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

HEADLIGHTS

Well, here we are in November, better known to us as Model Railroad Month. The warm weather seemed to hang around longer than usual this year, but I think the temperatures are finally starting to feel more like autumn. Maybe my grass will stop growing now so the lawnmower can get a rest.

The 47th Cincinnati Model Train Show is in the history books. Thanks to Rick Crumrine for another fine job organizing the show and Roy Hord for handling the vendor registrations and the physical layout of the show. Randy Kerka did a great job in his rookie year of handling the publicity. Randy also manages our "past attendee" database. This year we sent out about 5500 postcards to encourage repeat attendance at the show. This year we went back to utilizing yard signs to help publicize the show. Due to the wording on the signs, they are intended to be displayed only during the week before the show, and can be reused each year. John Burchnall organized a team of people to place the signs in strategic locations and then pick them up after the show.

The weather on Friday made for a wet evening of setup activities, but at least it wasn't too cold. Back when we were doing the train show at Cincinnati Gardens, I worked the traffic control outside the back door. (Remember when we could let the vendors drive into the building to unload?) When I got there in the afternoon one year, the sun was shining and it was reasonably comfortable. As the afternoon progressed, the temperature kept dropping. The clouds rolled in and it went from sunshine to rain to sleet to accumulating snow. Compared to that night, the weather we had this year on Friday night wasn't so bad.

Fortunately, there were plenty of members there on Friday evening to help the vendors get their stuff into the building. I think the assistance our members provide during the set-up and take-down is something that really sets our show apart from others and is always greatly appreciated by the vendors.

During the show, the people working the membership booth were very active, with four people signing up for the six month trial membership. The vendors I talked to were pleased with their sales on Saturday, while Sunday was a bit slower, as it usually is. The weather was nicer on Saturday and Sunday, so that probably affected our attendance. Several people noted there seemed to be more families in attendance this year. Financially, the results of the show should be close to budget. Thanks to all of our members who helped make this year's train show a success.

The Fall Mid Central Region BOD meeting was held in late September. Among the items discussed was a new structure kit project. The structure is intended to be a one room brick schoolhouse. However, its basic rectangular shape should make it usable for a variety of purposes. The kit is lasercut wood with a brick paper overlay. The kit should be available before the 2015 regional convention in HO, S, and O scale.

Speaking of the 2015 convention, next year's regional convention is shaping up to be a great event. The convention will be May 14 – 17 in Lexington Kentucky at the Campbell House hotel. The hotel is currently being completely renovated. The room rate will be very reasonable at \$99 per night. On-line registration is now open at http://thoroughbredlimited2015.yolasite.com.

On a planning note, the next Division 7 BOD meeting will be December 5th. Location to be finalized soon.

The October meeting was on Sunday October 5th, at the West Chester Library. Our clinicians were John Burchnall, Brad Jonas, and Mike Tener, who gave a presentation on making Roadbed. They compared a number of purchased products to a range of creative uses of alternative materials that can be repurposed to make roadbed. After the meeting, we visited Brad Jonas' HO layout under construction and Ric Case's HO East Broad Top.

The regular meeting was a week earlier than usual because the second weekend in October was this year's Annual Cincinnati Model Train Show on the 11th and 12th at Lakota West High School. In spite of the rain during set up on Friday, the show was an enjoyable event as usual. As I write this, I have not heard any attendance reports, but my discussions with dealers on Sunday seemed to indicate that they were happy.

In November, we will make our normal visit to Hamilton, on November 9th. The meeting venue is the Partners in Prime (formerly known as the Hamilton Senior Center). Dick Briggs, from Columbus, will be here to give a clinic on the paperwork and procedures involved in entering NMRA model contests. As several of our members have been multiple time winners, clearly some of this knowledge is known to our area; but for many of us who have not taken the step to build models expressly (or even partially) for others to judge, this may be the incentive to take our modeling out for viewing by others. And conversely, if you do not have the competitive bug, *our* contests in November will be models of railroad vehicles and photos of bridges. After the meeting we will be visiting Ed Bley's Pennsylvania RR and Bob Ampulski's two layouts (indoor and outdoor). And of course, there is the Whistle Stop club in the basement of the Senior Center, which will be open for viewing as well.

