Motorized Bicycles

The prevalence of motored bikes (distinct from motorcycles) has increased over the last 20 years. Here's a brief primer on their definition, varieties, and ownership responsibilities. Motorized bikes make use of a motor to power the vehicle. The motor is often gas or battery-powered, with electric battery-powered (ebikes) growing more popular. The motor serves to assist pedaling or power the bike independent of active pedaling.

Maryland law defines 3 classes of electric bikes (ebikes): Class 1 only assist active pedaling and stop assistance at 20 mph, Class 2 can be propelled by motor only with the same assistance cut-off, and Class 3 only assists active pedaling and stops assistance at a higher threshold, 28mph. The Maryland Department of Transportation states that *E-scooters and e-bikes must be operated on the road, permitted paths, and abide by all traffic laws and posted signages. These laws include, but are not limited to, stopping at stop signs, obeying traffic signals, riding in the direction of traffic, the prohibited wearing of headsets or earplugs in both ears, and yielding to other vehicles and pedestrians.*

Bikes may be used on PCA sidewalks and paths, but must give way to pedestrians. Motorized bikes may not be used on the grass at Club View Park because they damange the grass.

PCA Animal Prohibitions



PCA Covenants [Article VIII, Section 8]: Prohibit all animals, livestock, and poultry from our properties, except that "dogs, cats, and other household pets may be kept" as long as they are not being kept for commercial purposes (for example, they cannot be bred for sale).

Montgomery County Code [Chapter 5 – Animal Control]: Chickens and roosters cannot be kept in an aviary (structure that confines/houses the chickens) within 100 feet of an adjacent dwelling.

For most or all PCA properties, this means the property is not large enough to accommodate chickens.

Do you all know we have a beautiful and well-equipped neighborhood park on Club View Drive? Our park has a huge open field perfect for soccer, football, tag, you name it. Prefer court sports? Well, the basketball and tennis courts have been recently renovated! A shady playground and well-maintained pavilion round out the package to make for a great picnic or birthday party, all just around the corner!

Protect the turf

To avoid damage to the playing field turf, avoid using the playing field when it is wet and soggy. All motorized vehicles are prohibited from driving on the grass.

Club View Park FAQs

Can residents use Club View Park Pavilion for an event? YES! The use of the park pavilion for activities like family gatherings is included in the HOA dues you pay! In order to accommodate everyone and avoid unwanted issues, a reservation request must be filed with the PCA (form available online). All requests will be confirmed on a first-come, first-served basis.

Can my team or athletic group pay to use the Club View Park playing field? YES! Group and team use of the playing field requires a \$20 fee for a two-hour period of use. This fee helps pay for the upkeep and maintenance of our field and goals, so we can all continue to enjoy them.

Can residents use the tennis courts? YES! The courts are available to PCA residents and their guests. Just email the PCA for the gate code. To keep the courts in the best shape, we ask all residents to refrain from

skateboarding, rollerblading/skating, and other non-racket-type sports that can damage the court surfaces.

Non-residents who live nearby can also use the courts for a small annual fee.

Italian Pasta Salad

A simple nutritious recipe easily adaptable to your tastes.

Ingredients

- 1 pound fusilli or rotini pasta
- Extra-virgin olive oil, for drizzling
- 2 cups cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1½ cups mini fresh mozzarella cheese balls, 8 ounces
- 1 medium red bell pepper, stemmed, seeded, and diced
- ½ English cucumber, diced
- 1 cup thinly sliced red onion
- ¾ cup kalamata olives, pitted and halved
- ¾ cup sliced pepperoncini
- ½ cup chopped fresh parsley
- 1 recipe Italian Dressing
- 1¼ teaspoons sea salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 1 cup fresh basil leaves, plus more for garnish

Preparation

- 1. Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Prepare the pasta according to the package instructions, cooking until slightly past al dente. Drain and toss with a drizzle of olive oil to prevent sticking. Set aside to cool to room temperature.
- 2. Transfer the cooled pasta to a large bowl and add the cherry tomatoes, mozzarella, red pepper, cucumber, red onion, olives, pepperoncini, and parsley. Toss to combine, then add the dressing, salt, and several grinds of pepper and toss again.
- 3. Stir in the basil and season to taste. Garnish with more basil and serve.

Bird Nest Build Challenge



Background

Different birds build different types of nests that must be strong and waterproof. Building a nest requires physical and engineering skill. Birds build using materials available in their environment, including borrowing materials from their human neighbors!

Supplies

- Natural materials: small twigs, dry grass, dried moss
- Optional: string, yarn, thread, fabric scraps, paper, cotton balls
- Shallow bowl or plate to use as a guide

<u>Steps</u>

- 1. Look-up types of bird nests.
- 2. Take a walk in the woods or along a nature trail to collect building material.
- 3. Gather building materials and your guide (bowl or plate) in a workspace.
- 4. Build the nest using only your thumb and index finger.
- 5. Compare your nest to pictures of real nests.

Tips

- Start with the stronget materials.
- Weave the materials together.
- Slightly moisten the materials if they're too dry to stay together.
- Use the softest materials on the inside.
