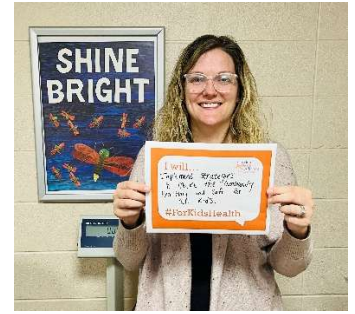

Foundational Public Health Services

The **Foundational Public Health Services (FPHS)** framework outlines the unique responsibilities of governmental public health. The framework includes Foundational Capabilities (cross-cutting skills) and Foundational Areas (broad health topics from across the lifespan) that should be available to all people and that meets one or more of the following criteria:

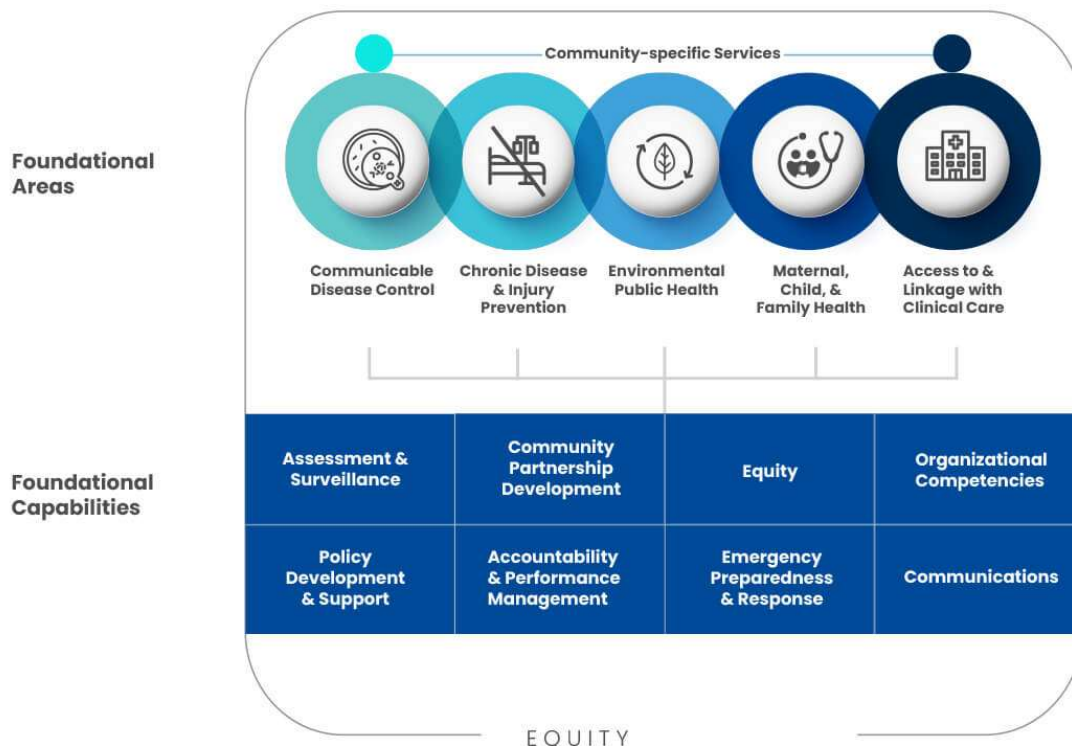
- Services that are mandated by federal or state laws;
- Services for which the governmental public health system is the only or primary provider of the service, statewide; and
- Population-based services (versus individual services) that are focused on disease prevention, protection, and health promotion.

Although communities have different needs, the FPHS Framework sets the minimum level of services that should occur, focusing on community health, well-being, and achieving health for all.

Foundational Areas are the public health programs and services that we provide that are aimed at improving the health of the community.

Foundational Capabilities are the skills and the capacity we maintain and continue to approve upon, in order to support the basic public health programs, protections, and activities.

