sang sweet and low.



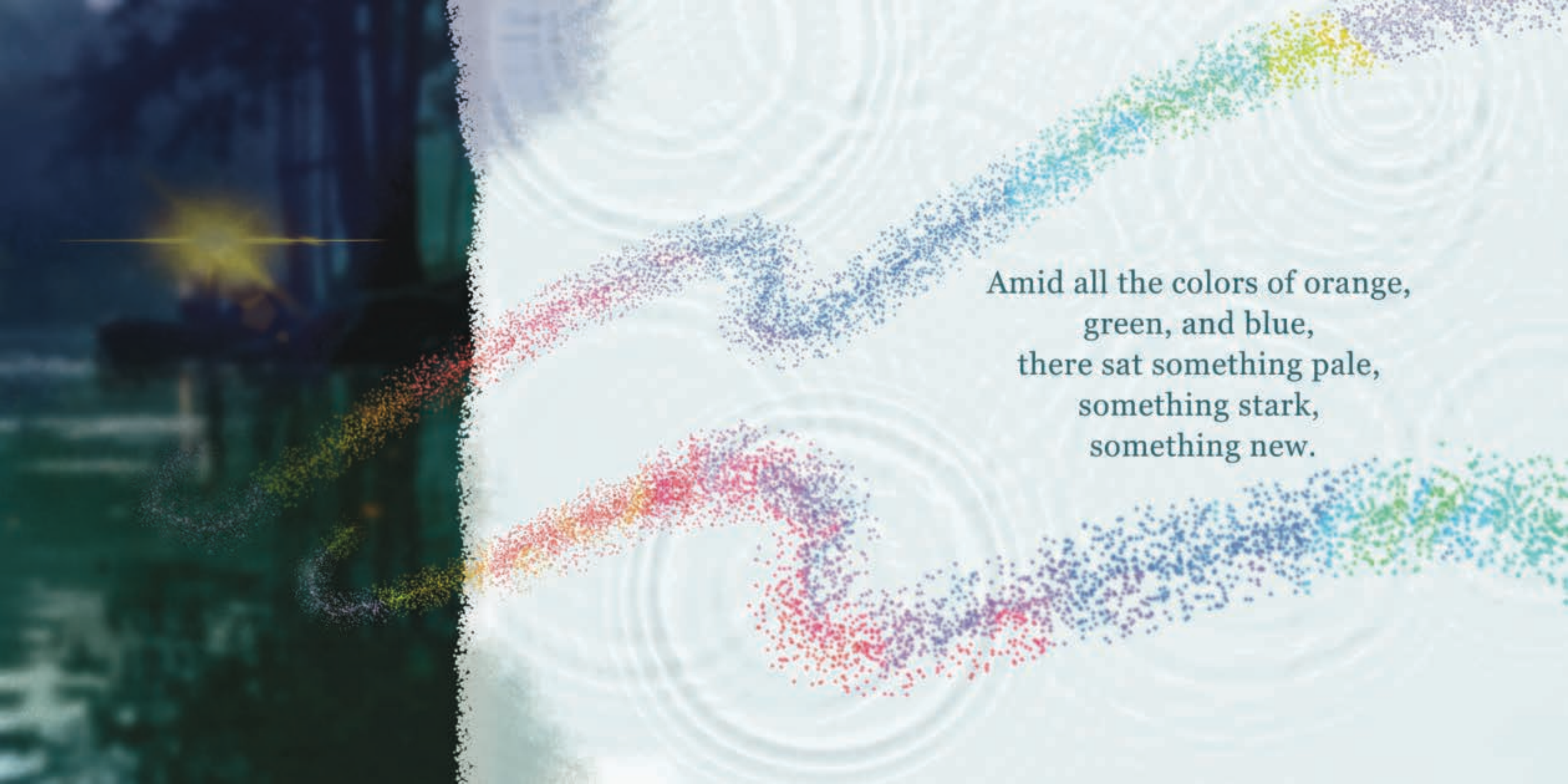

