SAFETY MESSAGE Mike Manen, Safety Officer Heads Up



I started thinking the other day about how many helmets I have been through the last five years, it's been three or four. The industry standard is five years before needing replacement. My reason for so many helmets, usually for me it was the fit or too noisy. So here is some good information from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Wearing the right motorcycle helmet can mean the difference between life and death. We know it can also mean the difference between a comfortable and miserable ride. As you search through the many options—online and in stores—we have tips to help you find a safe helmet that fits.

Everyone's head is shaped a bit differently, and that's why helmets come in different shape styles—round oval, intermediate oval (the most common), and long oval. While we all generally have between a round and oval shaped head, it's important to determine your actual shape before buying a helmet. Use a mirror, or have a friend look down on your head from the top. Remember to focus on your head shape, not the shape of your face.

When trying on a helmet, take note of any pressure points on your forehead—a sign that the helmet is too round. Pressure points on the sides of your head indicate a helmet is too oval for the shape of your head. After you buy a new helmet, try wearing it for 30 to 45 minutes to check for pressure points before using it on a ride. These hot spots may not be immediately apparent but can grow into painful problems over time.

Make sure your helmet has the DOT symbol on the outside back; this means it meets our Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standard (FMVSS) No. 218.



NHTSA does not approve helmets, or any other motor vehicle equipment, instead relying on a self-certification process. However, we conduct tests on some helmets to make sure they meet our standard. While our selection is typically random, we do take into account feedback and complaints from consumers in determining which helmets to test each year. If a helmet does not meet our standard when tested, we can issue a formal recall of the helmet, requiring that it be removed from stores.

Helmets can also vary in style from full face to half helmets. I think the more helmet the safer.

Arturo Romero

Blue Knight Director Arturo Romero is best known for his Go Pro videos of rides and events. An unofficial chapter photographer, Arturo records history, and shares it on the Blue Knight Facebook site. Our members, and the world, have a better understanding of Blue Knights as a result. Remarkably, this unofficial photographer has had an interesting life long before joining our Blue Knight chapter.

The son of naturalized citizens, Arturo grew up with four siblings in the south bay area of San Diego County. He had a close knit and loving family in his formative years. Throughout his life he has faced challenges that have made him stronger, often turning those challenges into personal assets.

At around seven years old Arturo had a terrible accident that burned his face, right shoulder and right side of his back. He spent two weeks in the hospital, and he said the accident completely changed his life. Arturo said It was hard growing up looking different from everyone else as a kid, but later, he learned to love it; He liked being different.

At around 10 years of age, Arturo's father bought him a motorcycle. It was a Suzuki DS 80 and he rode it constantly until he "rode it into the ground." So, as Arturo says, "It was my father who got me started on riding."



Arturo played football for much of his youth. His father enrolled him in Pop Warner at age 6. During an early practice session, his father gave him advice about being an aggressive player. Arturo played defensive noseguard, and he did so well the coaches awarded him the number 1 jersey.

Arturo went on to play Varsity football for two years at Castle Park High, where he graduated in 1988. During his time on the team, his high school won one championship, and Arturo made the All-Stars team.

After high school, Arturo and his adult friends from elementary school started a softball team. They did not win many games, but enjoyed being together as adults. During one of their games, someone suggested Arturo's dad should asked to be the team pitcher. Arturo's dad was enthusiastic, and soon after he joined the team, they were undefeated.

Arturo's father and mother owned a Roofing company. His father always took Arturo and his brothers to work every summer so that they could learn a trade at a young age. He would tell them if they did not make it in whatever work they set out to do, their fall back would be Roofing. After graduating from high school, Arturo worked full time as a Roofer with his father. He intended to only work with his dad for one year, then go back to college.

After a year Arturo was like a right hand to his father, and he felt he could not leave him alone to run the business. So, he decided to stay in the business and take care of his father.

In 1992 Arturo's father passed away. Ironically, he died of a heart attack at the softball field. Arturo was with him, and despite his CPR efforts, his father did not survive.

The death struck Arturo's family hard. His mother did not want to continue with the roofing business, and closed all accounts.



U.S. Army

In 1993 Arturo joined the Army to serve his country. He did it because father admired the U.S. military so much, and Arturo wanted to make his parents proud. While in the military, Art earned the coveted E.I.B. (Expert Infantry Badge) Airborne wings and Air Assault wings. He also earned five Army commendation medals, and five Army achievement medals.



Alaska assignment

In 2000 Arturo left active duty, and joined the California National Guard. While in the Guard a peace keeping mission came up, guarding patriot missile batteries in Saudi Arabia. It was only a six-month deployment with low risk. During the preparation for deployment, 911 hit! His commander called his group to formation and said "Put on your game faces on gentlemen, it's going to be a completely different mission now!" Thankfully, they all came home safely, and while Arturo was at the Kearny Mesa Armory he met his wife, Monica.

