Even so, there are a LOT of steps. 





DIVISION 7 ZOOM MEETINGS - "JOINING" ISSUES

Some of our members are having issues joining in on our Monthly Zoom Meetings, or have never tried to do so as they think it's too difficult. Normally this is a very simple process, as you simply click on the meeting link that Bob Shreve emails to everyone, and you enter the Zoom session.

However, if you've never joined a Zoom session before, then you must first download a small bit of Zoom software (or an app if you are on a mobile device). You might be asked to do that by Zoom when you click on Bob's link, or you may instead need to first go to the **zoom.us** website and download it from there. Once you do this, you should be able to directly access current and future Zoom meetings simply by clicking on the link in Bob's emails.

Every once in a while, Zoom does an upgrade, and if your Zoom access stops working it may be because you may need to do one or both of the following –

- Re-boot (re-start) your device this is especially needed for ipads, notebooks, phones and any desktop computers you normally leave on all the time occasional rebooting also clears undesirable clutter that could be hindering your computer's functioning
- <u>Upgrade your Zoom app</u> go to the **zoom.us** website, or click on your Zoom app, and run a Zoom upgrade that may be there for you

If clicking on the meeting link that Bob emails you still doesn't work, or you need help doing any of the above, please call or email our me at 513-205-6045 and johnburchnall@gmail.com. I can usually work this out over the phone with you while you tell me what you see on your screen.

Finally, if you aren't receiving Bob's emails in the days before each meeting, then either 1) we don't have your correct or current email id, 2) we don't have any email id for you, or 3) Bob's emails are going into your spam folder. Bob's emails are the only place we share the meeting links, so you have no way to get it otherwise. Contact NMRA HQ in Tennessee, or Bob Shreve or Peter Weiglin (see masthead) to get your correct email id on file.

This should enable everyone to join in on and enjoy our monthly gatherings.

DIVISION 7 MEMBERS' "COVID19 ACTIVITIES" INEXPENSIVE LEDS AND OTHER HINTS

In my article in last months newsletter about Signaling the East Valley Sub, I mentioned a source of inexpensive LEDs. I wish to expand on these and some of the uses I have found for them on my layout.



LEDS FROM BIG LOTS

The item I refer to is in the first photo. I acquired 2 or 3 packages of these at least a couple of years ago from Big Lots, and knowing me I probably got them in the after Christmas sales so I paid even less than they are marked. I know not whether they are still available from Big Lots, but as it is a product made in China, it is probably available in similar forms with different names from various sources. This is the type of item that would also be used by crafters so a similar product is probably available from Michaels or Hobby Lobby. Don't forget to check the various "Dollar" stores as they also have bargains. It comes with a plastic battery holder that uses 3 AA batteries and has an off/on/flashing mode. These feature do not concern me as I am only interested in the LED's.

They are wired in parallel on the string. Each one draws about 5mA at a nominal 3 volts with my handy tester (more on this later) Each "bulb" is about .090" wide and about .095 long depending on how close you trim them. The LED's are coated in an epoxy covering and separated by fine plastic coated wires with about 4' between "bulbs". They have a nice "warm white" color that is perfect for the bulbs and lighting of the 50's that I model. So, how have I used them?

I have used them for locomotive headlights. Especially in F-units with the bigger lens, drill a shallow countersink into the back for the lens to help accept the convex shape of the LED (which can be filed down some), then glue in place with some canopy glue which dries clear, This is also a good all purpose adhesive you should have in your toolbox.

Before I use any LED, I always test them to make sure that they work and also to establish polarity to make hookup easy later. I have seen of all of these fancy LED testers that people have had or made and I don't think any of them match the simplicity of what I use. (See Photo #2). It is simply two AA or AAA batteries taped together with a connector wire joining the opposite poles at one end and wire extensions from the other. Since most LED's have a threshold of around 3 v DC, by touching the battery leads to the LED you can quickly determine if they work and the polarity of the leads (I use a Red Sharpie to mark +) and not worry about over driving the LED. No resistors required to test. The only time I had a problem was with some of the early ultra small LED's with a much lower voltage and current threshold. OOPs, lesson learned.