Foundational Public Health Capabilities

Assessment & Surveillance

Data drives what we do at Forest County Health Department (FCHD). It is how we understand the health of our community as a whole, and amongst different populations that may face barriers to being healthy.

FCHD completed their Community Health Needs Assessment in 2023 and identified the following top health priorities to be addressed in the Forest County Health Improvement Plan.

Substance Abuse

56% of motor vehicle accidents involved alcohol. (County Health Rankings 2023)

40 drug overdose deaths per 100,000 people occurred in Forest County (FC) from 2016-2020. (County Health Rankings 2023)

14% of high schoolers and 8% of middle schoolers reported being offered or sold drugs on school property. (Youth Risk Behavior Survey 2023)

28.5% of residents worried about their drug, tobacco and alcohol use. (FC Community Survey 2023)



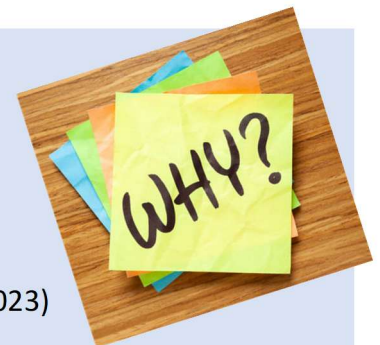

22% of Forest County adults suffer from depression. (County Health Rankings 2023)

Among high schoolers, 48% reported anxiety and 35% reported prolonged depression. 21% seriously considered suicide in the past year. (Youth Behavior Risk Survey 2023)



Chronic Disease

37% of adult residents are considered obese. (County health rankings 2023)

31% of adults have high blood pressure & 28.6 % have high cholesterol. (PLACES data)

22.9% of children in Forest County are food insecure. (Feeding America)

30% stated their main health concern is physical activity and 30% stated it was consuming nutritious foods. (FC Community Survey Data 2023)



Community Partnership Development

Forest County Health Department works with various partners to tackle the health challenges within the county to create and implement better opportunities for everyone.

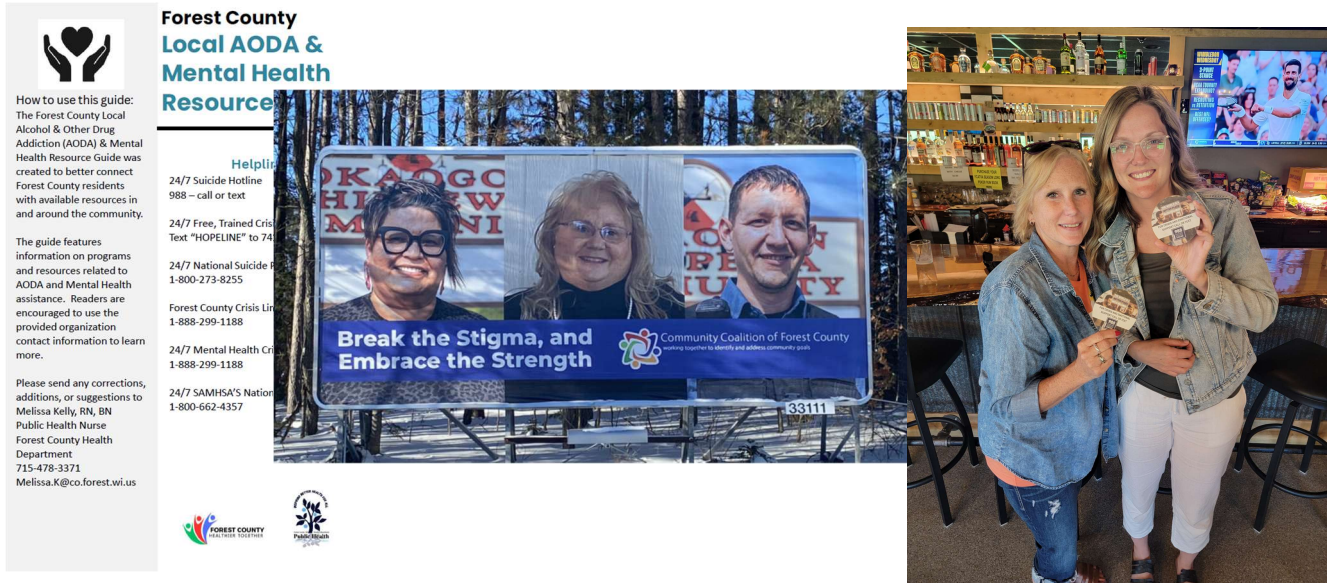
Forest County Coalition on Activity & Nutrition (CAN) Successes:

