# **SAFETY MESSAGE**Mike Manen, Safety Officer

### **Riding in Autumn**



I know it's hard to believe, but fall is right around the corner and some folks might be planning a trip at this time of year. Perhaps November Knights. So, after a little research I found some useful tips for fall riding.

#### 1. Watch for Leaves

- **Dry leaves** can cover hazards like potholes, gravel, or road markings.
- Wet leaves are extremely slippery, similar to ice—slow down and avoid sudden maneuvers.

### 2. Cooler Temperatures

- Morning and evening rides can be much colder. Hypothermia and reduced dexterity are real risks.
- Dress in layers, preferably moisture-wicking and windproof gear.
- Consider heated grips or gear for longer or colder rides.

#### 3. Sun Glare

- The sun sits lower in the sky in fall, increasing the risk of glare.
- Wear polarized sunglasses or a tinted visor during the day.
- Clean your visor regularly to reduce streaks that intensify glare.

# 4. Shorter Days

- It gets darker earlier. Ensure you're visible with:
  - Reflective gear or strips
  - High-visibility jackets
  - Fully functioning lights (headlight, brake light, indicators)

#### 5. Cold Tires

- Tire grip is reduced until your tires warm up.
- Ride cautiously in the first few miles.
- Check tire pressure often—fluctuations in temperature affect PSI.

#### 6. Wildlife

- Fall is a peak time for deer and other animals, especially around dusk and dawn.
- Be alert in rural or wooded areas and reduce speed accordingly.

### 7. Fog and Moisture

- Fog is more common in the fall and can impair visibility.
- Use anti-fog visors or sprays and keep your headlight on low beam.

### 8. Road Conditions

- Frost or black ice can form in shaded areas or early in the morning.
- Avoid early starts when temps are near or below freezing.

# **Maintenance Checks Before Fall Rides**

- Battery: Cold weather stresses older batteries—test and replace if weak.
- Lights: Check all lights and indicators for brightness and function.
- **Tires**: Inspect for wear and proper inflation.
- Chain: Lubricate more frequently if riding through wet leaves or puddles.

# Final Tip: Ride Slower, Ride Smarter

Fall requires **extra caution**. Reduce speed, increase following distance, and stay alert to changing road and weather conditions.

### **Fearless U-Turns**

(Ride like a Motorcycle Officer)

At a recent California VI Blue Knight riding event, I was approached by a fellow rider. He wanted to develop slow-riding skills, and most importantly how to do U-turns. In addition to discussing local riding classes, we talked about this article. I resubmit this now for your reading pleasure.

If you have been riding for any length of time, you have been faced with making U-Turns in traffic. Depending upon your level of confidence, it was a chance to show your slow-riding skills or a nervous exercise to prevent a tip over. Although it is one of the drills taught in Motorcycle Riding 101, it still an under-developed skill for many of us. Maybe it is time to revisit the technique and gain some much needed confidence.

You may find yourself in many different circumstances where you need to go in the opposite direction; on a two lane road, at an intersection or in a parking lot. Watching skilled riders make U-Turns and smoothly accelerate away in the opposite direction is impressive, but in my riding experience, these tight U-Turns are the exception, rather than the rule.

Many riders in my group go wider than necessary; some actually turn onto a side road or driveway and re-enter the highway. Some dog-paddle, steering with handlebars rather than using the motorcycle dynamics to make the turn. The fear of a slow-speed fall down overcomes the use of proper techniques, especially on larger, heavier motorcycles. If this sounds familiar, you don't need to be that guy.

Most Motorcycle Officers go to quarterly training to maintain their skills. They practice emergency drills, but just as importantly they practice low-speed operation. One of the recurring drills is the U-turn.

Motorcycle Officers often travel in formation. Formation riding is one of the practiced skills, and includes how to stay in formation when making a U-turn. Using and practicing the basics of U-turning results in an impressive maneuver at an intersection, and maintains the integrity of the group. You, and any group you regularly ride with, can do the same.



The secret to fearless U-Turns is really no secret: learn the proper techniques, and then practice, practice, practice. I will share with you the techniques that make Motorcycle Officers so confident and impressive when they make U-Turns, both individually and as a group.

**The basics**: No matter what size motorcycle you ride, the techniques for making a U-Turn are the same.

Sit comfortably upright in the saddle. Slow to about a walking speed as you approach the turn. Pull in the clutch and rev the engine to about 2500 RPM. Slip the clutch, but don't fully engage it. Use the clutch to keep your momentum up and your speed smooth. At the same time, lightly engage the *rear* brake. This is where practice is important; you must coordinate the throttle, clutch and rear brake to make the smooth arc in the turn. Now for the MOST IMPORTANT component: *Turn your head and look in the direction you want to go.* 

Turning your head, and "eye placement" are the key to making the motorcycle go where you want. Motorcycle Officers use the head turn and easily transition from lane number one to lane number one in the opposite direction.

Most traffic lanes are 10 to 12 feet wide; some are wider. At intersections, there is often extra width provided by a raised or painted island. This gives you 20 to 30 feet of space to make your turn.

Your objective is to smoothly turn from the inside lane (lane one) to the inside lane in the opposite direction. Initially it will seem impossible, but with some parking lot practice you will be confidently making U-Turns at busy intersections to the envy of your fellow riders.

**Practice method**: During my Motorcycle Officer training, the instructor used painted parking spaces in a vacant lot as a guide. The objective was to make figure eight turns within four stalls. Individual parking spaces are eight to ten feet wide, and there is no penalty for going outside the lines. This is a very effective and simple exercise that doesn't require cones or chalk.

