# Introduction

The Australian Internet Governance Forum (auIGF), formerly known as NetThing, is an annual event for the discussion of public policy issues pertaining to the Internet in Australia. It is a multidisciplinary community, forged by the common will to increase understanding of Internet related issues but, most importantly, increase understanding of a diverse range of stakeholders' views on these issues.

auIGF aims to provide a diverse and inclusive platform for the exploration of Australian technology policy issues, to mobilise Australians to collaborate on solutions, and to connect Australia to the regional and global Internet Governance Forums.

At auIGF, our aim is to:

- build Australia's Internet community so that it includes a diversity of interests, experiences and views;
- gather together that Australian multistakeholder community and hold interactive and participative Internet policy discussions;
- have those policy conversations provide a foundation for robust and visionary government, industry and community decision making in Australia as well as giving Australia-based participants a strong basis for contributing to global policy making.





# auIGF 2024

The auIGF 2024, held in Melbourne and online over 28-29 October 2024, convened more than 160 participants from government, industry, civil society, academia, private sector and the technical community. The forum explored the theme “Connecting local to global – Connecting Australian community and policy debates to the region and the world” focusing on informing Australian policy debates with regional and global Internet governance challenges.

A highlight moment was the keynote address by the Minister for Communications, emphasising Australia’s commitment to multistakeholder governance and fostering a safe, inclusive, and resilient digital environment.

Panel discussions and workshops tackled pressing issues like online safety, cybersecurity, and digital inclusion, encouraging collaboration and cross-sectoral dialogue.

The forum also marked the launch of the [auIGF’s inaugural Position Paper](#), addressing the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS+20) review. This initiative served as a platform to distill community perspectives and generate cohesive inputs to global discussions.

Engagement was a hallmark of the event, with participants contributing actionable insights and building networks that strengthen Australia’s voice in international forums. The auIGF highlighted the importance of integrating local expertise into broader global frameworks, reinforcing Australia’s role in shaping a fair and open Internet.

auIGF 2024 was held in Melbourne at the Rydges Hotel, 186 Exhibition Street. The venue provided a warm atmosphere and convenient location for participants travelling from interstate.



# Program

The 2024 auIGF program, designed by the Multistakeholder Steering Committee (MSSC) on advice of the Program Committee, brought to life the theme “Connecting local to global – Connecting Australian community and policy debates to the region and the world.” The hybrid event, held over two days at Rydges Melbourne and online, featured an engaging mix of plenary sessions, town halls, workshops, and expert-led panels.

The program commenced with a keynote from the Minister for Communications, highlighting Australia’s commitment to collaborative Internet governance. Thematic sessions explored pressing topics, including digital inclusion for Indigenous communities, strategies to strengthen online safety, and Australia’s contributions to global Internet frameworks like WSIS+20. Standout discussions, such as “What is Happening in Internet Governance in 2025,” provided insights into future challenges and opportunities.

With over 50 expert speakers, the program showcased a wide range of perspectives from organisations like auDA, ICANN, Pacific IGF, the Australian Government and leading academic and civil society institutions such as the Australian Communications Consumer Action Network (ACCAN) and the ANU Tech Policy Design Centre. Panels and workshops emphasised actionable strategies for shaping an inclusive, secure, and open digital future, with town halls offering attendees an opportunity to provide direct input into policy discussions.

By blending local insights with international expertise, the auIGF 2024 program reinforced Australia’s pivotal role in advancing equitable and sustainable Internet governance. The event’s dynamic agenda not only fostered meaningful dialogue among stakeholders but also contributed to shaping global and regional Internet policy directions.

## Indigenous Fellowship

Two recipients of the 2023 auIGF and Identity Digital Indigenous Leaders Internet Governance and Policy Fellowship attended the auIGF 2024, Susan Beetson and Dr Jenny Fraser. Launched in 2023, the initiative encourages Indigenous Australians to become involved in Internet governance and policy related discussion.

Susan and Jenny participated in a panel on “Indigenous Australia: Building Digital Availability, Access and Affordability” alongside Gabi Briggs, focusing on their experience living in and researching Indigenous communities.

In its second year, the fellowship proved to be a success in generating diversity by engaging a minority group and in creating an understanding of issues surrounding trust and digitisation amongst Aboriginal elders.



