

Changes and More Changes

2024 was a busy year for Iowa Research Lodge No. 2, and it brought several noteworthy changes. We held three stated meetings and a special meeting. We adopted a new set of bylaws and elected officers twice. We have new officers, a new home, a new website, and two new forthcoming publications. The future of Masonic research in Iowa is bright!

New Meeting Schedule

Our old bylaws required that IRL2 hold meetings on the last Saturdays of March and September. The new bylaws have changed the meeting schedule starting in 2025. Meetings will now be held in the second quarter and the fourth quarter of each calendar year, with elections during the Fall meeting.

The precise dates, times, and locations of each meeting will be **emailed** to members and **posted** to the new website ahead of the event. This provides the lodge flexibility both with booking speakers and avoiding conflicts with other Masonic events. This flexibility will improve our events and help us increase attendance.

New Officers of IRL2

The new bylaws also included a change in the officer terms and a new schedule for elections. The old bylaws required annual officer elections at the Spring meeting. Under the new bylaws, beginning in 2024, officer terms are two years, and elections will be held at the Fall meeting of even-numbered years.

New Publication Plans

Later this year, we will make two new publications exclusively available as a benefit to members of IRL2. The lodge has an extensive back catalog of its publications, and we are working to make some of these available after being out of print for many years.

The first to look forward to is a reprint of "**How to Kick a Sacred Cow**," a classic written by a founding member of IRL2, Jerry Marsengill. The second forthcoming publication is "**Iowa Research Lodge No. 1**," a reprint of the history and transactions of the first Iowa research lodge. If you've ever wondered about "No. 1," you will enjoy this book. It contains the history, founding members, and research papers of the very first research lodge formed in Iowa.

For many years, IRL2 provided a printed book upon payment of the \$40 dues for membership. This model required large minimum print runs and substantial postage costs to ship books to individual members. This old bulk-order model is no longer feasible due to rapidly dwindling membership and rapidly increasing production and postage costs.

With the advent of high-quality on-demand publishing, it has become economically feasible to publish books digitally and print them one at a time. The unit costs are lower, and the publisher ships the bound product directly to the consumer.

That's why, moving forward, **instead of charging for meals and providing free books**, we intend to **provide free meals** (with speakers) and charge for books. Our goals are to offer a variety of affordable and unique publications, to seek to increase attendance at stated meetings, and to eliminate the need to store large amounts of inventory from print runs. If you don't want a publication, you needn't order it. If you want more than one copy, you may order as many as you want.

Mark A. Tabbert holds a master's degree in American history and has worked as a museum curator for over 25 years. In 2023, he retired as the Director of Museum Collections at the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association, Alexandria, VA. He is the author of six books, including American Freemasons: Three Centuries of Building Communities (NYU Press, 2005) and A Deserving Brother: George Washington and Freemasonry (UVA Press, 2022). He became a Freemason in 1998, is a Past Master of two Masonic Lodges, and currently


serves as Junior Warden of Des Moines Lodge No.1, Burlington, Iowa. He is a 33rd Degree in the Scottish Rite (NMJ) of Freemasonry, a member of the Society of Blue Friars, and Quatuor Coronati Lodge 2076. Mark is a past

president of the Masonic Library & Museum Association, a fellow, and a member of several American Masonic lodges of research and research societies.

About Tabbert's Book: "American Freemasons: Three Centuries of Building American Communities"

Volunteer associations of all varieties form the foundation of American history and culture. By far, the oldest and largest of all American volunteer associations is Freemasonry, but what exactly is

Freemasonry? Why have three centuries of American men from Paul Revere and Ben Franklin to Meriwether Lewis and William Clark, Harry Truman and Thurgood Marshall been