- Developed and distributed a Forest County Food Resource Guide

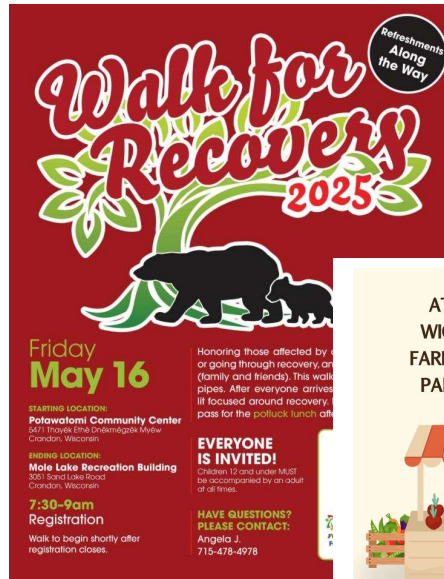

Emergency Preparedness & Response

FCHD plans and implements community resilience strategies to make sure that residents are prepared and able to respond to and recover from public health threats and emergencies.

Emergency Preparedness & Response in Action: Forest County Ice Storm (March 30 – April 3, 2025)

A severe ice storm impacted Forest County, causing widespread disruptions over a five-day period. The storm resulted in extensive cell phone and radio communication outages, severely limiting coordination among emergency services. Roads were blocked by debris and downed power lines, delaying emergency response and utility restoration efforts. Prolonged power outages across the county increased demand for warming centers, emergency management system, and public health support, especially in rural areas. The event highlighted critical challenges in communication, access, and resource coordination.

Puffy Winter Coats & Car Seat Safety

WHY PUFFY COATS ARE DANGEROUS:

Bulky winter coats affect how the harness in a car seat fits your child, resulting in your child being at risk of being ejected or seriously injured if in an accident.

Safe winter alternatives:

- Place a blanket or coat over the harness after buckling.
- Dress your child in thin, warm layers
- Warm the car up beforehand if able.
- Use a car seat poncho or backwards winter coat after buckling

Social determinants of health and actions to address health inequities should be integrated throughout all activities.