Susan and Jenny highlighted the importance of ensuring all members of the Indigenous community remain connected and aware of their role in building a better system.

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## Networking Event

Sponsored by Verisign, the auIGF Networking Event was a vibrant conclusion to the first day, bringing together Australia’s diverse Internet governance community in a relaxed and engaging setting. Held at the Rydges Melbourne, the event provided a platform for industry leaders, policymakers, academics, and civil society members to connect, exchange ideas, and reflect on the day’s key discussions.

The informal atmosphere encouraged lively conversations, fostering new connections and strengthening existing collaborations. Attendees seized the opportunity to delve deeper into the day’s topics, sharing diverse perspectives and insights over refreshments. The event reinforced the collaborative spirit of the auIGF, reinforcing the importance of community-driven dialogue in shaping Australia’s Internet governance landscape.

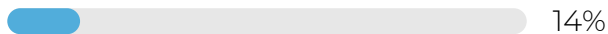

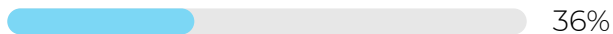

We also deeply appreciated the steadfast support of **ICANN** and the **Internet Society**, both of whom continue to champion national Internet governance initiatives like the auIGF.

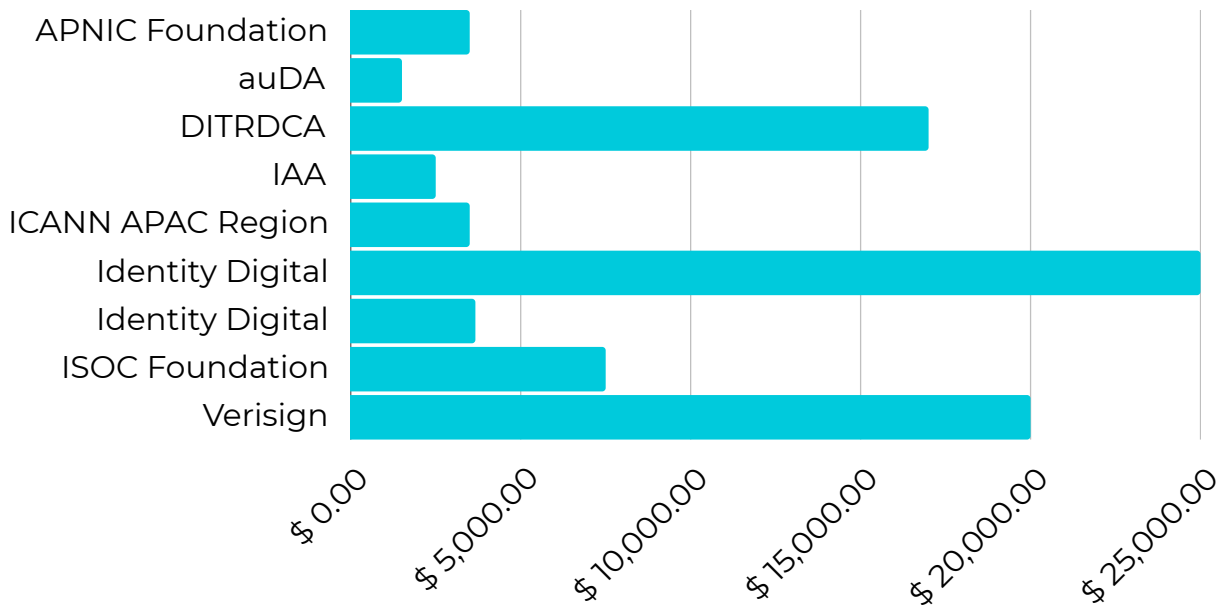

## Income

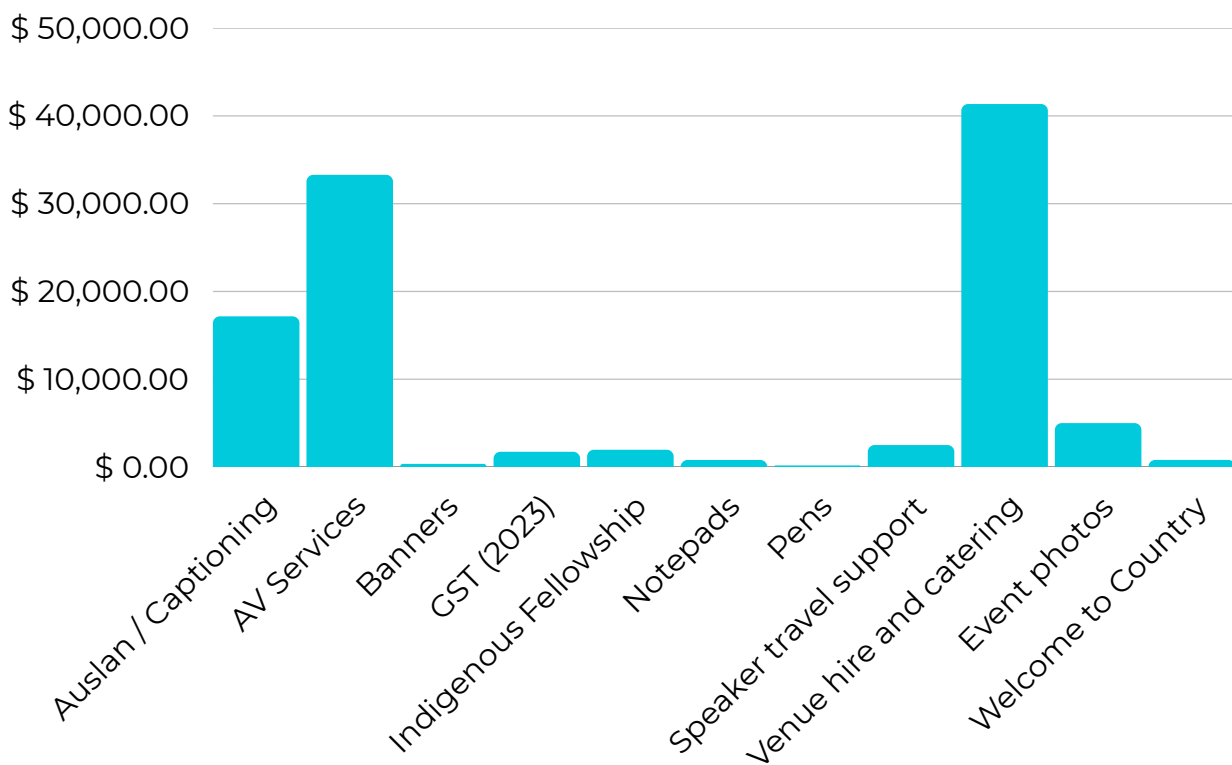
Total Sponsorship and or Support of \$87,466.16 AUD received,

## Committee Debrief

A post-event debrief was held during the first monthly MSSC meeting following auIGF 2024 on 28 November 2024. This session provided an opportunity for the Committee to reflect on the event's successes and identify areas for improvement in 2025.

