I do not simplify subjects, but rather layer colour and irregular, seeming random brushstrokes on the canvas in an impressionistic style with abstract elements. Up close, the canvas is a maze of unstructured strokes of colour, irregular, interwoven, multi-layered complex. This is my vision of the world, sharp lines, rough shapes and pops of colour that blend and harmonize as we step back to take it all in. I am painting from the heart, capturing the complexity of place.

Growing up in a small town in the pre-internet era, I would spend my days creating everything anything from stick sculptures to complex drawings. I always knew that art would be a part of who I was. My art is based on a need to paint; one that follows me through every phase of life, sometimes therapy, sometimes a way to express myself, but always who I am. In 2008 I became a professional artist. I am reaching inwards, embracing my creative energy; dropping the idea of "drawing within the lines". and letting go of the controlled brushwork.

Whaam is inspired by Roy Lichtenstein's work. The content of the image is still as powerful as when Lichtenstein released his painting in 1963. Lichtenstein's Whaam was thought by some to be an anti-war painting. He pokes fun at violence in war by romanticizing aerial combat. I was interesting in tapping into this same vein but looking at it from a more Hollywood perspective. Guns and explosions are fun in movies because as a viewer one does not necessarily need to consider the effects of those actions. However, in the real world it seems there is not enough consideration of the effects of warfare on actual people.

I am interested in choosing subjects and settings that can push the boundaries of what it is typical for photography while using technology to create a cutting-edge visual experience. I aim to bridge the gap between art and commercial design by incorporating elements from both. I am very interested in visual effects and how that can be incorporated into art. I never want to reach a point where I am not pushing boundaries. I don't aim to be perfect which takes the pressure off and allows me the room to innovate and try push the boundaries of what is typically considered as art.



BGO _ Bev Gordon

Though I experiment with many mediums, I mostly paint in oils and watercolours and subject matter is as varied as all the thoughts that run through my head as well as what filters through my eyes. Generally, I like to paint semi-abstracts, meaning I always seem to add some sort of recognizable elements that provides a wide range of readability. When painting, I am constantly reducing the image to "what is important and what is not" and I place great attention to composition as I feel that if the composition is poor, no matter how good the painting is, it will be dull.

Bev Gordon grew up in Penticton and later trained as a Medical Radiographer at BCIT, which became her lifelong career. During her parenting years she raised two daughters, both successful artists. In 2005, Gordon received a BFA from OUC, now UBCO, and since then puts making art in the forefront of her daily activities. Gordon's art has appeared on the poster of the Kazlo Jazz Festival (1996), she won the Kelowna Radiothon competition (2010), she has exhibited in numerous galleries, the latest being Creatio Gallery at Ex Nihilo winery and she has also been interviewed on CBC radio concerning a self-portrait workshop she offered to the community of Happy-Valley Goose Bay, Labrador (2013).



BMO _ Betty Morrison

The art pieces I am presenting for the under 100 are all about nature and how it inspires me on an everyday level. It is about absorbing the feeling of nature while I am walking in it and then expressing it from my perspective. And how just thoughts of beauty in nature can create peaceful and harmonious feelings.

The pieces are about Mindfulness Practice in a current world of high anxiety and chaotic energy.

I began drawing as a four-year-old. Throughout public school and university I took art classes including a minor in Art from Western Washington University. I have exhibited art in Canada: Edmonton, Prince George, Kamloops, Penticton, Summerland, Vancouver, Toronto, Vernon, Kelowna. I have exhibited art in the United States: Chicago, L.A., Sacramento. European exhibitions were juried shows: Florence, Palermo, Vienna. My art is included in my self-published books and included in an anthology published by RippleEffect Press in Vancouver. I consider all forms of artist expression one voice in my life.



CMC _ Ceren McKay

I find creating abstract art both liberating and inspirational.

Acrylic and acrylic mediums are my main mediums but I love adding different materials and experimenting with them.

For the most part I use brushes and palette knives to paint but as well as these I also use my hand, end of a brush, sponge, paper, plastic film etc to give different effects. Hearing or reading other people's varying interpretations of my work is one of my biggest joys.

Autumn in the prairies brings to mind yellowed fields and frosty mornings, fences that need mending.

I am a School Psychologist by career, artist and creator by heart. I enjoy several mediums, including clay, acrylic, alcohol inks, and watercolour. I am inspired by my surroundings in

When I paint, I love to play with form, composition and the juxtaposition of colours against one another. Although a newcomer to acrylic painting, I have always been inspired by the geometric beauty of Middle Eastern art, previously creating detailed works using pen and ink. I use improvised tools to create different shapes, after making a grid with pencil on wood panels that have been primed and painted black. I then start in the centre and work freely without a pattern.