Communicable Disease Control

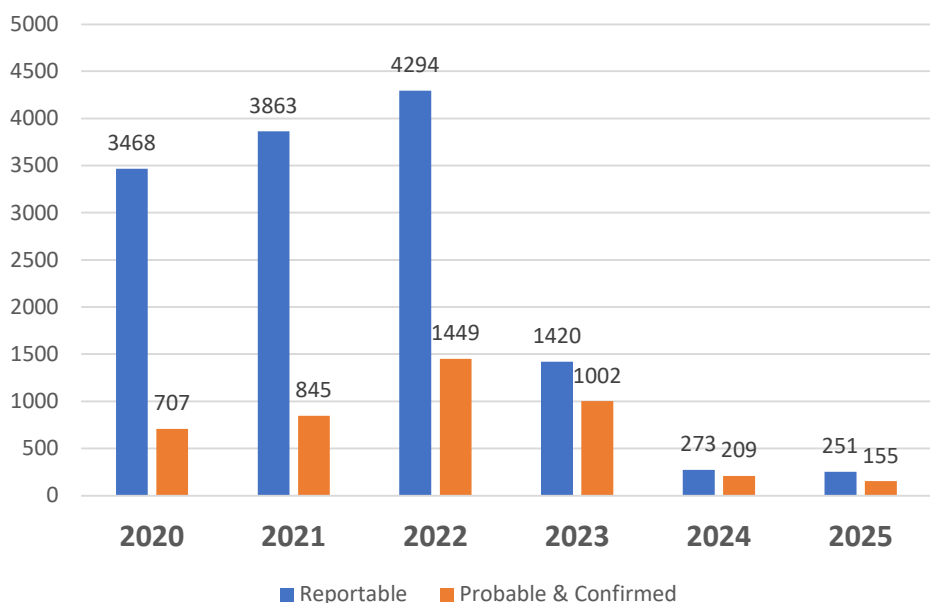

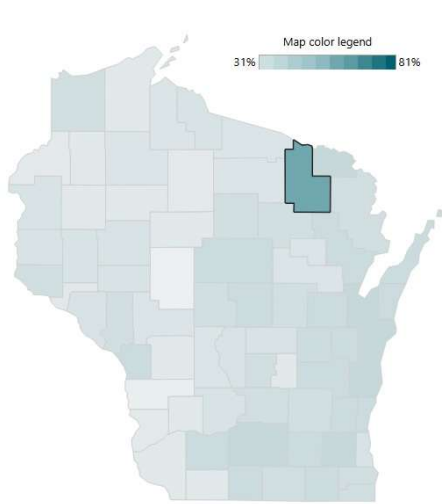

The immunization program provides immunizations to eligible children and adults to lower vaccine preventable diseases. FCHD also offers a limited supply of other vaccines for children and adults.

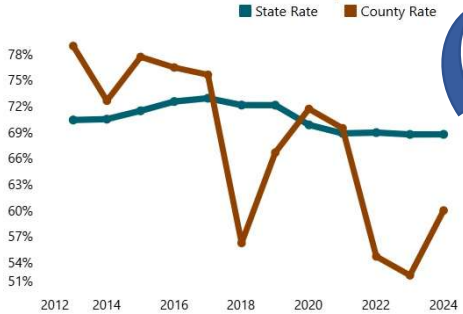



FCHD identifies risks, promotes habits like regular physical activity and healthy eating, and works with the community to increase access to safe housing, transportation, and healthcare.

Wisconsin Wins

WI WINS Wisconsin Wins (WI Wins) is a science-based strategy to decrease youth access to tobacco products and help support retailer compliance with the law through inspections and education.

Why is Wisconsin Wins Important?

By preventing underage sales, WI Wins helps curb early tobacco use, reducing the risk of addiction and long-term health issues among young people.

Inspections are conducted from July 1st to June 30th each year, with the majority occurring in the summer months.

Conduct youth recruitment for inspections as participants age out of program.

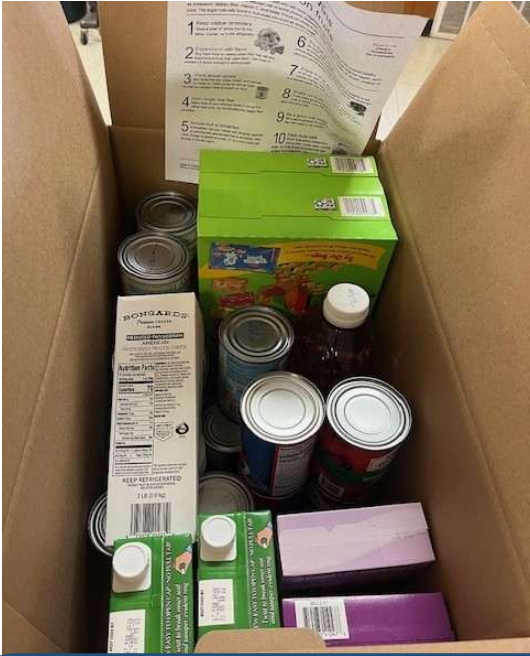

This is a strategy of Forest County Child's Death Review Team. In 2025, suicides, no matter the age, as well as overdose deaths began to be reviewed to determine if there are any preventative strategies that can be implemented within the community.



