Loofahs Growing on the Vine

Luffa or loofah is a vine-grown member of the pumpkin, squash and gourd family. Yes, that little scrubby thing so popular for the shower is grown in the garden. They look lovely and provide shade on an arched trellis at Trinity Gardens.



Harvesting Loofahs

Program participants pick ripened loofahs from vines for transport to the greenhouse.



Loofah Drying in the Greenhouse

Loofahs must dry completely before preparing. After weeks of drying the loofahs are ready to process. Program participants peel the squash and shake out seeds. The loofahs are then rinsed and divided.



Making Loofahs Gift Ready

Individuals create scent and soap infused loofahs with a Glycerin Soap Base, which is measured and prepared using glycerin and food color.



Adding the Soap to Loofahs

Pieces of loofah were placed in molds. Individuals add the colored soap mixture to create the final product.

WHAT IS THE ABUNDANT LIVING FOR ALL FOUNDATION (ALFA)

MISSION: ALFA assists Trinity Services of Southwest IL to provide meaningful opportunities for adults with physical and intellectual disabilities to engage in activities that foster their physical, social and mental well-being using the resources and talents of family members, community supporters, and corporate sponsors.

ALFA is an all volunteer 501c3 organization which coordinates and funds music therapy, horticulture, art therapy, culinary, recreation, entertainment, sports, camping, boating, for adults with physical and intellectual disabilities on an on-going basis. ALFA also coordinates volunteers to maintain the joint ALFA/Trinity Services Community Supported Agriculture Program which allows Trinity program participants to engage in the planting, harvesting, packaging and delivery of produce to customers in the local area. In addition ALFA identifies and funds capital improvement needs at community integrated living facilities, day program sites and The Abilities ABA division, such as the pool, pool house, hiking trail, pavilions, swing sets, accessible deck, landscaping and community home improvements.

Trinity Concessions Serve Mascoutah Little Indians Practices

ALFA is excited to provide initial funding and support for a new program designed by Trinity Staff. The goal is to benefit Trinity program participants and build a stronger community relationship between Trinity and Mascoutah.

The plan, directed by Trinity Behavior Analyst Scott Wiggins, is to establish a Trinity Concession Stand to operate at Mascoutah Little Indians Football and Cheerleading practices. The Little Indians practice field is next to the Trinity Building on North 6th Street and the Indians use the Trinity parking lot for their events.

Scott wrote that the vision for the stand is "To build a positive relationship with the Mascoutah community, provide meaningful outcomes for Trinity clients and staff, and support local organizations."

He added" The Trinity Concession Stand is a way to meet community inclusion, individual skill development

and support for local organizations. The stand is open on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. Currently the stand sells simple snacks and drinks for \$1. Trinity staff and clients work together to sustain the stand throughout the week (getting ice for cooler, prepping snacks and supplies, setting up tent and materials, etc.). The vision is to expand the selection of snacks and drinks, provide meaningful outcomes for the people we support and disseminate the mission and vision of Trinity Services. The days of the week may change based on the schedule of the Little Indians."

Scott reports that the stand has had an excellent response from the community. ALFA will provide funds for a new sun shade, signage and inventory. Plans for the future include partnering with local businesses that sell Mascoutah merchandise such as shirts, hats and decals.

Winter Work in the Greenhouse Gives Spring Planting a Boost

Trinity staff and individuals have been busy in the greenhouse planting seeds. To date: broccoli, marigolds and butterfly weeds are ready to sprout. Stone fruit seeds, a new addition to the garden, have also been planted. This week the "to plant" list includes a variety of tomatoes and peppers. Trinity Gardeners are especial-



ly excited to see the results of the stone fruit, also known as drupes. They are fruits that have a large pit or "stone" inside, surrounded by fleshy fruit, such as peach or plum.
