#### Neighborhood Appearance Reminder

Members of the Architectural Control Committee (ACC) have begun the annual property inspections. One issue that has been noticed quite a bit is the storage of trash and recycling containers in front of homes, and at the top of driveways. Article VIII, Section 11 of the PCA Covenants states that "No material or refuse or any container for the same shall be placed or stored in the front of any house", and "All trash and garbage shall be placed in covered trash cans." Containers must not be stored at the front of the house. The PCA asks that containers not be stored in a very visible location, such as at the top edge of the driveway. Storage behind the house is preferred.

With inspections beginning, now would be a good time to remedy issues like this, and other appearance concerns such as overgrown shrubs and grass, mold/dirt on siding, damaged or leaning fences, cluttered car ports, etc.

If you receive a maintenance violation letter, it will clearly describe the problem, explain what is required to clear the violation, and it will provide a deadline. **Please contact the PCA if you need more time to complete the project.** The PCA's purpose is not to be critical or punitive, but simply to encourage residents to complete needed maintenance and to keep the community looking attractive and welcoming, which is a primary responsibility of an HOA.

### **CLUB VIEW PARK FAQS**

Can I rent Club View Park? The park pavilion can be used at no cost for activities such as family gatherings, but a reservation request must be filed with the PCA (see the Forms & Files Page). For group and team use of the playing field, a \$20 fee is charged for two hours of use.

What is the status of the tennis courts? An extensive renovation of the two tennis courts was completed in July 2019. The courts are available for use by PCA residents and their guests. Contact the PCA to obtain the gate code.

Can my team or group use the Club View Park playing field? Team or group use of the playing field requires a permit from the PCA, and payment of the \$20 usage fee.

# Montgomery Parks Needs Your Help with White-Tail Deer Fawn Project

Each spring, Montgomery Parks wildlife ecologists conduct a fawn tagging project to better understand the spatial dynamics of deer in Montgomery County.

Be part of science! If you find a fawn in your yard, or in the parks, leave it alone and call our staff at 301-962-1352. NOTE: Fawns must be laying still and not yet mobile. Wildlife Staff will respond as quickly as possible, and if appropriate, will come out to tag the animal and release it unharmed.

#### Dog Walking Safety and Courtesy

While walking your dog, please keep in mind the following, which not only represent courteous behavior but are required by County law:

- Dogs must be on a leash whenever they are off your property
- Dogs must not be allowed to approach other people or other dogs unless the person has agreed to the approach (avoiding "unwanted contact")
- Dog walkers may allow their dogs to "do their business" in the County right-of-way (the area between the street and sidewalk), or on a PCA common area, but the walker must immediately pick up remains. Please always carry plastic bags with you.
- All dogs and cats four months of age or older must have a current rabies vaccination and County license.

# THE FUN STUFF

### Classic Gazpacho Soup

This classic no-cook gazpacho is a mix of fresh vegetables and store-bought tomato based vegetable juice for a perfect blend of smooth and chunky vegetable flavors.

### **Ingredients**

- 3 stalks celery diced
- 1 seedless hot-house cucumber with skin on diced
- 1 zucchini diced
- 3/4 whole medium red onion diced
- 4 cups tomato juice such as V-8 (the equivalent of fresh, chopped tomatoes could also be used)
- 2 cloves garlic pressed or minced
- 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil or grapeseed oil

- 1/4 cup red wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 tablespoons hot sauce or to taste
- 1 tablespoon celery salt
- 1 tablespoon garlic salt
- 6 cocktail or campari tomatoes diced
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- Fresh chives for garnish

### **Directions**

- 1. In the bowl of a food processor or in a blender, combine half of the celery, cucumber, zucchini, red onion, 2 cups of the tomato juice with the pressed or minced garlic, olive oil, red wine vinegar, sugar, hot sauce, celery salt and garlic salt.
- 2. Pulse all of the ingredients until well blended. Add the rest of the tomato juice and pulse to mix. Add the celery, cucumber, zucchini and the diced tomatoes and pulse once or twice. Season with kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper and adjust the hot sauce to taste.
- 3. Chill the soup for at least 1 hour before serving.
- 4. Serve the soup with a drizzle of the sour cream that has been thinned with water. Top with fresh chopped chives.

## The Kid's Corner

### Homemade Wind Chimes

aka Experiments with sound

### **Supplies**

- cleaned out tin cans
- paint
- string
- hammer
- nail
- metal washers or nuts
- glitter (optional)
- tape (optional)

Always ask an adult before starting a project! Adult supervision is recommended

- 1. First, check over your cans for sharp edges.
- 2. Next, paint the outside of the tin cans.
- 3. If you are using glitter, this is the time to shake it onto the tin cans, while the paint is still wet.
- 4. Allow the paint to dry. Be patient.
- 5. Use the hammer and a nail to punch holes in the bottom of the tin cans (ask an adult to help with this)
- 6. Next, string a long piece of yarn through the holes and tie two washers onto the end of the string, inside the tin cans. One washer holds the yarn in place, the other is placed at the end of the string to make a lovely clanking sound when it hits the tin can. You could also use nuts or rocks instead of washers. Something that is hard enough to make a noise when it hits the can.
- 7. Once you've tied on your washers to the wind chimes, test out the noise it makes!


