HAVERFORD — Spring flowers abound in Haverford Township storefronts this season as Discover Haverford's May Flower Project is underway.

The project matches township businesses with local artists who paint colorful floral displays on the outside of storefront windows. Painting began last weekend and continues through the weekend of May 4-5. Over 20 businesses are participating.

This is the third year for the popular May Flower Project that aims to enhance Haverford Township's business districts.

"It is wonderful to see the transformation once the windows have been painted," notes Discover Haverford Executive Director Jeanne Angell. "Thanks to sponsors Plant Roots and Visit Delco for helping to make this program possible and brightening up our town."

Plant Roots owner, Gina Ranieri, coordinates the project for Discover Haverford and she loves the attention the May Flower Project brings to local businesses.

"I think the biggest benefit is that it draws those people who are passing through our township to the businesses here because all of a sudden they notice a shop they never did before."

Some shops that were painted last weekend include Katz Pharmacy, Infinity Fitness, Hendren House, Charles B. Gans Plumbing & Heating and the Haverford YMCA.

Haverford Middle School art teacher Janiene Kwoczak and a dozen of her Art Club students painted eight large window panes at the YMCA. She said they were excited about the opportunity and "the students had a blast!"

Artist Jackie Greco has been a volunteer painter in previous years, and says she looks forward to participating each year. Painting outside of Sweets on Darby, she said, "My neighbor drives through Havertown daily and she says it makes her day to see the painted windows!"

Crozer Chester Medical Center honored by Delco Victim Assistance Center

Crozer Chester Medical Center recently received the 2024 Founders Award from the Delaware County Victim Assistance Center (DCVAC) at DCVAC's 50th anniversary celebration event in Springfield.

The hospital was recognized for establishing a pool of Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANE) who have shown extraordinary compassion and dedication to their patients during a particularly vulnerable time.

The Founders Award is named for the visionary women who founded Delaware County Women Against Rape, which has become DCVAC.

It is presented annually to someone who has made a major contribution to DCVAC, either a single event or a lifetime of significant efforts. According to the center, Crozer Chester Medical Center was the first hospital 50 years ago that invited DCVAC in to accompany and support victims of sexual assault through forensic examination.
