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

HEADLIGHTS

Summer is in the mirror and we are heading into fall. To model railroaders, fall means train show season.

As you read this, the signs advertising our show on October 14th and 15th should be popping up all over the northern suburbs. Roy Hord reported at the last BOD meeting that 65% of the tables had been sold as of early September. I'm sure that number is much higher now. Frank Koch will be running his usual white elephant sale where people who have a "less than table load" of items to sell can convert their unneeded stuff into someone else's treasures. You will have another opportunity to sign up for one of the jobs at the show (set-up, take-down, admissions, membership booth, etc.) at the meeting on October 8th. Rick Crumrine is planning some special activities celebrating our 50th consecutive show. Remember you get one of the commemorative "50th Show" shirts when you work at the show.

Elsewhere in this issue of the *Oil Can* the nominating committee has published their slate of nominees for the upcoming election. Per our division regulations additional nominations (with appropriate petitions) can be made from the floor at the October meeting. My thanks to Peter Weiglin, Roy Hord, and Merlyn Jarman for serving on the nominating committee.


Each month you should be receiving 2 communications from the local division. You should receive an Email with that month's issue of the *Oil Can*. You should also receive an orange postcard detailing the location of the division meeting for that month. If you are not receiving both of these items each month, then the NMRA National office is missing part of your contact information. Remember to keep your Email address on file with the National office up to date (or supply one if you haven't done so previously) so you can receive all the latest information from both the national office and the local division. NMRA national elections and other information distribution will be increasingly conducted electronically instead of via physical mail. If the NMRA national office doesn't have your current Email address, you could be missing out on a lot of useful information.

I didn't provide my review of the Orlando National Convention last month due to space limitations so here it is. My family and I stayed at a Wyndham resort located close to the Disney parks, so I had a 20 minute or so commute to get to the convention hotel each day. I found the convention hotel to be a very nice facility. The food at the restaurant I frequented was reasonably priced and very good quality.

Unlike John Shields, I spent all my convention time going to clinics and checking out the other activities at the hotel. Prior to the convention, I had contacted Gerry Leone from the NMRA National office in response to a notice he had in one of the NMRA eBulletins requesting help recording some of the clinics at the convention. The intent is to add these to the clinic recordings available to NMRA members on the National web site. Three of us responded to his request. I ended up recording nine clinics. Some were using just my camera, while most were shot using 2 cameras where I partnered with one of the other guys. One of us would concentrate on the clinician, while the other camera stayed on the slide screen. One limitation I have with my camera is that it can only use its own internal microphone. The cameras the other guys were using had inputs for external microphones, so they were using wireless lapel mics to get better sound pickup from the clinician. It will be interesting to see how these come out after Gerry Leone edits our raw video. I had a fun time doing the recording and I'll probably offer to do it again next year. I already signed up for the 2018 convention in Kansas City. I might look for a different camera, though that supports an external mic input.

That's all for this month. See you at the meeting on the 8th, or the train show the following weekend.





SECOND SECTION

Our September meeting on the 10th was held at the Anderson Senior Center on Beechmont. Ron Pearson presented a clinic on the coal mines along the East Broad Top. Ron not only has tracked down pictures of most of these mines, but the history of them and how they operated. And, of course, he also has built beautiful models of them! I was interested to find out that the coal company actually imported coal from other mines to use for blending with its own production to deliver various specifications that its customers required. I would never have thought of bringing coal TO a mine as part of operations. After the meeting we visited John Listermann's B&O and Rick Crumrine's Waynesburg & Washington (Pennsylvania) layouts. It was neat to see the addition starting to take shape on Rick's layout.

Looking ahead:

Our next meeting, on October the 8th, we will be across the river in Northern Kentucky, meeting at the Kenton County Library branch in Erlanger. Our clinician for October will be Dan Finfrock. He will be talking about the B&O branch from New Miami to Middletown - "A Railroad You Can Model". After the meeting, we will visit Tom Vogt's HO layout in Fort Wright and Perry Simpson's HO L&N in Independence.

The following weekend, October 14th and 15th, is our 50th Annual Cincinnati Model Train Show at Lakota West High School. There will be a number of special features this year to help celebrate this landmark year.

For November (on the 12th), we will have a joint meeting with Dayton Division 3. The meeting will be at the Sycamore Medical Center in Miamisburg. This is located on State Route 725, just west of I-75 (State Route 725 is the Dayton Mall exit). We have a special clinician for this meeting - Stephen Priest, MMR and the editor of *Railroad Model Craftsman*. Both Divisions plan to have their raffles, so bring a little extra money and double your chances by getting in *both*. Layout visits after the meeting will include Bob Lawson's and Greg Simpson's HO layouts (from our Division) and Wes Reece's HO Virginia Southern (from Dayton).

We will end the year with our December meeting on 12/10. This will be at Westwood United Methodist Church. We will have our traditional pot luck slide/digital photo/ video show and snackfest. Layouts open after the meeting will be Michael Shannon's HO layout and Randy Seiler's HO layout.

