Words from Pastor Tony...



What would it be like to receive a terminal diagnosis—to realize the end of this earthly life is near? Sadly, many of you have loved ones who have experienced this most difficult time of life. You have

journeyed with someone who has passed from this life. Perhaps even a few of you have stared death in the face yourself only to be miraculously healed.

I cannot presume to know anyone's thoughts on this topic even though as a pastor I have heard many share their thinking in such devastatingly difficult times. Try as we might, unless we've been there, we cannot fully know the weight of such thoughts. As family who have lost loved ones we can journey down the road with our own thoughts and what it will mean for us and we can also try to empathize as best we can for our loved one.

I have observed through the years that when the end is near for someone of faith there is a peacefulness, a readiness and a strength demonstrated. Such is the blessing of our hope in Christ for eternal life.

I am not trying to be morbid; rather, there is a reason I bring up this topic.

The Christian season of Lent leads us to the cross. I have often wondered what went through Jesus' mind when he realized his terminal diagnosis and when his time on earth was nearing completion. Theologically, we understand why Jesus came and we grasp the significance of the cross and resurrection. But short of a terminal diagnosis ourselves how can we fully know the thoughts and the weight of it all? Maybe there is a blessing in the unknown.

The Good News for Christians, however, is that we don't have to focus on death. In fact, because of Christ, we can focus on life and look forward to eternity and the hope of resurrection. That is what I have noticed about people of faith as they near the end of their life on earth—their minds are at peace and they have the hope of a life in eternity with God.

The liturgy of Ash Wednesday reminds us we have come from the dust of the earth and we will return to the dust of the earth. While most people try not to think about death we all know it's a reality we can't escape. A terminal diagnosis forces people to think long and hard about what that means for their life. Most will try to go about living as best they can for the time they have left. Priorities become clearer. Time is precious. Important messages and expressions of love are shared.

As Jesus' time on earth drew to a close he was making sure to impart words of wisdom, spend quality time and express love to his disciples and point the way to a hope in God. His purpose would become evident and his saving work continues to fill followers with hope and peace. Praise be to God that Christ's resurrection means life for us!

A Breath of Fresh Prayer



Norwegian theologian Ole Hallesby described prayer as simply letting God into our lives. God "knocks," he said, "not only in the solemn hours of secret prayer" but "in the midst of your daily work, your daily struggles, your daily grind ... when you need him most."

Prayer, added Hallesby, is as essential to life as air. "As impossible as it is for us to take a breath in the morning large enough to last us until noon, so impossible is it to pray in the morning in such a way as to last us until noon," he said. "Let your prayers ascend to [God] constantly, audibly or silently, as circumstances throughout the day permit."

The Comfort Connection

Amid suffering, we might feel alone and wonder what good can come of it. But later we may discover ourselves equipped to serve precisely because of what we experienced.

Writer and civil rights activist James Baldwin stated: "You think your pain and heartbreak are unprecedented ... but then you read. [Books] taught me that the things that tormented me the most were the very things that connected me with all the people who were alive or who had ever been alive." Whether through books or direct human interaction, we often learn that our suffering connects us to other people and that our pain gains meaning by moving us to support someone else who's hurting.

Paul writes of such connection: "Praise be to ... the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God" (2 Corinthians 1:3-4, NIV). May you share the comfort you have received from God with others in pain. As a bonus, along the way you'll realize you're not — and never have been — alone.