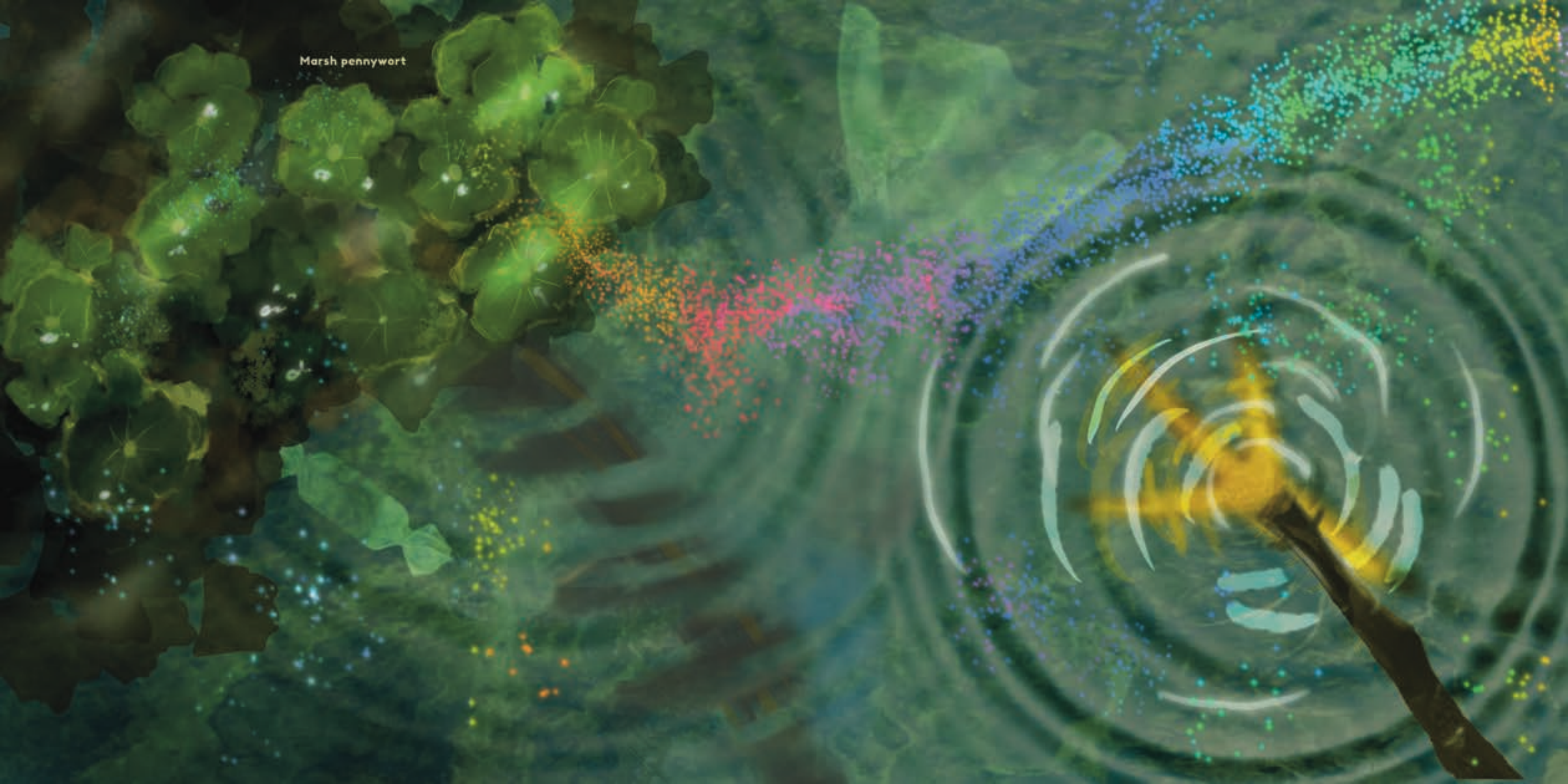
But just as she stood near calm
water's shore...

