Wishing all our Members a Happy and Healthy 2024

The WSBI committee would like to thank our members for their contribution to a very successful 2023. Workshops, Painting Days and Exhibitions were well received and we have been delighted to welcome new members and visitors to our events.

We are now preparing the events programme for 2024 and will publish a full timetable when our final workshop dates are confirmed. We have already booked Cath Hodsman for a workshop in April. Jackie Isard, Billy Showell, Ann Swan and Penny Brown have also agreed to visit us and we are in the process of negotiating their dates. In addition we have been in talks with Dyrham House to provide 'Artist in Residence' days from 15th April until 6th May to coincide with their Tulip Mania event.

You may remember that our members have been working with Llanfrechfa Grange Walled Garden to create a Florilegium of their medical plants. The Walled Garden sits in the grounds of the Grange University Hospital in Cwmbran and offers patients and staff a beautiful secluded area in which to find some tranquillity. Our project is now well under way and we hope to have an exhibition of our initial work at during the Spring of 2024. Information about submitting work and displaying details is included later in this Newsletter.

WSBI members are looking forward to participating in the Botanical Art Worldwide Project. This international venture will focus on biodiversity in crops that have been closely associated with the human species over thousands of years. The theme is designed to draw attention to the vast variety of food and plants available, in contrast with the relatively few varieties currently used in mass cultivation. Plants eligible for inclusion are those cultivated for food, textiles, building, energy, and medicine. The project will be exhibited from the 18th May 2025 and WSBI are in the process of looking for a suitable venue to display original, digital and virtual art work.

One of our Members from North Wales, Pam Powell, has been having great success with her paintings. This is what she had to say.

"I have been painting quite a lot lately and have entered a picture into the ABA 'The Magic of Leaves' online digital show, so will see how I get on. In addition, I entered 5 pictures for submission to join the North Wales Society of Fine Arts and was accepted. This was really a big deal for me as I have never put my work up for scrutiny before and was so thrilled when they accepted me. So, I will be able to fly the flag for botanical artists in their exhibitions next year! I don't like singing my own praise but I was particularly excited that my Rococo tulip painting was accepted for the Royal Cambrian Art 2024 Open exhibition and is now on display in Conwy, N Wales from 6/1/24 - 24/2/2024 along with 250 entries. I have also submitted a painting to the ABA for their online Spring Gallery.

At the moment I am painting autumn leaves etc like most artists!

Another thing I did do was buy a tutorial with Diane Sutherland. She now does single item tutorials as well as online classes. The one I bought was" Drawing and Painting an Autumn Oak Leaf" and it cost £20. This was well worth the money as far as I am concerned. Diane has an easy and straight forward way of teaching all skill levels. I must say though, I didn't complete it as you should (a bit controversial) but I use tutorials to gain knowledge on colour mixing and approaches to lights and darks and how artists paint. I then use the information gleaned to paint my own subjects, I find this approach works for me and I am able to develop my own style rather than copying.

Beatrix Potter's drawings and paintings of Fungi

While visiting the Lake District last September I went to the **Armitt Museum**, **Ambleside** to see an exhibition of Beatrix Potter's drawings and paintings of fungi. Potter's family took long holidays in the Lake District and Scotland. It was while she was staying at Dunkeld in Perthshire that she met Charlie McIntosh, a postman and acknowledged expert on ferns, mosses and fungi. She showed some of her drawings of fungi to Charlie who recognised some of them as being very rare species. On returning home to London, Beatrix arranged for Charlie to send her, specimens of fungi so that she could continue her painting and research.

In 1987 Beatrix Potter produced an academic paper: 'On the Germination of the Spores of Agaricaceae', which was presented to The Linnean Society of London on her behalf by George Massee, the Principal Assistant of the Herbarium at Kew (females were not allowed to present or even attend)! The paper was dismissed as requiring more work, however subsequently, her drawings and paintings of fungi have been acknowledged as being very accurate, as well as beautiful and her research into the germination of fungi spores is still referred to today.

Beatrix Potter donated her drawings and paintings of fungi to the Armitt Museum and those seen at the exhibition were exquisite.

Travels through the Paintbox - Victoria Finlay

We all enjoy using the myriad of colours of our paints and pencils and we are always mixing other hues, but do we ever think of their origins and the journey's pigments have made before they fill the paint pots?


The history of colour is written about by Victoria Finlay in her book 'Travels through the Paintbox' and it is full of anecdotes, stories and adventures, including the mysterious Celadon (a green highly prized by the Chinese) and Scheele's Green which used arsenic and was loved by Napoleon. Did he die from arsenic poison leaching from his wallpaper...???

This is a fascinating story going from digging the ochres of the earth, to the crushing of the exquisite blue lapis lazuli, the pounding of beetles, the mango-eating cows, the squeezing of sea snails and the cropping of the indigo bush.

I read this book bit by bit, colour by colour and am continually amazed by the back story of every single colour of the rainbow.




