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# PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Many of the educators and students at Henry High School could not wait to end 2020 and begin 2021. We could not imagine a more stressful time in our lives than what we experienced in 2020, and we all believe things would not get worse. We all hoped for better days ahead.

I believe better days are ahead. We cannot sit back and wait for them; we must create them ourselves. That is what I think of when I think about the staff and students at Henry High School. We did not sit back; we went for it!

Educators learned new technology skills to engage our students. They communicated often with students and families to ensure they were on top of things. They attended seminars and professional development that helped them along the way. They collaborated with each other and they held each other up. They went for it! They did not stop, nor did they quit. When a curve ball was thrown at them, they curved with it. They went for it!

Our students showed a lot of grit this year. They continued to show up and do the best they could. Many had multiple responsibilities and still showed up. Several of our seniors stayed focus on their goal to go to college. Through the midst of everything, many of them completed the college applications process and were accepted to several colleges. Nothing was going to stop them! I am so proud of them!

On April 12<sup>th</sup> we are expecting over 300 hundred students in our building for in-person learning while nearly 600 students decided to continue distance learning for the remainder of the year. This will present another challenge for the educators and students. To teach distance learning and in person students at the same time will be a huge undertaking. This will be an eight-week mountain to climb, but I am convinced this will be another example of how the educators and students will persevere. There is no doubt that we can do this.

As we finish the last several weeks of school year 2020-2021, it is my hope that we do not focus on what we lost, but more importantly what we gained. I am inspired by many and if you saw what I saw this past year with our staff and students, you would be inspired too.

# SCHOLARSHIPS, WISH LISTS & EVENTS

#### **Scholarships**

The PHHS Foundation has provided money this spring for five scholarships with the help of your donations:

- The Dan Schmidt Memorial Scholarship: \$1000 for a football player
- The Gary A. Foss Scholarship: \$1000 for an African American
  male
- Patrick Henry High School Foundation: two scholarships for \$2500 each
- Patrick Henry High School Foundation: one scholarship for \$1500 for a student to attend a technical school

The scholarship process begins with the senior students completing an application that includes their post-secondary plans, any awards they have already received from schools or organizations, and a statement about themselves noting any significant issues or struggles they want the committee to know.

After applications are received by the committee, the committee collects information on all the applicants including schools applied to, awards received, GPA, and college entrance exam scores. The committee meets to finalize the scholarships being given and the criteria for each. During the decision process, one guiding principle for the committee is to distribute the awards equitably, making sure that students who have already won significant awards are not given monies they do not need. The committee also looks to carefully match students and their proposed majors with scholarships related to a field of study when applicable. Because there are many students competing for an award, the committee has instituted a scoring system to make the process more objective.

Once decisions are made, committee members may check with teachers not on the committee to reaffirm the students are genuinely deserving of the award based on their commitment to excellence in the classroom and their treatment of other people. After that, award winners are notified.

Members of the committee include, but are not limited to, school counselors, teachers of seniors, administrators and members of the College and Career Center.



# LYNDON CARLSON—SPOTLIGHT

From time to time, we'd like to bring to you articles about former Patrick Henry High School teachers and staff. In this newsletter, we are spotlighting Mr. Lyndon Carlson, former teacher and elected member of the Minnesota House of Representatives. Geneva Kubal provided this article.





Lyndon Carlson was born in Minneapolis and raised on the south side in what he considered a typical working-class family. His father attended Roosevelt High School and later worked for Burlington Northern Railroad. His mother attended South High School. He was one of five children, and his paternal grandmother lived with the family until she passed away. Mr. Carlson's parents were engaged in politics but were not politically active. His family had lively discussions about not only politics, but rivalries as his parents attended rival high schools. Those early days seemed to move Mr. Carlson towards educational and political interests.

Mr. Carlson attended Minneapolis public schools and was attending Roosevelt High School when his family moved to Bloomington, where he graduated from Bloomington High School in 1958. Midway through college, he made the decision to become a teacher. He attended Mankato State and received a Bachelor of Science Degree with a Major in Social Studies. He met Carole in early 1968 when they were both teaching. They married later that same year. When they started their family, Carole left teaching until the youngest started kindergarten. They have three children: Lyndon Jr. works for the railroad like his grandfather, Tanya is a teacher like her parents, but Philip took a different path and is an aspiring actor and moved to Los Angeles. Lyndon and Carole have been married for over 52 years. Carole has been with Lyndon every step of the way. First as a teacher, then as a homemaker and as a campaign manager. Both found that learning, teaching, and public service were not only enjoyable, but rewarding.

Learning and teaching have provided many positive experiences for Mr. Carlson. A subject matter most enjoyable for him not only to learn, but also to teach, was American History. The lively discussions his family had while he was growing up about politics and current events would encourage him not only to become an activist, but a representative in state government. Mr. Carlson taught for a total of 33 years, but 29 years were split equally between Patrick Henry and Edison High Schools. In 1972, Mr. Carlson ran for and was elected to the Minnesota House Of Representatives. After 48 years, he retired from the House at the end of this term, December 31, 2020.

Mr. Carlson enjoyed working with young people. He also used his time in the House to help create opportunities for young people and education. He felt personal success when students achieved successes in and outside of the classroom. He also knew early in his career that responsibilities and challenges at home could help children learn but could also hold them back. For example, early in his career where he taught in a rural community, Lyndon assigned homework for the students. The following day, he discovered most of the students were unable to complete an assignment that he thought they should easily be able to finish. Students told him that when they get home from school, they must do their chores on the farm. This left little time or energy for homework at the end of the day. From this point forward, Mr. Carlson considered what challenges each student might face and tried to create the best possible educational environment for those specific needs. In his experience, everyone has potential; the task is to find the best way to unlock it. This would provide for a challenging and rewarding career. Continued on next page...

Mr. Carlson, in hindsight, stated he would choose a teaching career again. It is a great career path. As a teacher, he was able to maintain his position in the Minneapolis Public Schools while pursuing public office.

Mr. Carlson would teach for 33 years mostly in the fall trimester and take a leave of absence to fulfill duties in public office during the winter and spring trimesters. While teaching, he found time to coach tennis, cross country running and skiing. While working with students, some would "Cut Up". He used these times and others to learn about what interested the student. He would get to know them better and try to find common interests to help bridge any gap and to create an overall positive school experience. During campaigns, Mr. Carlson would sometimes knock on the door of former students. This is when he discovered firsthand the impact he made on their lives as they would share memories during these short encounters.

Throughout his life, Mr. Carlson also found time to volunteer. He worked on the campaign to help elect Hubert Humphrey for President. He also spent time on his local YMCA Board. Later, his efforts were spent with PRISM, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit founded by people who were concerned about local hungry and homeless families. They provide healthy food, clothing, and housing stability. While he has not had as much time to pursue his hobbies like travel, or spending time with family (especially grandkids), after retirement from public service, he plans to make up for lost opportunities.

As Mr. Carlson reflected on his career and achievements, he said he had no regrets and feels blessed. During times of great conflict like the Civil Rights Era, Vietnam War and now the global pandemic and civil unrest, these events provide time for not only dialog but action for change to improve our societies and communities. Mr. Carlson and his wife plan to be a part of positive change well into the future.