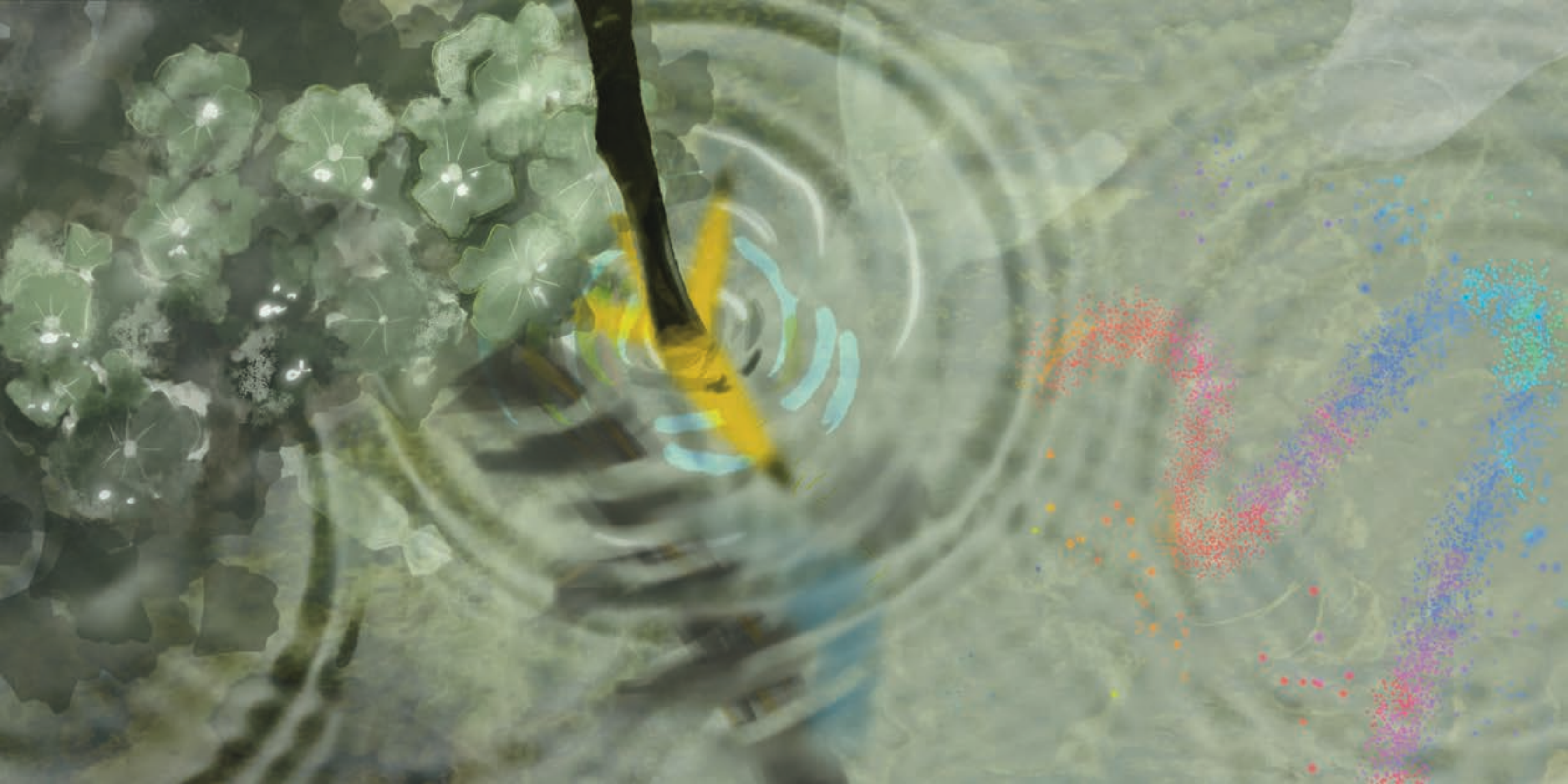
A quiet disturbance she could

And whispers returned with the rustling reed.

