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The Editor's Corner

This past April marked the 150th anniversary of the start of the Civil War. This was truly the first war in which railroads took a strategic part. Although Lincoln was a staunch railroad advocate, the North was slow in taking advantage of their rail superiority. (The North had 22,000 miles of track compared to the South's 9000 miles) It wasn't until early 1862 that Secretary of War Edwin Stanton appointed Herman Haupt as the field commander of the newly formed U.S. Military Railroad. Haupt, who had graduated from West Point at 18, had become a civil engineer and was instrumental in surveying and building the railroad across Pennsylvania that included the famous Horse Shoe Curve. From this point on the railroads became more and more involved as a strategic part of the Union offensive and Haupt is the one credited for keeping them running. One Northern commander who realized the importance of railroads was Ohioan Wm. T. Sherman, who confined his march to Atlanta along a rail line as much as possible, thus assuring an uninterrupted supply of material for his troops.

Lee on the other hand didn't seem to put much stock in the importance of railroads, probably due to the unreliability of most of the southern railroads at that time. On the other hand, Jackson recognized their potential and when his troops captured 13 locomotives at Martinsburg, West Virginia early in the war, he had all thirteen dismantled and hauled overland by forty-horse teams the 38 miles to Strasburg, Virginia. There, they were re-assembled and continued their journey to Richmond by rail. Still considered one of the major engineering feats of the war.

From time to time, over the next several months as Civil War history unravels, we will attempt to come up with other interesting railroad facts from that era.


Thoughts on the Flea Market...

That became painfully obvious when, despite excellent planning and execution, the gate numbers and as a result the revenues sagged for last year's (2010) Flea Market. So, we thought long and hard about how we were marketing the show to the public, flyer distribution to hobby shops being the bulk of our publicity/advertising effort. Flyers are and will always be a very low cost and effective tool in our arsenal. But flyers depend largely on a prospective attendee actually going to a hobby shop and seeing the flyer! In an impromptu discussion with the Division 3 Fall Show folks, it surfaced that we had, for some reason unknown to me, stopped sending post cards a few years back. Who knows exactly why and I suppose now it doesn't matter. We thought hard about it and determined that returning to direct marketing to our "target" audience was worth a try.

Anyhow, we took the entire Division 7 and Division 3 mailing list, the Division 7 "Inactive" mailing list and mailed a 28-cent post card to those folks (and anyone else we could think of) at a cost of about \$250.00. Well, I guess we got lucky because even with fewer vendor tables sold and a 50% increase in venue rent, not only did the gate increase over 50% but the "surplus" (what some call profit) increased 432% over 2010!!! Bet on it... postcards will be coming back for the fall, 2011 Cincinnati Model Railroad Show. I continue to be proud of the dedication and passion displayed by all the Division 7 members that volunteer to bring us our two major fund raising events year after year. The Division thanks you!





Big Four Depot at Sydney, Ohio

The Sydney Big Four depot will be open to the public Sunday June 11 from 10 am to 12 pm. The purpose is to let the residents of Sydney know about the depot and its status. Also, the Miami Valley Rail Fans will be having their June meeting there.

The organization is still called a Model Railroad Club however; the model layout was dismantled last year. The group is struggling to keep the station open and need new members. If the organization does not get some new revenue from donations or members, the station lease will be returned to CSX. It is certain that CSX will work to quickly demolish the station. The West Central Club has tried to negotiate a possible option to buy the station however, CSX has asked the brick station be moved back 30 feet from the rail line.

Over the years, the Miami Valley Rail Fan Club has held an annual picnic at the station and after June the club may have to terminate the lease. Anyone who can help is encouraged to send in a simple membership for associate members. Also, donations at the open house will be accepted. This is one of the last Big Four depots still intact along the former mainline from Columbus to Indianapolis.
