SAFETY MESSAGEMike Manen, Safety Officer

RETURNING RIDERS



As an older rider, and returning rider after a 30-year break, I was curious if there were any safety strategies that applied to us. After looking at a few articles, I found it was mostly the same for younger riders with the exception of fitness, health checks, and motorcycle choice.

1. Rider Training and Skill Refreshers

• Take refresher or advanced riding courses:

Skills can fade over time, and older riders may benefit from courses such as:

- o Motorcycle Safety Foundation (MSF) Experienced Rider Course
- o RiderCoach refresher programs

Focus areas:

- o Low-speed maneuvers, emergency braking, cornering, and hazard avoidance.
- o Situational awareness and defensive riding techniques.

2. Motorcycle Selection and Ergonomics

• Choose the right motorcycle:

- o Lighter weight, lower seat height, and balanced center of gravity.
- o Consider touring or adventure models with stability features.

• Modern safety technology:

- o ABS (Anti-lock Braking System) prevents wheel lockup.
- o Traction control and stability control assist during turns and slippery conditions.
- o Adaptive headlights improve nighttime visibility.

• Ergonomic adjustments:

o Handlebar risers, custom seats, or foot peg adjustments to reduce strain on joints.

3. Protective Gear

• Helmet:

- o Always wear a DOT- or ECE-certified full-face helmet.
- o Replace helmets every 5 years or after any impact.

• Body protection:

- o Jackets and pants with CE-rated armor for shoulders, elbows, back, hips, and knees.
- o Gloves and boots with good grip and wrist/ankle support.

• Visibility:

o Bright or reflective clothing and helmets; auxiliary lights for better conspicuity.

4. Physical and Cognitive Health Maintenance

• Fitness:

- o Maintain strength (especially core and leg muscles), flexibility, and balance.
- Exercises like yoga, tai chi, or resistance training can help.

Health checks:

- o Regular eye and hearing exams.
- o Monitor medications that may affect alertness or coordination.
- o Check for conditions that impact balance, reaction time, or fatigue.

5. Riding Practices and Risk Management

Plan rides carefully:

- o Avoid peak traffic times, poor weather, or nighttime riding.
- o Take regular breaks to reduce fatigue.

• Ride defensively:

- o Assume other drivers may not see you.
- o Keep generous following distances and avoid blind spots.

• Pre-ride inspections:

o Tire pressure, lights, brakes, fluids — older riders are often safer when bikes are well-maintained.

6. Mental Readiness and Decision-Making

- Know your limits:
 - o If balance, vision, or confidence declines, consider adjusting riding style or distance.
- Stay mentally sharp:
 - o Engage in cognitive activities that support quick decision-making.
- Emergency preparedness:
 - o Carry a phone, medical ID, and emergency contact information.

7. Community and Support

- Ride in groups:
 - o Group rides can improve visibility and provide help if problems arise.
- Mentorship:
 - o Experienced older riders can mentor returning or new riders on safe habits.
- Continuous learning:
 - o Stay updated on traffic laws, road conditions, and new technology.

Dealing with Road Bullies

Personal Moments of Road Rage



I used to think the objects of road rage were anyone else but me. I am a conservative driver who lets others have their fair share of the road. I am in no hurry; I let the faster drivers go by. But despite my non-aggressive behavior I found myself the target of what I call a "Road Bully"; And I have not been the only one. You may have had a similar experience.

Speaking with a fellow Blue Knight, I learned he was injured in a Road Bully incident while riding to a local motorcycle gathering. He is a long-time rider with thousands of safe miles on his motorcycle. When we ride together, he is conservative and polite to other motorists. He is the first one to stop and offer assistance to someone stranded on the side of the road. He is the least likely to evoke road rage with his driving habits. But it happened to him, culminating with a serious injury collision.

To more thoroughly understand my title of "Road Bully", let me describe the two incidents. Then I can discuss how you can respond in similar circumstances.

In my case I was driving my convertible on a pleasant sunny summer day. The top was down, and I was cruising the highway alongside the ocean. Doing five miles over the limit, I was closely followed by a man on a motorcycle. After tailgating me for a short distance, he passed me on the left, driving over a simulated island and cutting back quickly in front of me; "cutting me off". Full disclosure: I showed my displeasure by displaying the universal hand signal. He returned the gesture and sped down the road.