Chris Waneck is a local Kelowna novice artist, who has discovered the joy of colour after creating art with pen and ink previously, self-publishing 3 editions of colouring books for

adults in 2016 with some success. 2017 was a year of fulfilling creation for Chris, using a variety of grounds: canvas, wood, and stone. As an ARTSCO member, in 2017-18 she exhibited works in two local venues, the Kelowna Library Main Branch and Interior Health. Previously exhibitions include Discover Art in the Valley in June 2018 and recently Lake Country Artwalk 2018.



CZU _ Carol Zuckerman

I have been playing with charcoal, ink and watercolour mingled in a loose style on various grounds. I am drawn to the contrast between detail and broad strokes as a way to draw the viewer into the picture and also provide an atmosphere. This multi-media style suits my eclectic taste in subject manner - from landscapes, animals, portraits to still life.

I received my BDes (Industrial Design) from U of A in 2004, specializing in landscape design. Currently I am completing my MFA Interdisciplinary at UBCO Okanagan experimenting with creative writing and illustration. I draw, construct, sculpt, paint in a variety of mediums, and

generally have a great time trying out new and interesting ideas. As part of my MFA I am also investigating linocut prints.



I draw my inspiration from the world around me. Whether it's during a drive to town, out for a mountain bike ride, or while walking the dog. Some of my recent work has focused on discarded items found on local trails. My artwork is often created using coloured pencils, which is the medium I am most comfortable with. However, I am also attempting to push myself by experimenting with watercolours, as well as acrylic. I prefer to let my illustrations speak for themselves and hope that each viewer takes something different away.

As an introverted, only child born in Ottawa, Ontario, drawing was, and continues to be Danielle's constant friend. Mostly self-taught, she began drawing as a way of dealing with anxiety. After almost two decades working as a Graphic Designer/Art Director in advertising, it seemed natural to want to incorporate strong, graphic images into her artwork. She is an avid mountain biker who is in love with the outdoors. Influenced by the things she sees and feels, she is still trying to find her path in terms of style, medium and focus in her art.



DHI _ Diana Hiliard

My latest work is a huge departure from my earlier, traditional work. What started as something very simple (exploring Yupo as a substrate) has snowballed. Playing with Tar Gel led to investigating the possibilities afforded by PearlEx pigments, which led to metal leaf, texture mediums, and more and more experimentation. As I investigate the possibilities of contrasting matte vs reflective, smooth vs. crackled, transparent vs. opaque, and metallics, I spend more time and effort on responding to the images that form, whether representational or abstract. I think the energy and excitement I experience is translated into the finished product.

Diana Hilliard is a Kelowna based artist with work in collections in the United States, Canada, and the United Kingdom. A former high school art teacher, she has a B. Fa. From the University of Guelph, attends workshops regularly, and has taken classes at Sheridan College. Her animal portraits are privately commissioned and have been offered as trophies at major events. She is an active member of the Federation of Canadian Artists (Currently serving her second term as chapter president) and exhibits regularly in their juried shows and in other venues.



DPA Denise Patrick

The work submitted for U100 are Fantasy, a combination of acrylic pours, mixed media and acrylic paint. The process was to do the pour and "find" a subject and paint whatever I see.

My name is Denise Patrick and I have been a long term resident of Lake Country for almost 39 years. I didn't start painting till my late 50's, and once I started it was like coming home. FHE Fern Helfand

The theme of this submission is based on my Okanagan Log Pile work, which is currently installed at the Kelowna Airport. This work speaks to the duplicity of the wood industry in BC representing the vast forests of the province, a renewable resource and the lumber industry, a major and historical economic foundation of the region. Conversely, it speaks to the loss of the forest, through widespread logging, pine beetle infestation and the annual growing threat of wild fires. It also represents the transformation of our environment from forest valley and hills, traditional Indigenous territories, to lands cleared of their natural

habitat, making way for shopping malls and real estate developments with homes, which in turn have been partially constructed from the trees that once stood in their place.

FERN HELFAND is a photo-based artist and has recently become Professor Emeritus after 20 years teaching at UBCO. She received a BFA from York University and an MFA from the University of Florida. Fern has also held positions at the University of Western Ontario and the Universiti Sains Malaysia in Penang. Helfand's research and photo-based art production have always been influenced by the environments and cultures in which she has lived, worked and travelled. Her artwork has explored issues addressing cultural observation and commentary, tourism, environmental concerns, racism and the changing medium of photography itself.



FNE _ Fiona Neal

Devoting much of my studio study to the examination of Intuitive expression, I am especially fascinated by unembellished, raw portrayal of emotion that pours out at the point where spontaneous painting gives over to deep self-connection. I have purposely limited control when painting by using large canvas, brush and fluid acrylic mediums, along with other techniques that move me away from conscious thought. For U100, I am very interested to see how these processes will shift as I work on much smaller canvases, with fluid acrylics and inks to produce impactful emotionally layered works, while remaining loyal to my purpose.

Fiona Neal is an artists working primarily in Acrylics on Canvas, studying at Bourneville College of Art, specializing in painting at Sheffield Hallam University for her Fine Art Degree, Fiona was awarded a bachelor of Fine Arts with First Class Honours. She now lives in West Kelowna. Fiona's work has been bought and commissioned for private collections over 3 continents and her current portfolio can be seen in galleries and Juried exhibitions around the Okanagan and beyond.