Forest County Health Departments work with their community partners, including law enforcement, human services, local school districts, pharmacies, EMS, and tribal communities to prevent overdose deaths in the county.

Environmental Public Health

We assure our county is safe and healthy. We help check the air we breathe, the water we drink, and the places we live and eat to make sure they meet safety standards. We work with partners to prevent exposure to harmful substances like lead, mold, and dangerous chemicals.

Health Hazards

Human Health Hazards include concerns regarding water, air, housing, garbage, animals, and more. An investigation is done following a complaint. If property owners do not comply with removal of the hazard, a citation or abatement order may be issued. Some human health hazards fall into multiple categories.

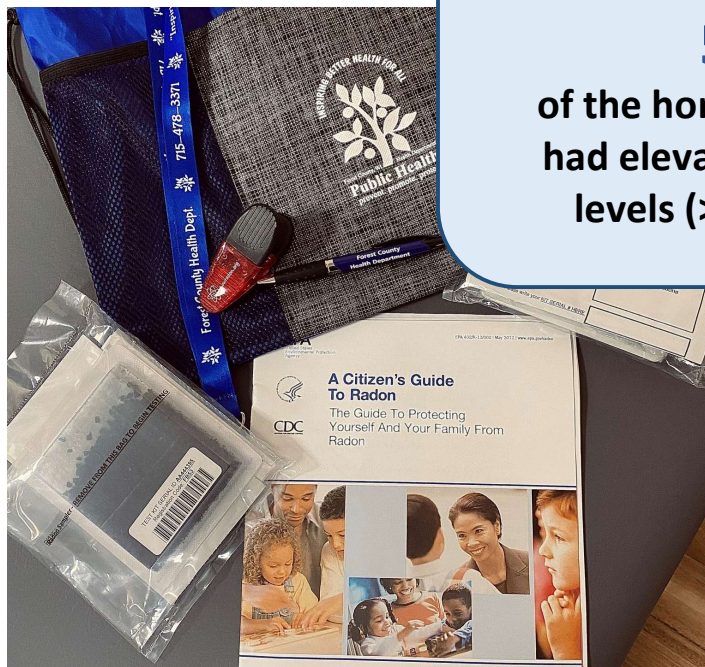

Well Water Testing

Lead in Water Grant – through this grant, FCHD offered **4** childcare centers free lead water tests, education, and if necessary, plumbing replacements. All childcare centers tested, came back within recommended limits (15 ug/L).



FCHD provided **13** water kits through the Wisconsin Well Testing Access Program (WellTAP) and followed up with **2** positive results for Coliform bacteria.

Licensing and Inspections

Our department relies on the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection to inspect Forest County food operations, lodging establishments, restaurants, pools, and campgrounds. Forest County had 280 licensed establishments in 2025. Inspection reports can be found at