In January, we will be back again in Kenwood on the 14th at Good Shepherd Lutheran. In February (2/11), we will be at West Chester library, with clinician Tom Ford giving a presentation on C&O Maintenance of Way Motorcars. And on Saturday March 10th, we will have our annual Flea Market at Lakota West Freshman School.

Now that summer is over, it is time to head back to the basement. Its Model Railroading season! It doesn't feel much like Fall yet, but you know it is when John Burchnall comes looking for volunteers to put the yard signs out and Rick Crumrine has the sign-up sheets for all the volunteer jobs that need to be filled to pull off another Fall Train Show. As mentioned above, this is our 50th Annual Show! This is an accomplishment that we all should be proud of. It says a lot about our model railroading community here that we have been able to sustain the effort it takes to pull this off every year. I think we sometimes take it for granted that this is "just what we do". But it really is pretty unique across all of the NMRA. Internally, we may be focused on this event being important to sustaining **our** programs (without having to charge local dues); but what we really are celebrating is the fact that we have been bringing the joy of model railroading to our thousands of attendees every year for all of these years! Think about it. A ten year old who attended that first show may be bringing his or her grand-children to this one! Four, or even five, generations of some families may have been to our shows. How better to accomplish the goal of promoting the hobby of model railroading. If you have not signed up to volunteer, contact Rick Crumrine and get on one of his lists. Everyone who volunteers will get a special anniversary T-shirt. (but you need to do it soon in order to get the shirt before the show)

I hope to see you in Erlanger on October the 8th.

Statement from Superintendent Candidate John Shields:

I am currently serving as your Assistant Superintendent, and ask for your support to be the next Division Superintendent.

I have been an NMRA Member since 1994. Past president and currently secretary/treasurer of the Queen City N-Gineers modular railroad club. Member of the B&O Railroad Historical Society and of the N&W Railway Historical Society. Modeler since ~1961, having started as an "assistant" to my Dad in the building and operating of his HO scale Queen & Crescent RR (which was on the home layout tours at the 1966 National Convention here in Cincinnati). Switched to N Scale in 1968. Primary modeling period – 1955-1960. Primary modeling interest – B&O.

Native Cincinnatian. Graduate of University of Cincinnati College of Engineering, retired from Procter and Gamble after 38 years in 2015. Married to Marsha W. Shields for 33 years. Marsha died in 2016. One son, Larry (33), graduate of Ohio University, former reporter for WCPO channel 9, and news operations manager at WXIX channel 19; now the communications director for the St. Vincent de Paul Society in Cincinnati.

After four years as secretary, and four years as assistant super; working diligently with Mr. Kerka and Mr. Shreve and the rest of the great leadership of your Division, I want to continue to improve the NMRA experience for you, the members; first by delivering a great MCR Convention, and then by continuing our traditional monthly and yearly events, and by finding new ways to promote our hobby in our area.

Statement from Assistant-Superintendent Candidate Kevin Orcutt:

I am hoping to be the Division's next Assistant Superintendent. I'm a fourth generation model railroader. My Mother's Grandfather and my Father's Father were both some of the original/charter members of the New York Society of Model Engineers group. Some of my earliest memories are of Model Trains, dating back to Lionel trains in the basement, right alongside of my Dad's HO layout. That started a life-long fascination with Trains, both model and the 1:1 stuff that I enjoy railfanning.

The loop didn't last too long and I found out the Lionel and sandboxes don't mix too well... After we left that first basement, we moved to SC where our house didn't have a basement. After a while, Dad had an addition built onto the back of the house to host his layout. I remember helping him build the benchwork and other things. We moved again, this time up to Upstate New York. where We did have a basement to have fun in. Before either my Dad or I started anything downstairs, Dad acquired a 4x8 layout from someone at his work for me to start with. I did learn quite a bit on that one, especially in terms of electronics, needless to say, live 120v and aluminum control panels are a bad combination, ask me about it sometime! I finally started my own layout down in a corner of our basement. It had a couple of towns, along with a hidden staging yard, and a connection over to my Dad's larger layout. This one lasted me through the High School years. I do remember doing some modeling in college.

Then came my Army years. My modeling dropped off a bit, but I still remember finding a hobby shop close by out in Monterey were I found a nice little building kit. It was one of my first wooden kits, and I still have it today. While overseas, I didn't do much modeling, but found it interesting to find an EMD SD7 serving the South Korean Railway system. When I came back, I was stationed at Ft Meade Maryland. While there I found out one of the premier Model Railroad shows around. The Timonium shows, held four times a year. Somehow I got hooked up with the Show's Organizer - Howard Zane. Found out that he was only about 10 minutes away from where I lived, so I soon became a regular member of his work crew. All I can say is "Wow." He is a great character, and that is some layout!