I used them as interior building lights in my roundhouse. I cut off a bulb as close as I could using sharp fine edge cutters like rail nippers and ran the leads though the opening of the lampshades (see photo #3). I used Miniatronic #72-110-10 brass lampshades with a dab of canopy glue to hold them together. I then wired them to two buss wires of .012 or .015 brass or phosphor bronze wire that were strung along the building structure (Photo # 4) with wires fed underneath to power. I adjusted the brightness with a resistor.

They are also useful for general building lighting.

I think most modelers are always on the lookout to adapt products to model railroad use and this is a good example of that.

(Cover Photo). In 1952, Union Pacific received 10 Standard 4,500 hp gas turbines numbered 51 to 60. The Athearn model represents number 55 in 1955, after UP painted the trucks Aluminum and added the aux. tender. The engine is sound equipped and is just as noisy as the prototype.

UP went back to GE in 1954 and ordered 15 more 4,500 hp turbines. These are the Veranda turbines, numbered 61 to 75. Number 61 represents the as-built configuration with gray trucks.

The turbines were not regular visitors to Denver and are too new for my1950 layout but, they're good runners and represent a unique era in UP motive power.

On March 29, 2021 former Cincinnati Division 7 NMRA member Bill Edwards succumbed to a multitude of health issues. He had been in and out of assisted living since August of 2019. Bill was 75 years old, and a retired railroad inspector for the Norfolk and Southern Railroad. He is survived by his wife, Patti and other immediate relatives and close friends.

Bill was an outstanding modeler and clinician, who was well known both locally and nationally for his entertaining clinics on scenery, weathering, scratch-building and other topics. Bill and his fellow modeler Paul Godwin presented numerous clinics during the very popular series of clinics sponsored by the former Tim's Trains & Hobbies Shop in Covington, Kentucky.

Cincinnati Division 7 member Bruce Knapp was a close friend of Bill's and enjoyed doing clinics with him, often being the target of Bill's humor! Bill was also a popular presenter for many years when Cincinnati Division 7 conducted live "how-to" clinics at our annual Fall Model Train Show.

Years ago, Bill helped found the Black Diamond Lines model railroad club, now based in Ross, Ohio. Bill is also credited with developing the "puff ball" model tree making method that is so prevalent in the hobby today. A visitation and memorial service took place on April 6, 2021 at Spring Grove Funeral Home - Reading. Bill is interred at Highland Cemetery in Ft. Mitchell, KY.

The N&W Y-3 2-8-8-2 was painted with a new motor, decoder and lights installed; Ditto for the Texas & Pacific 2-10-4.

A DM&IR S-7 0-10-2 arrived. One of the few engines that I've been looking to purchase.

C&O M-1 steam turbine: very unusual engine 2-D-2 + 2-D-2. I've installed a decoder in the engine so it has the turbine sound. Also, added extra weight and, so far, it easily pulled 30 cars.

UP M-10,000 4 car set. The first streamline diesel train set. Two decoders were installed in this engine. One front (sound) and one rear (no sound).

ACL 4-8-4: A two tone black and grey.

I've moved all my vintage metal Athearn/Varney and wood Silver Streak/Ambroid freight cars to Seattle, so freight drags will dominate, plus passenger trains of your choice.

NEW PROJECTS:

Installed decoders in several more engines. A selection of 50 engines can now be done. Began installing hardware needed to, remotely, control turnouts via the track schematic on the PC's monitor screen: Along with the signaling system, this is also LCC.

Most testing done with passenger trains seems to be ending, as the longer passenger cars are about twice the length of a regular freight car and pose different problems, but they seem to be finally resolved.

New vintage metal Athearn/Varney and wood Silver Streak/Ambroid freight cars have been tested, and are working well over the mainline.

Finished adding the last tunnel portals that I failed to do, 40 years ago.

Got to do some PM on 3-4 engines.

New passenger yard completed.

The signaling system using LCC is complete along with monitor showing train positions on the layout.

Mission Statement: Main theme of my railroad (besides modeling the Great Northern Railway): when building the railroad, I wanted to model mainline running with big time steam and 'scale like' trains of 25-45 cars on single track mainline with passing sidings.

The GNRW has been updated to handle DCC operations.

As I used to do in the 80's and 90's, should you have a DCC engine, you may bring it to operate on the GNRW.

