Henry Herobotics Team builds urban competitiveness of Minneapolis Robotics, by Susan Breedlove, Feb. 28 Camden News

The robotic team at Patrick Henry High School, well-known as Herobotics, with the help of other Minneapolis robotics teams, recently secured a grant from Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED) to purchase a \$20,000 world class aluminum competition field to be installed at Minneapolis Urban Robotics Alliance (MURA) Field. This field is inside the former Lincoln School at Penn Avenue and 12th St. N. Minneapolis Robotic teams will have a new competitive edge as they practice to increase their skills in local, state and national robotics events. The MURA Field has become the model or prototype of a practice field and is referred to as Hub. The model is being copied in five other parts of Minnesota. MURA Field, as a Competitive Robotics Hub, was the model on which DEED formed the larger statewide grant.

Solar Suitcases from North Minneapolis to Northwest Kenya Turning light energy into electricity across the globe, by Susan Breedlove, Feb. 28 Camden News

Students of Principles of Engineering and Civil Engineering & Architecture classes at Henry High School built portable solar generator suitcases that will capture the sun's energy and bring electricity for students at schools in the Kakuma Refugee Camp in Kenya. They participated in a partnership with Wells Fargo, and the company "We Share Solar," building a dozen fully operational briefcase-sized solar power systems as part of a national project.

"There are 840 million people worldwide who just don't have access to electricity," said Henry High classroom instructor, Lars Peterson. "With this [solar generator] it can be beneficial and helpful for the people who are in dire need of electricity," said junior Fue Vang. Officials say the suitcases are powerful enough to illuminate two to three classrooms and charge devices such as mobile phones or tablets.

Henry High is one of 11 Minnesota high schools participating in the "We Share Solar" project, collectively sending 26 suitcases to Kenya in early 2020.

Henry High Wrestlers bring fellowship and excitement to the community "Wrestling is an opportunity to celebrate our students." PHHS Wrestling Co-Coach Minus, by Susan Breedlove, Jan. 29 Camden News

Joining the crowds attending the Henry High wrestling events has been an experience that rejuvenates one's spirit. Most of these motivated student wrestlers must get up at 5 a.m. to catch a city bus to Henry where they meet up with teammates and coaches at 6 a.m. to traverse to Saturday tournament matches around the metro area. They usually don't return to Henry until about 6 p.m. Despite this rigorous schedule the team's average Grade Point Average is 3.092 and some of these 18 young men and women have additional jobs in the community and family responsibilities to attend to.

The 2019-20 Henry High wrestling team is strikingly culturally diverse. The coaches are African American, Hmong, European American and American Indian. Student wrestlers have Lakota, Ojibwe, Hmong, Hispanic, African American, East African, Tibetan and European American roots. "Wrestling is a universal sport that dates back many centuries, as a way to show toughness and competitiveness," reflects Coach Minus.

A hope for the future is to have an updated designated wrestling room or space in the school that can meet and exceed the needs of our student athletes; a place to bring in families and youth.

'No big deal. We're just wrestlers.' Patrick Henry's wrestling lineup features three young women, by David Pierini, Jan. 9 North News

Hannah Brown, Jamesa Robinson and Danae Lawson are three girls on the Patrick Henry's wrestling team. "It's no big deal," Robinson said, "we're just wrestlers."

Once seen as a controversial rarity, girls in boys wrestling are becoming more common. Last season, more than 2,124 girls were on high school wrestling teams, a 27% increase from the previous year, according to the National Federation of State High School Associations. Minnesota high schools had 20 girls on wrestling teams last year, according to the federation's annual sports participation survey. The gender equity law known as Title IX does not require high schools to allow girls to wrestle, but many states, including Minnesota, allow it. Some states have separate teams for boys and girls and a couple, including South Dakota, forbid "mixed wrestling."

Despite the growing numbers of girls wrestling, there remains discomfort for some schools, coaches and wrestlers. "I guess I get it, but you still have to have progress," Coach Minus later said. "I think the girls add to the culture of wrestling. We train everybody the same to go out and compete. These girls are tough and they are just as dedicated and have the same drive as the boys."