During the event, feedback was taken live from Committee members and they were given an opportunity to further contribute prior to the debrief. A summary of key takeaways and lessons for 2025 is provided below.

### Key Takeaways

- High-calibre speakers: The quality of speakers and moderators enhanced audience interaction and engagement, contributing to a vibrant atmosphere.
- New participation: The event successfully attracted individuals new to Internet governance, fostering broader interest and curiosity.
- Inclusive programming: Aligning sessions with general topics and a well-structured position paper process ensured relevance and participant satisfaction.
- Hybrid setup: The AV setup supported seamless integration of virtual speakers, with positive feedback from those participating remotely.
- Venue and catering: Venue facilities, including catering, were praised, creating a comfortable and welcoming environment.

### Lessons for 2025

- Streamlined internal processes: Consolidating speaker documents and establishing clearer timelines for key tasks will improve coordination and reduce last-minute pressures.
- Enhanced resources: Expanding roles, resourcing chat moderation, and engaging more contributors in program planning will strengthen support for organisers and participants.
- Optimised venue layout: Choosing a larger venue and refining the layout will address space constraints and improve the attendee experience.
- Focused programming: Reducing the number of session streams and curating a tighter agenda will help maintain coherence and ease of management.
- Improved promotion: Finalising event elements earlier, such as lanyards and moderators, will allow for stronger and more timely marketing efforts.
- Expanded community involvement: Encouraging more community-driven proposals and including interactive or youth-focused strands will enhance inclusivity and engagement.