Looking on down the tracks, we will end the year as we usually do, at the Westwood United Methodist Church, on December 14th. This will be our annual pot luck digital photo show and food fest. The contest topics are models of anything; and photos of locomotives. The layout visits will be to Terry Judd's new N scale layout in Westwood and to Jack Sibert's HO layout in Cleves.

In January, we will be at Hyde Park United Methodist Church. Our clinician in January will be Peter Weiglin. His topic is the story of the Harvey Houses and the Santa Fe. We will be visiting Frank Fieler's layout and one more to be confirmed. The contest topics in January are models of repurposed railroad cars and photos of the same subject. In February we will be back at the West Chester library again, with Allen McClelland giving us his latest V&O clinic. The contest topics are models, and photos, of cabooses. Then in March, it is the annual Flea Market and Swap Meet at Lakota Freshman School (and therefore no regular meeting).

After a week to recover, I can look back and appreciate another fine Cincinnati Model Train Show. As a member of one of the clubs that display a layout at the Show, this is always a focus for our activity this time of year. And it is an exhausting exercise. Our group started at the club room in Ross about 1:00, and left Lakota on Friday night at 10:30. Then we were back at about 8:30 on Saturday morning to finish getting everything ready. Then we had to man the display for the 6 hours of operation each day; followed by another 4 hours to tear down, haul out, transport, and haul back in to our space at Ross.

Our reward to ourselves is a group dinner afterwards (usually at Quaker Steak, this year at Logan's Road House). It's a lot of work, but it's worth it; and as I think about it, that's for two related reasons that I suspect many of you will recognize. First, as a group we get to be together doing what we enjoy, a combination of running trains, talking about trains, and yes shopping for trains. One can do this alone, without anyone else knowing; but it's just better as part of a group. And the second reason is we get to talk to the people that come by to look and ask questions and share their interest in trains and models. The kids are wonderful, and they remind me that this hobby reignites that sense of delight in me still. The more I do, and the more I learn, the more I find to enjoy.

I had a business colleague from Germany in town over the weekend, so I invited him to the Show and spent about 90 minutes showing him around and explaining how we do this event. And maybe not surprisingly, he had trains as a kid too. It's a common bond that I recognize is part of why I'm still in this hobby after almost 60 years. It connects me to a lot of other people, who would appear to have little in common, until the subject of model trains provides the connection.

October 2014 Car Projects Report

Our 2014 car project, Virginian & Ohio USRA 2-bay hoppers, by Accurail, in four numbers, are priced at \$18 for singles, and \$70 for a four-car set, plus Ohio sales tax. They will be offered for sale at our October meeting, through our Company Store. We have sold 288 cars during the first 7 months, 80% through mail order sales. We have 213 car kits available.

Our 2013 car project, Merchants Despatch Transportation's 40' ice reefers, by Accurail, in wood or all-steel versions, are offered in two numbers for each type of reefer, and are priced at \$18 for singles, and \$70 for a four-car set, plus Ohio sales tax. We have sold 354 cars during the past 16 months, and have 148 car kits available.

Our 2012 car project, Allegheny Midland 41'-6" steel gondolas, by Accurail, are offered in three numbers, priced at \$18 for singles, and \$51 for a three-car set, plus Ohio sales tax. We have sold 263 cars during the past 28 months. We have 128 car kits available. We will be mailing postcards to buyers who have bought the AM 70-ton triple hoppers in the past, to stimulate sales of the remaining car kits.

I will be sharing Allen McClelland's tables to sell V&O USRA hoppers at the Division 3 Train Show in Dayton, on Saturday, November 1st.






