“(Evil) can be fun,” says series cocreator Robert King about this perversely entertaining supernatural thriller, which ends its four-season run August 22. It certainly has been for fans, but now, the

parish has terminated the unit that enlisted forensic psychologist Kristen (Katja Herbers), Father David (Mike Colter) and tech whiz Ben (Aasif Mandvi) to uncover demons, while the always dangerous Leland (Michael Emerson, left) still plans to turn the world into Satan’s playground. That plot could include Timothy, the baby he shares with Kristen (after stealing one of her eggs). Leland thinks the boy is the Antichrist; Kristen, who took the baby in, hopes nurture will beat back nature.

In the final episodes, as Leland’s kidnapping trial begins, the Vatican offers the trio one last assignment. Watch out for several confrontations coming to a head, led by the unfinished business between Kristen and Leland. “Kristen has been through insane things since she joined this assessor program,” says Herbers. Why should the ending be any different? —*IR*

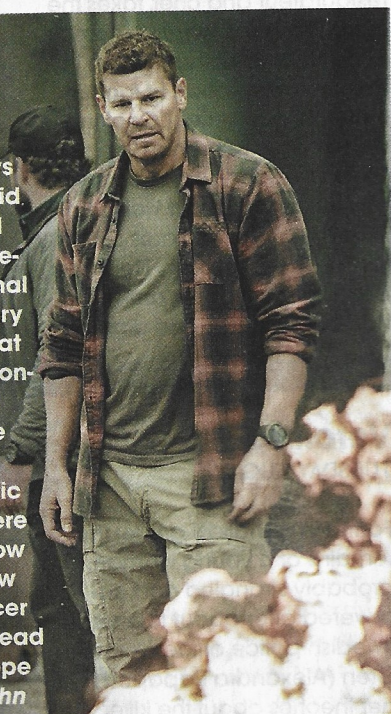
Stephen Curry costars in a mockumentary “about forgiveness...and the undeniable power of Stephen Curry,” says Matthew Libman, cowriter and executive producer of *Throwback* with brother Daniel and David Caspe. Future Hall of Fame point guard Curry plays a fictional version of himself who reconnects with a shifty childhood pal (Adam Pally, above left, with Curry), despite the warning of their classmate (*SNL*’s Ego Nwodim), now Steph’s right-hand woman.

The Libmans have scored big with assists from their stars. “It truly felt like (Ego, Adam and Stephen had) known each other forever, which helps when they’re playing characters that have known each other forever,” says Daniel. As Caspe puts it, “Stephen Curry is the Stephen Curry of being great at everything, including—but certainly not limited to—acting.