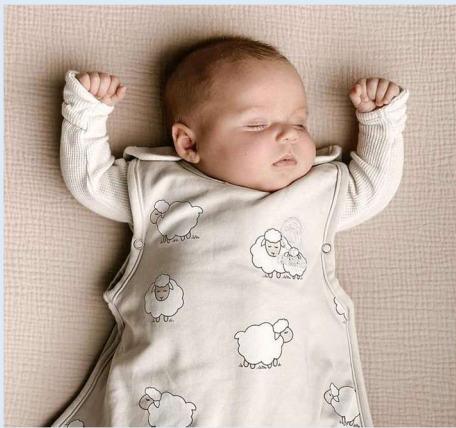

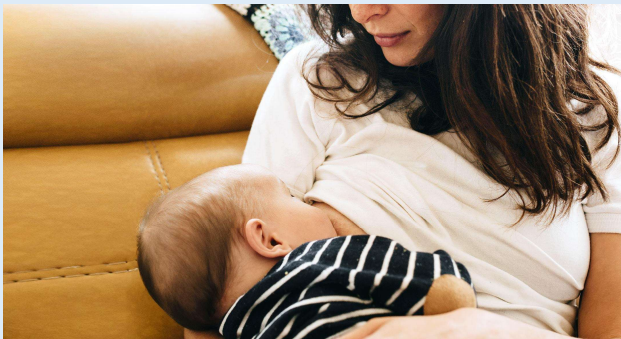

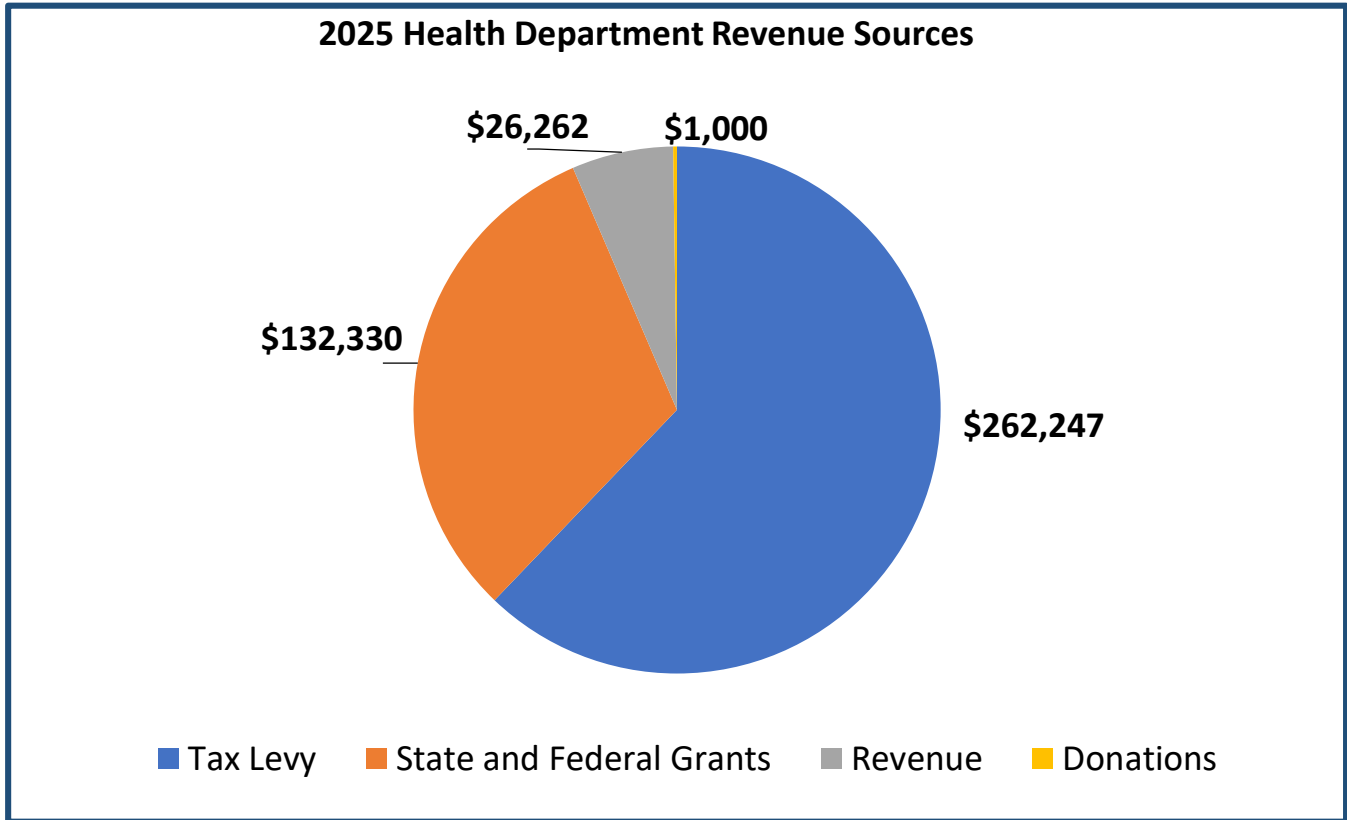