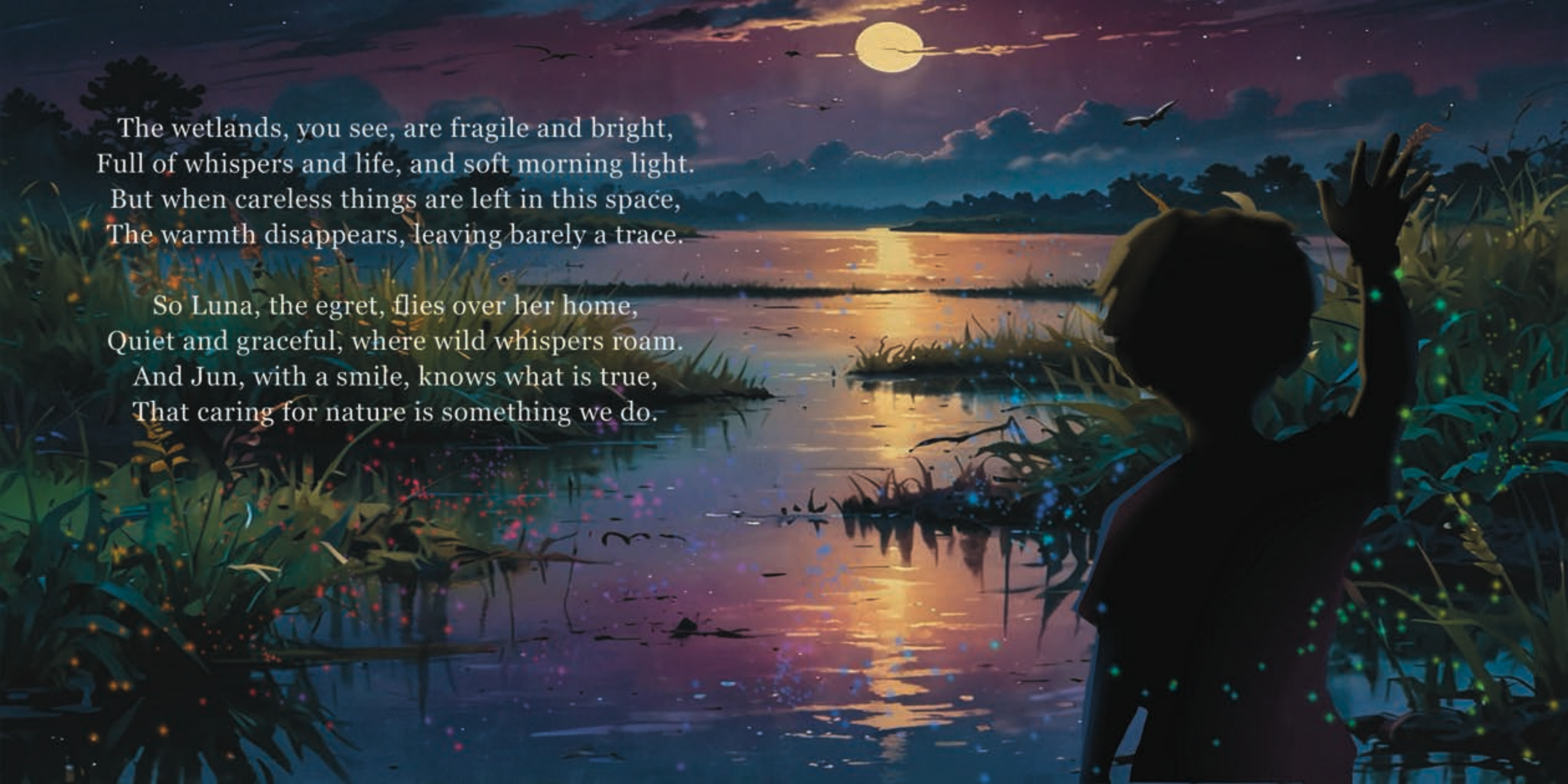
The flowers stood tall, the grasses did sway,

more about THE RIDGWAY'S RAIL:



Unique Nesting

Ridgway's rails build floating nests! These nests are anchored to marsh plants like cordgrass and move with the tides, keeping the eggs safe from rising and falling water.

Secretive Bird

This bird is very elusive and prefers to stay hidden in dense marsh vegetation, making it one of the hardest marsh birds to spot!

Endangered Status

The Ridgway's rail is endangered, primarily due to habitat loss from urban development, pollution, and invasive plant species that threaten the marshes where it lives.

Excellent Swimmers

Unlike many birds, Ridgway's rails are strong swimmers. They use their legs to paddle through water, often moving stealthily to escape predators.

Diet Variety

These birds have a varied diet that includes insects, small fish, crustaceans, and even seeds, making them adaptable marsh dwellers.

Distinctive Call

Knowns for a loud, clattering call, the Ridgway's rail uses its voice to communicate across the marshes, especially during the breeding season.
