Road Foreman's Report

Manager Leo Rosenbauer was contacted by Jeff Riemer from Herman Gas desiring to install a new gas line the entire length of the northern side of Alwine Rd. There is already a gas line on the Saxony Farm side of Riemer Rd. The existence of this gas line is a deterrent to maintenance (i.e. storm drainage) as well as possible future improvements. John Cypher said he does not favor a gas line too close to the road on the north side which would further limit the Township's use for maintenance and future use. The Supervisors agreed to table the matter pending further research by the Manager and Supervisors.

John Cypher read the road report presented by the manager and road foreman. The road crew picked-up 36" diameter culvert pipe for O'Hara Rd. culvert crossing. They worked on the boom mower, cleaned, and washed the mower & side deck. Mowing to start on May 17 or 19. New rear tires put on the boom mower by Skander Tire (approx. \$1,575) and 2 rear tires were leaking on the Case 930M' serviced by Good Tire Service. The road crew removed tree on Frazier Road. Milling areas were marked on Bonniebrook; the road was swept to prepare for the milling. Trimmings were removed from Bonniebrook Rd. which had not been removed by the residents. They rearranged the maintenance shop office for placement of the used air conditioner. Mowing was done at the park and township building. Leaves were removed from ditch lines with the twin turbine blower. Recalls on the Bobcat were performed. Catch basin and culvert pipe with an extension cross pipe were installed at 255 Bonniebrook Rd. in preparation for the paving project. Water drainage issue on the north bound lane (at 122 Bonniebrook Rd.) should be repaired by the end of this week. The road crew will assist Summit Township on 5/17 and 5/18 to push up millings from Bonniebrook Rd.

Manager Rosenbauer suggested allowing the road crew to attend the Stephenson Equipment Customer Appreciate Day and Luncheon on May 27th (Thursday). The Supervisors have no objection to a couple of hours off if the schedule works out okay. He noted that the flagger training 'certification cards' should be coming soon.

Recreation Committee

Brian Patten was unable to be present tonight and did not have the Recreation Meeting minutes from May 5, 2021 available for this evening.

Manager Leo Rosenbauer reported that he and Greg Bauer attended a zoom meeting with Jim Feath (HRG, Inc.) and a representative from Councilman Hunsaker to discuss their collaboration regarding the 'pool study' and a RFP (request of proposal) for future renovation of the SEBCO Pool.

It appears the RFP could be completed in about 4 months. CDBG admin. funds will be used to pay for the study. There was a brief discussion about the pool patching done for this 2021 season.

Mr. Rosenbauer noted that the YMCA will rent the pavilion again this summer. They have a new contact-person and they plan on a couple of special events for the kids during those rental days.

Planning Commission

The Planning Commission's April 19th meeting was cancelled. However, Leo Rosenbauer (Planning Chairman) reported that he received a letter dated 4/15/21 from James K. (Kevin) Miller requesting an extension of time for the Stoneybrook Land Development Phase II of sixty-two (62) days from the P.C.

meeting of April 19, 2021 to a new deadline of June 21, 2021. Chairman Cypher noted that this means the that the Supervisors must take action by their June 14, 2021 meeting. With this understanding, the Supervisors voted to accept the extension request as stated in the letter. The Manager reported that the developers' agreement, cost estimate and bonding are still outstanding.

May 10, 2021 Unfinished Business

Summit Township received only one bid for the Bonniebrook Road Multimodal Project 'line painting' from Williams and Willman. It was noted that this is less than the original \$30,000 estimate and that only about one-fourth of this is Jefferson Township's cost. The Supervisors voted to accept the award to be made by Summit Township for the line-painting from Williams and Willman for \$24,510.75.

May 10, 2021 New Business

Chairman Cypher noted that the Supervisors are still considering how to help the Saxonburg Volunteer Fire Dept. using the American Rescue funding. They will also be looking at other uses for the funds, including reimbursement to Township for lost revenue due to the COVID-19.

Public Comment & Miscellaneous Business – May 10, 2021

Ms. Donna Eakin was present on behalf of Joe Kubit, candidate for Common Pleas Judge. She promoted Mr. Kubit's work ethic and experience (30 years). Mr. Kubit arrived later this evening and he was given a few minutes to speak regarding his candidacy.

Mr. Richard Goldinger was present to introduce himself as candidate for Common Pleas Judge. He expressed his experience as current district attorney, court room experience and other organizations.

Mr. Lloyd Brewer had submitted a request to speak to the Supervisors and commented regarding 'ethics and conflicts of interest to be a supervisor'.

A notice was received from R.A.R.Engineering Group, Inc. regarding the application by PA American Water GP-5 for the Thoma Meat Market Utility Line Stream Crossing.

The Township received info. from the South Butler Community Library: 1) Open to visitors since March; 2) 2 Fundraisers this year – Gift Card Raffle will be June to Nov. (gift cards donations due by May 21st) and Booktoberfest German Dinner in October; and 3) SummerQuest 2021 theme is "Tails and Tales". For more info go to www.southbutlerlibrary.org

Leo Rosenbauer noted that 'E-Code 360' is up and running. He is very pleased with it. There is no charge for 2021 for this service. Attorney Marshall commented to him that this could easily save the township \$500 a year just from his use of the on-line township code.

Manager Rosenbauer further noted that he is working on 'fillable forms' for use on the website and an announcement section called 'Monthly Happenings'.

John Cypher noted that the **Primary Election is Tues.**, **May 18, 2021**. Precinct I is the Municipal Building at 157 Great Belt Rd.; the office will be 'closed' for regular business. Precinct II has been <u>moved</u> from the Jefferson Grange <u>to the</u> Calvary Baptist Church at 199 Great Belt Rd.

The Township is NOT authorized to clean-up any private property; the only exception would be for Emergency access for 9-1-1 responders! It also not legal for property owners to place any storm/rain/wind debris from their property along the township road rights-of-way.

⇒ **Jefferson Township Burning Ordinance** www.ieffersonbutler.com

The Township Burning Ordinance limits burning of 'ordinary' (domestic) waste materials (paper, cartons, boxes, yard waste, wood, and other similar items) by residents to 'dusk to dawn'. Items 'excluded' from burning are: sewage, all putrescible animal & vegetable matter resulting from handling, preparation, cooking and consumption of food, rags, old clothes, leather, rubber, carpets, furniture, tin cans, glass, crockery, masonry, metals, chemicals, tires, shingles and petroleum products such as (but not limited to) paint, grease, oil and plastic products. PLEASE use common sense! Many items that cannot be burned can be recycled. All fires are to be completely extinguished before leaving unattended. Recreational fires are permitted (as per Ordinance.) PLEASE be considerate of your neighbors and do NOT permit leaves and other 'allowed' materials to be left smoldering after dusk.

ALL COMMERCIAL/INDUSTRIAL BUSINESSES, NON-RESIDENTIAL and MULTI-FAMILY, are PROHIBITED from ANY burning at ANY time per the Dept. of Environmental Protection.

TIRES are NEVER to be burned by ANYONE. Dumping of Tires is ILLEGAL and subject to fines.