Seattle freight yard: 14 tracks, 550 car capacity.

Seattle roundhouse: 24 stalls

St. Paul freight yard: 12 tracks, 420 car capacity

USUAL STATS:

Time: 1938. All steam and electrics. The GN railway is a point to point railroad, 400' mainline with two 400-500 car yards at Seattle, Wash and St Paul, Minn, each having 20+ track turntables and one staging yard holding 300 cars. Minimum radius, 48" with #10 turnouts; Track all hand laid on individual wooden ties. 100% scenery.

Four track 12' ore dock.

Interface railroads: NP, SP&S, Milwaukee, DM&IR, UP, SP, D&RGW, SF and CN.

Ross Central Clubs Losing Their Space

A number of our members belong to one (or more) of the clubs that collectively are referred to as Ross Central, as they all had spaces on the third floor in the old Ross Schools Administration Building. In a note from the superintendent of the Ross Local Schools dated April 27, 2021, all of the remaining clubs were asked to move out by May of 2022 to allow the schools to remodel the building back into classrooms. The impacted clubs include:

- The Cincinnati Hi Railers (O scale)
- Ross Rails (HO scale)
- Black Diamond Lines (HO scale)
- Cincinnati Northern (HO scale)

This follows on the required departures of two other clubs that were asked to vacate spaces on the first floor. They were notified on January 30th and had to be out by March 1, 2021. These were:

- Cincinnati Sipping and Switching Society (HO scale)
- Queen City N-Gineers (N-scale) (QCN also had to vacate their third floor space)

Attempts have been made in the past by the various clubs to locate alternate space (as a result of a rumored plan to tear down the building), without much success. That search will have to begin again. If any Division 7 member knows of any vacant spaces that might be available (at no more than nominal cost), please get that information to any member of the listed clubs.

Division 7 had visited these layouts multiple times in the past, typically after monthly meetings at the Senior Center in Hamilton. They were all open for visits as part of our 2018 Regional Convention. And the school had worked with the clubs to put on a flea market for several years, an event that normally preceded our Spring Flea Market by a week or two. For all of these reasons, we will all be impacted by this development.





KNAPP'S NOTES

The Raton Pass

I spent 5 "fun filled" (?) days at Christ Hospital: I thought I was having a stroke. After a very cold ride with the Miami Heights EMS (seriously these folks are excellent), I checked into the Christ Hospital Emergency Room, where I got the usual battery of tests (CT scan, MRI, EEG, plus meeting several new doctors). The final decision was I did not have a stroke; I am in the early stages of Parkinson's (oh joy). I am on a new medication and all seems to be well.

I now know why I was having problems with motivation and energy. I am starting to feel a little bit more motivated and really want to get back to working on the layout. Zach Riggins was out last Friday to see what had been done and what is planned. Both Zach and Chuck Endreola are after me to work on the track plan for the pass. The pass will include the town of Starkville, the coal mine at Morley, Colorado, the Wooten Ranch, and the state line tunnels. Since I am modeling 1951, both tunnels will be in use.

Currently, I am still working on the engine facilities at Trinidad. I am moving some of the functions from La Junta to Trinidad. That means moving the locomotive double-heading and "through passenger" cars to Trinidad. I will get to use John Altshool's roundhouse, plus a Walther's 130-foot turntable. The doubling was done at La Junta, Colorado and Lamy, New Mexico. There is a coaling tower in Trinidad, but it got extraordinarily little use; by 1951 Raton Pass was largely oil-fired power. I will use a few older 2-10-2's to justify the coaling tower.

I realize I have a huge amount of work just to finish Trinidad. I plan to use 2" foamboard for the elevated portions of the pass. The current plan is to finish the locomotive facility at Trinidad, finish wiring the yards for DCC. When (and if) that gets finished this spring, we can start the grade to Starkville.

So far, my crew includes Pat Homan, Chuck Endreola, Zach Riggins, Keith Corman, and Merlyn Jarman, plus a volunteer I had at the last meeting.

At one of Bill Edwards clinics two years ago, he made mention that all you needed to model the Southwest was a 4 by 8 sheet of plywood and plenty of sand! Sorry, Bill, we are going to plant (thanks to Chuck) about 125+ trees. That is what is happening in North Bend. I may actually send photos next month!
