# Friendly Messenge 2020

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Greetings! I hope this newsletter finds you well! I pray you had a meaningful Easter celebration despite our accommodations and restrictions on that Easter morning. We know, however, that Easter is not just one day, but 50 days. We are in the Easter Season. I know there is a lot of uncertainty and even fear during this time. We are having to do a lot of things very differently. It was very difficult for us to lose a beloved member, Ray Weaver, and not be able to gather all together with the family at the graveside. I know this community holds them in love and prayer. A memorial service will be held in the future.

When you receive this newsletter we will not quite yet know when we will resume gathering in person for worship again. The Sardis council has decided to abide by the expectation to hold off on in person gatherings until May 12. We will have more information from our governor and synod in another week or two. However, it might be closer to May 12 before we hear and are able to determine our plans for the upcoming weeks. Once we have more information and have made a determination, we will communicate this as soon as possible.

I was reflecting on Easter and how it was different this year, I thought of all of the intensity and range of emotion that first Easter. While some gospels report joy at the resurrection, joy that Jesus, the disciples' Lord and Teacher, was raised from the dead, there was also a lot of trauma, guilt, grief, despair, fear, and uncertainty. On the first Sunday after Easter, the disciples hid in their homes in fear for their lives. The fact that Jesus was raised from the dead and was alive after a brutal execution, was extremely threatening to the ruling powers and it was dangerous for them as his followers.

On that first Sunday, they were gathered together in the house and Jesus appeared. Closed doors and windows didn't stop the Lord. He appeared to his disciples and said, "Peace be with you." Then Jesus invited Thomas (the one who didn't get to see him in the early resurrection appearances) to touch his hands and his sides. "Do not be faithless but believing." At that point, Thomas did believe and confessed, "My Lord and my God." Jesus accepted Thomas with all of his doubts and out of the mouth of a doubter came a grand moment of faith.

That is the way it is with doubt and faith sometimes. Doubt and faith are not really opposite each other. Faith, rather, lives on the edge of doubt. Doubt gives faith its character of risk and becomes the catalyst for a stronger faith.

So, what do we do with our doubts? I think it's best to do what Thomas did. Bring our doubts to the Lord. Jesus will not turn us away. He knows that honest doubt is often the prelude of faith. Jesus is always ready to receive those who doubt into his presence. He showed Thomas his hands and his side. He wills to show you what you need in order that you might come to a stronger faith.

We may not be in the presence of Jesus the way Thomas was, however, you can be present at those places where Jesus has promised to be present for you. Jesus has promised to be present wherever and whenever two or three gather in his name. He has promised to be present whenever we eat and drink in his name (which we will one day do again). Jesus has promised to be present wherever His story is told.

When Jesus appeared to them behind their locked doors, he said, "Peace be with you." He showed them his hands and side. He commissioned them to tell his story to the world. "As the Father has sent me, even so I send you." That is what Jesus said to them. Then he did something that sounds strange upon first hearing. He breathed on the disciples and said to them, "receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

What is this breathing on the disciples about? Remember in Genesis, the story of God creating the first humans. We read that there the Lord God formed the first person of dust from the ground, "...and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life..." The breath of God is the life of God. God breathed life into Adam's nostrils, into Adam's being. That life is God's Spirit.

We can read this story as a NEW creation story! Jesus shatters our captivity to death. Jesus conquered death's stronghold on life. In John, he breathes new life into his disciples. And then? Then Jesus tells his disciples to proclaim his message of love and forgiveness to the world.

Perhaps this COVID-19 experience may give us time to come along with Thomas. Bring all of your doubts to the Lord. Come along as friends and SHARE the story of Jesus. Come along and read his story once again in Holy Scripture. God's Spirit is present in the telling of the story of Jesus, seeking to overcome your doubts, and lead you to faith. It is part of becoming a new creation.

Jesus speaks a special word of blessing over all who come to faith in our day and age: "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe."

# A Section of Martin Luther's Small Catechism

#### THE APOSTLES' CREED

The First Article: Creation

"I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth."

I believe that God has created me and all that exists; that he has given me and still sustains my body and soul, all my limbs and senses, my reason and all the faculties of my mind, together with food and clothing, house and home, family and property; that he provides me daily and abundantly with all the necessities of life, protects me from all danger, and preserves me from all evil. All this he does out of his pure, fatherly and divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness on my part. For all of this I am bound to thank, praise, serve and obey him. This is most certainly true.

#### The Second Article: Redemption

"I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead."

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the virgin Mary, is my Lord, who has redeemed me, a lost and condemned creature, delivered me and freed me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil, not with silver and gold but with his holy and precious blood and with his innocent sufferings and death, in order that I may be his, live under him in his kingdom, and serve him in everlasting righteousness, innocence and blessedness, even as he is risen from the dead and lives and reigns to all eternity. This is most certainly true.

#### The Third Article: Sanctification

"I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen."



I believe that by my own reason or strength I cannot believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to him. But the Holy Spirit has called me through the Gospel, enlightened me with his gifts, and sanctified and preserved me in true faith, just as he calls, gathers, enlightens and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth and preserves it in union with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian church he daily and abundantly forgives all my sins, and the sins of all believers, and on the last day he will raise me and all the dead and will grant eternal life to me and to all who believe in Christ. This is most certainly true.