GRA Gillian Rau

Born in Africa, I am truly inspired to capture the warm soul of my birthplace, endeavouring to share this through my work. By using a radiant limited palette, and painting in an Impressionistic- Realism style, I take every opportunity to accentuate both the light and the warmth of my subject. My love affair with oils allows me to capture the painterly, subtle yet strong story of my subject. Thus encouraging the viewer to visit within the work.

Gillian was born in sun drenched Africa, and immigrated on an Art Visa to Canada. She now resides in Kelowna, where she enjoys giving workshops and demos. She teaches her Adult Art Classes at her studio in Kelowna. Gillian's passion is teaching and painting in oils. She shares her knowledge and experience with all her art students irrespective of their experience, taking great delight in their progress. Her favoured style is Impressionism-Realism.



GST _ Gabrielle Strong

These sculptural works are part of my "Lost in the Process" series of porcelain rags, last shown publicly as an installation here at the Lake Country Art Gallery in the exhibit "Draped/Double-Take". This series was born from the desire to explore my painting practice through the medium of clay; the fluidity of liquid porcelain replaces paint as my medium while the natural draping of clay-soaked cotton becomes an extension of my paintbrush. This installation is both about loss and process. Each hand-dipped rag is one of a kind, capturing individual brushstrokes frozen in time and never to be repeated the same twice.

A graduate of Emily Carr University, Gabrielle's practice is split between painting and ceramics and she is interested in mining the ways in which they intersect. Following graduation, she dove into a seven-month Artist Residency at the Vernon Community Arts Centre through the Caetani Cultural Centre's CeramAiR Program, which ultimately led her to make the Okanagan her home permanently. Recently she was awarded a major public art commission by the City of Vernon to commemorate Canada's 150th anniversary, whereby Gabrielle enlisted the community to help create a 48 meter winding river mosaic which was installed this past summer in Vernon's downtown core.



HKO Helen Kovaks

My inspiration for the glass art that I create comes from nature and my love of colour. The translucency of glass gives it a fourth dimensional quality using light to describe an inner glow or search for beauty. the different genres with a focus on nature, life and feelings in her art work, echoing her heritage and her new life in the Okanagan.




JBE _ Jennifer Bednar

These small objects are paintings that grow in layers upon carved wooden panels. Using acrylic paint and mixed media they draw from abstractions of organic and landscape inspiration. Hung in groups, placed on shelves, or as small messages tucked into out of the way places these objects are generally under a foot square but have a quiet weight that compels closer inspection.

After several years as a practicing artist, a number of juried exhibitions, and serving on the board for an artist run centre, The New Gallery in Calgary, she returned to university to receive a master's degree in Library Science. My love is photography, and my passion is creative lighting, painting with all sorts of light in the dark or dim light, and then capturing it with my camera. Around 1998/99 I started experimenting with different kinds of light sources and processes with my camera, and also in the darkroom, which included photo grams, and the light generated by the arcing of high voltage electricity capturing it directly on the light sensitive darkroom paper. Through a lot of trial and error over the years, I fine-tuned my multistage process for making my high voltage images. I use a industrial 15,000 volt transformer to make the arc light.

I have been a photographer, just for the love of it, for most of my life, at the beginning it was mainly black and white, and then I had a darkroom when I finally had the space, but it's gone now since I don't have the space, and shoot mainly digital, I really strive to setup as much as I can in front of the camera, but I also sometimes dabble in manipulating it afterwards. A lot of times people just assume it's manipulated. I try to occasionally shoot film, I also dabble occasionally with paints and other mediums, I would like to get back into it more. In life and photography, I like to ask myself "I wonder what would happen if I do this ..." sometimes I'm successful, sometimes not, but at least I don't let doubt hold back my innate curiosity.

I paint in Alcohol Ink which is a liquid medium which works on non-porous surfaces such as tile, glass, specialty papers and treated canvas. Most of my work lends itself to abstract creations both floral and landscapes. I manipulate the inks using a straw, compressed air, and paint brushes and I finish my work with Art Resin which provides protection and a high gloss shine

My name is Pat Ryan and I live in Lake Country, BC. I paint in Alcohol Ink which is a liquid medium which lends itself to abstract creations. I also use encaustic wax which I use alone or

with my alcohol inks. I have displayed my work at Art Walk 2017 and 2018. I have been a featured artist at Opus Kelowna in March and August of 2018. I displayed at "Discover Art in the Valley" 2018. I teach alcohol ink classes both introductory and intermediate classes. I also can be commissioned to create unique pieces.



RKE _ Renata Kerr

Working intuitively, I let my heart (as well as the painting itself) guide my movements and brushstrokes, allowing the process to unfold naturally. Paintings are built up of many layers, with traces of previous layers peeking through, like fleeting memories. 
