jesus says, “There is no commandment greater than these.” (Mark 12: 30-31)

In our services, we will have the opportunity to open our hearts and minds to the heart of God. In God’s heart, there are all those who hunger and thirst for justice. In this series, we will host a speaker to preach about the greatest commandments as it relates to loving ourselves and loving others.
