

02. WHAT I HEARD

CLIENT CRITERIA


- **Specificity** is important
- Context is critical
- Make sure that the **individuals** that you're talking about are the **center of the narrative voice**
- Show, Don't Tell in order to convey the full story
- Time, Continuity and Change: not only contemporary or past, but tell the full story and give necessary context
- Carefully consider the vetting of your resources
- a lot of complexity in the difference of experiences
- Trust and relationships must be prioritized
- Always strive for empathy and allyship in correcting misinformation

- Refer to people and cultures by their native nation and/or tribe name
- Be sure to balance the artifact narratives with contemporary first-person counter narrative
- Stay away from narratives that have been often repeated- highlight a new story or view
- Make sure there are areas for educators and school **groups** to gather around content
- Avoid categorizing POVs in broad sweeps- there is Provide opportunities for individuals to see themselves within elements of the narrative to inspire empathy and relatability

• Use of first person narrative is important

05. SUBJECT

NATIVE FOOD SOVEREIGNTY

Food sovereignty is defined as a community having the ability to choose those foods they will use to sustain themselves and their culture. Due to the multiple atrocities committed against Native people following the European colonization of their homelands, they have been disproportionately affected by loss of food sovereignty. This loss has negatively impacted not only Native people's access to crucial pieces of their culture, heritage and spirituality, but it has also led to a crisis of health and well-being and a disproportionate amount of health problems and chronic illness in Native communities

'The Creator's Creed' will be an interactive exhibition that highlights the issues surrounding the Haudenosaunee people's loss of food soveriegnty and amplifies the incredible movement of resilience that has followed. In addition to teaching about both traditional and modern Haudenosaunee philosophy, agriculture and cuisine, the exhibition will serve to educate people about how they can support the incredible organizations working to restore and reclaim lost lands, ingredients, recipes and cultural knowledge without infringing upon spaces that are not theirs to claim.






10. BUBBLE FLOOR PLAN




11. EXHIBIT EMOTION MAP

LEARN

- About the multiple **atrocities** committed against Native people
- How land displacement and forced boarding school enrollment has negatively affected Native health, well-being and culture

EXPERIENCE

- A noticeable lack of smell
- **Decrease of color** and sensory rich information
- **Empathy** for survivors and victims of the atrocities committed against Native people
- Gravity of the loss of food sovereignty and it's consequences
- A strong urge to help those affected

- **Create empathy** by attaching faces, names and personal stories to information about the food sovereignty movement





- Feel **called to further action** supprting these orgs







DO


- Work as a team (or alone) to **pass the spoon** handle all the way around the edge of the dish to activate video





23. PRELIMINARY SOCIAL ACTION APPROACH

The Creator's Creed exhibition aims to not only educate and shift visitor's perspectives about Native food sovereignty, but to create real and lasting change outside the walls of the museum.

For this reason, visitors will be provided two opportunities to extend the experience beyond the exhibition. The first will be an opportunity for immediate action in the form of donation to an important organization in the Native food sovereignty movement such as NAFSA, NAAF, or the Intertribal Agriculture Council.

The second opportunity will come in the form of a call to future action by providing visitors with easily accessible information and resources about appropriate and respectful ways to support and be involved in the movement without infring upon spaces that are not intended for them.

The result of these opportunities for action will be increased visibility and support for the Native food sovereignty movement that leads to real and quantifiable change and support for an incredibly worthy cause.

STREET ACTVATION

While food sovereignty is a serious issue affecting Native and Indigenous communities, sadly there are many other communities in NYC who are suffering in similar ways. This presents NMAI with an opportunity to extend the exhibition into the community and function as an advocate for these underrepresented local community members.

Small stands will be placed around the surrounding neighborhoods that provide passersby with first hand accounts of how food insecuity and loss of food sovereignty has affected so many of our friends and neighbors from all different walks of life.

These stands will also provide people with information and opportunities to become involved with their local food pantry and support their neighbors who make use of it.

The result of these street activations will be a more holistic and intersectional understanding of issues regarding food sovereignty and insecurity. This understanding will serve to debunk many harmful stereotypes about people who need to take advantage of these services and ultimately foster increased empathy and kindness wherever possible.