I worked on that for quite a few years before I moved to the Cincinnati area. I remember one night Howard gathered all of us around and said he had something for us. He then proceeded to hand out little bronze cards that granted us Lifetime pass to the Timonium shows. Just a few months before I moved out here, I came out and went with my Dad to my first NMRA National Convention up in Madison. I remember meeting Allen McClelland for the first time up there and becoming a V&O Historical Society member.

Once I moved out here, I think my Dad was Treasurer of the Division at the time, I quickly started attending meetings and started some of my volunteering with the Division. I remember helping Dad with the Monthly raffle when he ran it. I remember starting to help out with our Fall show. It was at the Cincinnati Gardens when I first came out here... I volunteered to help Rick Crumrine out on the Show's committee. That's when it moved over to the Kentucky Convention Center. I worked with Roy Hord and used a CAD program to arrange the tables. Great fun.

A little later on, I remember the BOD meeting in Gerry Albers' crew lounge where the Division decided to enter our bid to host the 2005 National. Just a short five years later, I enjoyed meeting every Saturday from January up to right before the Convention working with Roy again, Jim Hodde, Jim Stewart, and my Dad handling all of the Convention registration activities. I think it was some of the activities at our National Convention that got me really hooked onto the Operations side of things. I've really enjoyed operating on some of this area's finest layouts. More recently, picked up the Video lending Library for the Division. With all that, it may be time for me to serve in a more Official type of role. That's why I'm asking for your vote to allow me to serve as your next Assistant Superintendent.



This is also true for all of you who step up every year and volunteer to handle Admissions, Setup and Takedown efforts. There are many other jobs as well, including getting out the show fliers, post cards, road side signs and other little but important jobs.

This year as we celebrate our 50th Model Train Show so we are handing out gold shirts to our volunteers with a logo celebrating this monumental anniversary. Every volunteer gets a shirt. We are estimating we will need about forty shirts. Forty volunteers, wow, that is why we have been successful. Thank you.



Motivating My Muse

Today is September 20th (it won't be, when you read this), which is the date our "Oil Can" editor set to have our articles submitted. The beauty of a publishing deadline is simply motivation to lazy writers. (I am the exception, of course). So here I sit at the computer trying to be creative, thought-provoking, and of course, humorous.

All of us executive-types, share our monthly wisdom with you, backed up by a team of learned editors. I am blessed to have Mike Brestel, a college English major, and John Burchnall, who made a career of communication at Procter and Gamble. Both these gentlemen make sure my I's are dotted and my T's are crossed. (plus my thoughts are very provoking, and can be read in mixed company).

My major sources for "Knapp's Notes" are *Model Railroad News*, my many years in the hobby, and of course, my Hennie Youngman Joke Book. I try to highlight activities within our Division, new products, and just things I find interesting. No copy of "Knapp's Notes" would be complete without a tip-of-the-hat to my fellow WMPA modelers, and the occasional warning to the un-initiated Appalachian modeler. So, now on to my latest Pulitzer Prize entry:

Words of Wisdom (?)

I quickly discovered my Raton Pass is more than a major project -- it's a commitment. I am still making modifications to the track plan to enhance operation. I have a great majority of the published track plan books and read every article on track planning. Initially, I chose the Raton Pass, because I really enjoy passenger operation; the Pass was Santa Fe's major passenger route to California. I chose 1951 because steam was still king on the Raton Pass, plus the Santa Fe handled a majority of the Korean War traffic. The traffic was a combination of civilian travel, freight, and war materials.

I am modeling summer of 1951, so I have several sections of all the prestigious "Name Trains". All traffic over the Pass needed helpers, which were provided by the Santa Fe's dependable 3800 class 2-10-2's. The two major towns are Trinidad, CO and Raton, NM, with Starkville and the coal mines at Morley, CO also modeled. Much of the industrial switching will be at both Trinidad and Raton, while Starkville will have cattle pens and a team track. Freight on the line will be a combination of war traffic, through freights, plus traffic generated along the line.

The mines at Morley will generate coal traffic (empties in, loads out), plus the area generated a lot of live-stock shipping. Local industries in the two major towns complete the need for the railroad. The Santa Fe interchanged with the Colorado & Southern (C.B.&Q.), plus the Colorado and Wyoming (on my model, The Cimarron Northern).

I am planning to use at least three road crews, two yard crews, and a dispatcher. I find I am going to need a fairly large work group to augment the current "Sunday Afternoon Boys" --- if you are interested, see me at the Fall Show. I am afraid our first project will be clearing out (read that shovel out) the train room.

Real Railroads

Part of the fun of layout planning is the research that goes into the overall layout. The history, the location, and the traffic patterns all make the prototype, and ultimately the model, tell a story of a place and time in America's transportation history. There is a wealth of published material, plus photographs and videos of the railroad. I have traveled the line several times, and have a huge collection of pictures that document the area. Ultimately my Raton Pass will be my salute to a time and place that are special to me.


