General Grant marveled as he moved thousands of troops at a dizzying 30 miles an hour. A graceful high wheel woodburner belching smoke and sparks, was the hero of the hour and a catalyst for the future.

The Axis powers struck brutal blows on a sleepng giant. Private enterprise and a huge but untested industrial base rose to meet the challenge. It all came together.