We were soon stopped by a red signal. He in the right lane, me in the left. He looked over at me and made eye contact. I don't know if it was my gray hair or something inside of him, but he gave me "the finger" with a scowl on his face. We continued when the light turned green, and he pulled along side and began yelling at me. As we drove on, I slowed to let him go by, but he pulled in front of me, forcing me to avoid hitting him by stopping. He got off his motorcycle and started calling me names and challenging me to fight.

I was able to jump the center island and got around his motorcycle, driving faster to get away. At the next signal he caught me again. Once again he swerved toward me, forcing a left turn onto the next street. He sped up, passing me on the left, again over a painted island. He kicked at my car and stopped me again by pulling in front.

I sat in my car as he dismounted again and challenged me to fight. My passenger kept me from getting out of the car, and we exchanged words about dangerous driving. He had an open-face helmet and I could clearly see he was a man in his late 50's. In the end he returned to his motorcycle, yelling insults at me as he drove away. The reason for his aggressive behavior is still a mystery to me. It was a shock to me, and caused an epiphany that I share with you now: No one is exempt from a Road Bully.

Which leads me to describe the incident with my motorcycle riding Blue Knight friend.

On a clear warm morning, he was riding a short distance from his home to a weekly gathering of like-minded motorcycle riders. Travelling on surface streets, he noticed a vehicle closely following him. Believing the driver wanted to pass, he moved over a lane. The driver followed him, getting more aggressively closer to his motorcycle. Now my friend was seriously worried about his safety. Waving the driver around was useless.

As they approached a signal-controlled intersection, my friend was distracted by the Road Bully and failed to see the red light. He was hit broadside by another vehicle and suffered a broken leg and a "totaled" motorcycle. The Road Bully, who caused the collision, disappeared.

At the time of both incidents, neither of us considered the alternatives of "woulda, coulda, shouda" that may have defused the confrontation. With time to reflect, I am now prepared to deal with any Road Bully incident that may happen to me again. I offer these suggestions to you now.

In a vehicle

- Keep a spray can of Mace or Pepper Spray within arm's reach. (Use if necessary)
- If forced to a stop, keep your windows rolled up and doors locked. (Convertibles are at a disadvantage here, ergo the spray can.)
- Use your cell phone to record the actions of the Road Bully.
- Include audio of you saying "Please stop", or similar. (Good evidence for later)
- Get a picture of the Road Bully vehicle, including the license plate.

On a motorcycle

- Try to stop safely as soon as possible. (Continuing to ride increases danger)
- Get off the highway if possible. (Parking lot, etc.)
- Keep your riding gear on. (Especially the helmet)
- Keep a spray can of Mace or Pepper Spray withing reach. (Use if necessary)
- Use your cell phone to record the actions of the Road Bully. (Usually stops aggression)
- Get a picture of the Road Bully vehicle, including license plate.

Reality of what you are dealing with

Understand that you are a victim of several crimes in progress. Aggressive Road Bully behavior is criminal behavior. In addition to violations of the Vehicle Code, preventing you from unencumbered travel is a form of kidnap. (Read the section) Challenging to fight or displaying a weapon in a threatening manner is a crime. Using a vehicle for assault is a crime. Act accordingly.



De-escalate if possible. Gather evidence. Defend yourself.
Bring Road Bullies to justice.

On Veterans Day, some of our Blue Knights members were excited to celebrate this special day with one of our newest members, Mike Daly. Mike is also a member of the American Legion Post 364, located in Santee, California.

The city of Santee, using privately funded donations, constructed a Veterans Memorial structure located on the corner of Mast Boulevard and Fanita Parkway, which was officially dedicated on November 11, 2021, with a public ceremony.





The 11x11x11 structure represents the significance of Veterans Day: the 11th hour, of the 11th day, of the 11th month, serving as a permanent tribute of the armistice that effectively ended the First World War.

On Veterans Day, members of American Legion Post 364, replaced the American Flag and the POW flag proudly waiving high above the Memorial. The changing of the flags was done

in military fashion, lowering the retiring flags that served their mission well, and raising the new flags representing new assignments for both new flags. Both flags were then slowly lowered to half-staff honoring the heroes that did not make it home.



- Print your name on a card (provided).