Arturo was discharged from the Guard in 2004. That was the same year he lost his mother.

After working with the TSA at the San Diego Airport for 4½ years, Arturo was offered a job with U.S. Customs. Arturo has now been working with Customs and Border Patrol for 18 years. After a variety of assignments with CBP, Arturo is currently an Instructor and Field Training Officer with the San Diego field office.

The next time you see Director Romero, smile; you will probably be on camera.



Remembering Joseph Wambaugh

Our Chapter in San Diego hosted the Blue Knight Southwest Conference in 2005. While we had many outstanding activities happen at the event, arguably the highlight of the Conference was the personal appearance of Joseph Wambaugh.

Wambaugh was a famous writer by the time he visited our Conference. A local Point Loma resident, and Commissioner at the San Diego Police Historical Association, Wambaugh had published police novels that were based in San Diego; Most notably were "Lines and Shadows" and "Floaters".

Joe started his writing career with "The New Centurions" in 1971, which was made into a movie staring George C. Scott. It has been said that the name "The Blue Knight" originated in the 1971 story of The New Centurions.

He followed with "The Onion Field", a non-fiction account of two police officers who were kidnapped and taken to a remote area, where one of the officers was killed. This book was also made into a movie. He went on to write a total of 21 books from the perspective of the police officers involved; 16 were fiction and the rest non-fiction.

Joe Wambaugh spent 14 years with the Los Angeles Police Department, rising to the rank of Detective Sergeant, and held a bachelor's and master's degree in English. He pioneered a distinctive approach to crime dramas, saying "I put people in the cop's skin, and that shocked people". His books became so popular that he was making far more money as an author than a police sergeant. Joe joined LAPD in 1960, and left as a celebrity author in 1974.

Past president Glenn Carpenter remembers Joe Wambaugh as being supportive of our 1998 and 2005 Southwest Conferences, donating autographed books to both conferences. Glenn found Joe to be warm, receptive and very open to the Blue Knights; sentiments shared by all Blue Knights. Although he was a motorcycle rider, Joe Wambaugh couldn't join the Blue Knights because he fell short of qualifying service time. Glenn tried to get Joe an International Honorary membership, but did not get enough support.

Police officers across the nation felt a real kinship with Joe Wambaugh, whom they felt was one of them and told of unvarnished police work.

Joseph Wambaugh will be remembered for bringing his true accounting of police work to the world in 21 books and novels. We are grateful for having known him.

Motorcycle load and You

...A man's gotta know his limitations



A few years ago, a long-time, very active Blue Knight member crashed his motorcycle on his way to a Blue Knight event. His wife was with him as a passenger. Both suffered serious injuries. The crash was big news to the members who knew the rider and his wife.

At the time or the crash, I was the Southwest Conference Safety Officer. My former years as a traffic collision investigator with San Diego Police gave me a natural curiosity about the cause of the crash. My review was superficial, but focused on witness and rider interviews. Hearing from those who were present confirmed my suspicions: Improper motorcycle load with a secondary cause of inattention to vehicle condition.

You may wonder why load limits are so important. Motorcycles are manufactured to perform with an anticipated Gross Vehicle Weight. The frame is designed to hold the weight, and the suspension is tuned for best handling. Stock tires are fitted for the anticipated weight, with established inflation rates to handle the load and give maximum traction. By overloading the manufactures load limits, all of these components are compromised.


I admit that during my early riding years I didn't give much thought to proper loading. If I could tie it on the bike and make it to my destination, that was good enough. Like me, many riders today don't give loading that much thought. Day-rides are not much of a challenge. But if you travel for more that a day, and especially if you have a passenger, load limits matter. I'll wager that you don't know your manufacturer's motorcycle load limit. (I didn't until my BMW club asked.)


How riders carry passengers and loads has a significant effect on vehicle handling. Adding to that, poor motorcycle maintenance severely increases the odds of crashing. It's common knowledge that motorcycling has a level of danger. Proper load management and vehicle maintenance can keep the danger to a reasonable level.

For many years I have enjoyed an annual motorcycle camping trip with friends. We traveled hundreds or thousands of miles with our camping gear. With experience and fine-tuning we were able to carry a full campsite of gear without compromising vehicle handling. Because of how it was loaded, the extra weight was noticeable, but easily manageable. Road wisdom at its finest.

I have addressed this topic before. In a Wind Riding article, I described how to keep loads low, and near the center of gravity. I have also discussed the importance of vehicle maintainece (TCLOCKS). Both of these functions are critical to every day safety and riding enjoyment.

The Dunlop tire company produced a quick check to determine your load capacity. I share that with you now.





To find out the load limit for your motorcycle, you can use the calculator above, or visit the internet. Search "Load limit for (<u>insert make, model and year</u>) specs". You can also check your motorcycle owner's manual.

Whatever method you use, do it now. Based upon my experience, some riders found out the hard way.


