# Symbols of Peace

It all seems so simple. A simple peace sign—a simple definition and simple discussion. But, no—this peace thing is not simple at all. There are three easily-recognized symbols for peace:







The peace symbol, Figure 1, circle drawing combines a circle, a vertical line, and downward sloping lines. Gerald Holtom created this symbol in 1958. At that time, Holtom worked with the Direct Action Committee against Nuclear War. The BBC quoted Holtom saying, "I drew myself: the representative of an individual in despair, with palms stretched outwards and downwards in the manner of Goya's peasant before the firing squad." Holtom based the symbol on the naval flag codes; in semaphore the symbols represent the letters N and D for nuclear disarmament, the objective of his group. The peace symbol made its first public appearance in the United Kingdom during the 1958 Easter weekend Direct Action Committee anti-nuclear march. By 1960, the symbol was being used by the counterculture anti-war peace movement in the US. By the end of the 1960s, Holtom's Nuclear Disarmament symbol had become known as "the peace symbol." The peace symbol was not patented or restricted, so the symbol's usage and meaning quickly spread around the world.

The "V" hand sign, Figure 2, we now know as the peace sign was used for centuries to mean victory. During the second world war, the sign was made popular by Winston Churchill – this is when the hand sign was considered a V sign and meant victory. In the 1960s, protesters against the Vietnam War and counterculture activists adopted the gesture as a sign of peace. Because the hippies of the day often flashed this sign while saying "Peace," it became popularly known as the peace sign.





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#### **UUFM SPROUTS FIRST FUNDRAISER A SUCCESS!**



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#### PEACE SYMBOLS

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The dove and olive branch, Figure 3, has been a peace symbol for a very long time. The olive branch was a symbol of peace dating back to at least the 5th century BCE. Ancient Greeks thought the olive tree drove away evil spirits. The Romans believed there was an intimate relationship between war and peace. Mars, the god of war, had another aspect, Mars Pacifer, Mars the bringer of Peace, who is shown bearing an olive branch on coins of the later Roman Empire. From the Bible story, Noah knew he could leave the ark after the flood when a dove brought a living olive branch. Jews never gave significance to the olive branch and dove, but the early Christians gave the meaning of peace to that symbol. In 1949, Picasso's lithograph of a dove was chosen as the emblem for the world peace congress in Paris. The symbol was used in Communist demonstrations during that time. At the 1952 World Peace Congress in Berlin, Picasso's Dove was depicted in a banner above the stage. The dove symbol was used extensively in the post-war peace movement.

These three common symbols for peace have a long association with the ideals of peace. I think of something else as a peace symbol—water. Consider how many references to peace are related to water. We think of the meditative sound of a river flowing over rocks, or the sound of the waves coming to shore, or the quiet sound of rain on the roof. Water is restorative; water is essential for life. So, to me water is a symbol of finding peace within ourselves. The following song lyrics about peace were written by Kate Campbell. I love the imagery of the peaceful water in her words about finding inner peace:

We live in a world of trials and tribulations.

People filled with hatred everywhere.

So we bow our heads and we raise our voices.

Offer our petition in this prayer.

Peace come stealing slow

Fall like silent snow

Swing down sweet and low

Peace come stealing slow.

I wish us all peace and I hope that "peace comes stealing slow just like silent snow" for all of us so we can be ready for the MAKING, DOING, and GIVING AWAY of peace to the world.