Locate an empty parking lot area and select four connecting parking spaces. Start slowly, and don't worry about staying inside the lines until later. The first objective is to practice the basics of the U-turn.

I know the fear of "dropping" your 'sickle will be in your head, and that is normal. Rest assured that every Motorcycle Officer has dropped his motorcycle at one time or another, so if it happens to you, know that you are in good company. If cosmetic damage is a concern, remove any bags, and tape the edges of your fairing or any other surfaces that may contact the tarmac. Then practice with confidence.

Start your figure eight at the outside edge of one parking space. Use the four spaces as a reference, but concentrate on the basics. The **HEAD TURN** is the most often forgotten part of the basics. Don't forget the **HEAD TURN**. Look where you want to go, and make U-turns at the end of each set of parking spaces. It is OK to go wide, but your objective is to eventually stay within the lines: practice, practice, practice!!

No one ever became proficient at playing the piano just by knowing the basics. Practice is necessary to develop the skills for piano playing and motorcycle riding. Motivate yourself to finally make figure eight turns within the four parking stalls.

The next time you go riding with your friends, you will have the confidence you need at intersections. Make your U-turns like a Motorcycle Officer; you will enjoy your ride and you will get some envious looks from those around you.

### **Community Projects In our history**

...also in our Mission Statement

People who are unfamiliar with our Blue Knights organization can learn about us each month in our newsletter. Our club is well described in the "About Our Club" page, including our commitment to be active in community projects.

What, exactly, is the definition of "community projects"? In loose terms it could mean attending organized events that support charities. We do that a lot.

More specifically, "community projects" are those events that require assistance in order to function. Handson help with logistics, physical labor, collections for donations, roll up your sleeves and help make it happen.

Blue Knights California VI has a history of participating in community projects. Here are some noteworthy projects in our history:

 Participated in the Twin Pines Christmas event. Twin Pines is a remote juvenile detention facility in San Bernardino County. Detainees are confined to the camp, and at Christmas time Blue Knights CA IV and our chapter collected gifts for the boys. We delivered the gifts, and then had lunch with them, sitting and talking with individuals about their personal worth.



Redlands Bicycle Classic. This is a long-standing high-level bicycle competition, with racers going on to
the Tour de France. A multi-day event, it has daily venues in Redlands and surrounding cities.
Thousands of volunteers are needed to facilitate and assure safety for participants and spectators. Our
chapter joined with Blue Knights CA IV in escorting riders, controlling intersections and communicating
with the command post from the race course. We did this for 15 years.

- Highway clean up. California has established a structured highway clean up program to keep trash and
  debris off our roadways. Sections of highways are measured and assigned to volunteers. Official signs are
  posted that announce the volunteer organizations that care for those sections. Our chapter had a portion
  of highway 78 just outside Julian, California.
- Terry Bennett competition and training. Motorcycle
   Officer Terry Bennett was a San Diego police officer. He
   was intentionally run down and killed while on-duty. In
   his memory, the San Diego County Motor Officers
   Association created an annual competition and
   training event for all active-duty motorcycle officers.
   Participants come from agencies in California, Arizona,
   Nevada and Mexico. Blue Knights from our chapter
   have volunteered to facilitate and score the
   competitions.



Homes for Our Troops. This organization provides handicap-friendly homes to veterans from post-911 era.
 Houses are designed to accommodate the veterans' limitations and are provided free of charge. Our Blue Knights have participated in several projects in San Diego County.



- **Veterans' home** in Chula Vista, California. Each year our chapter provides gifts and pre-paid gift cards to the veterans who reside at the Chula Vista facility. We have gone as a group on Veterans' Day where we deliver the gifts and stay to visit with the residents.
- Support for disasters. The fires in Los Angeles left hundreds homeless. In addition to families, many pets were displaced and ended up in shelters. The total loss to these families inspired our chapter members to collect and deliver much needed necessities to the Los Angeles area, including donations to animal shelters.

Blue Knights, California VI has been active in supporting and participating community events for over 35 years. If you have a community project, and would like to invite our participation, we would like to hear from you.

Our chapter is hosting the **2026 Blue Knight Southwest Conference** in San Diego, June second to June sixth. If you are currently a Blue Knight, we hope to see you here. If you are qualified for Blue Knight membership, I invite you to join our family-oriented police motorcycle club and be a part of our team.



Take only memories, leave only footprints.



Director Emeritas Bill Craw sent me this picture. Friends of his were at the 2025 Sturgis Rally and found this brick in the downtown area. It is in the sidewalk outside the motorcycle museum.

No one knows when it was sponsored or put in place. The donor is a mystery.

A check with Past CA VI president Glenn Carpenter revealed no history or memory about the brick. It may have been bought by George Goland, one of the original CA VI members. A possibility, but not a certanity.

George was a CA VI member when I joined in 1990. He owned and rode a Honda Goldwing. Shortly afterward George bought his first Harley Davidson. He sold his Honda, and everything became Harley Davidson.

In 1990 George joined me, Bud Rosenbloom, Donnie Ruiz, and Rod Vandiver on our first ride to Sturgis. We were there for a week, visiting different events singularly or as a group. George and Bud got matching tattoos at the event.

Bud Rosenbloom and Donnie Ruiz are gone now, as is George Goland. Rod Vandiver and I do not remember anyone mentioning buying a brick like this one at the 1990 Sturgis Rally.

Still, George was an avid Harley owner. He went to Sturgis and other events on his Harley until he went to Heaven 1.

# **2026 Southwest Conference in San Diego**


June 2 - 6, 2026
