

As the majority of our members receive the newsletter via email, a reduced quantity of newsletters will be printed.

Training on Tuesday nights has commenced for 2 new members.

Tom Hill: Tom not available on Maxi Day, Keith Jones to fill in for Tom. An updated membership list is required at the front desk.

General Business: Phil has a checklist for new members for training on machinery safety and operations, will pass on to Simon Hardman. Problems with our colour printer, Phil and Steve to investigate repairs or replacement.

Water usage – Traditionally, our water bill is around \$10 per quarter with usage up to 5 Klitres per quarter. Latest bill was \$1781.46 for 71 days with a usage over 530,000 Klitres. This is obviously incorrect, Council has been informed and sent a plumber to inspect the Cubby House with nothing untoward found. Phil Dean to follow up with Council & Water Board. There was a leak at the meter in October which was promptly repaired by the Water Board, but could not have impacted our usage as claimed. Council has repaired kitchen sink drain as arranged by Tom Hill.

Signage – Large sign installed at front boundary of our premises onto existing pipe frame, additional sign affixed to side of building. Simon and helpers worked hard to have this up for the AGM. Temporary bracing to be replaced with steel pipe, Keith Jones to organise in new year.

Bunnings market stall: Thursday evening 9th December, raised \$253 from toy sales, no publicity by Bunnings, rain affected event.



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NEW CUBBY HOUSE SIGNAGE



WOODTURNING TIPS & TECHNIQUES by Carol Rix

For this month's book review, I decided to look at a book which may be of help to those starting out in woodturning and looking for suggestions and answers to the many questions that arise when learning.

The author, living in Queensland, has been turning professionally for many years and decided to write this book, despite being advised against it by local publishers, after her son embarked on a new career in internet marketing. Her son posted up a one-page site asking people for their questions from which she received over 80 responses ranging from sharpening, tool control, finishes, and acquiring & drying wood, the questions of which has helped her in forming the context of this book.

In her introduction, Carol explains, 'the earliest chapters in the book are written for those people who are getting started and need to know about the machinery, the tools to buy, and how to set up a workshop. Chapters 5 to 10 cover techniques for sharpening and using the tools; collecting, seasoning, and sorting the wood; and using the finishes. The later chapters are written for those people who have been turning for a while and wish to take it further.' I feel it is a book that a new woodturner could grow with, starting with the basics and evolving through advanced techniques which incorporate her own innovative approach which should appeal to our lady turners.

Following from the above introduction I extracted from her book, Carol covers an extremely wide range of topics from setting up, to basic tools, to advanced work. All along are beautiful pieces to inspire and a gallery of ideas under 'planning and designing a piece.' There are also practice projects for end grain and face grain work, with detailed action shots so you can view the sequence of cuts in the author's procedures. She outlines the uses of each tool, with cautions and tips to avoid trouble. She discusses grain direction and lathe speeds, reverse chucking, jam chucking, sanding and finishing. She has a chapter on sharpening and one on using shop-built jigs. There is a nice glossary of terms with thumbnail photos to illustrate different items.

She also shows examples of decorated surfaces, carving, piercing and burning. One chapter goes 'beyond the circle' with nested work, off-centre turning, natural edged work and cut shapes.


Carol shows her own work and draws from the work of others such as Neil Scobie, Andrew Potocnik, John Hanrahan, etc. to create a book rich with ideas, tips, and a lifetime of woodturning knowledge.


I would thoroughly recommend this book to have in your library. It can be found on our library shelves as **Book No. 12.01.03.**



A CHRISTMAS ORNAMENT WITH A TWIST


- 1. Prepare 4 segments per ornament (approx. 7/8" x 7/8" x 7 1/4") suitable for glue joints. Segments must be square and flat. Arrange for best match and mark ends.
- 2. Rotate each segment 180° about long axis (inside-out). Assemble with double sided tape; bind both ends tightly with strapping tape. Mark ends of cavity.
- 3. Turn between centres to match cavity template. Sand turned surface and apply finish. Note: Cavity template must be used in the plane of a diagonal section of the ornament blank.
- 4. Disassemble inside-out blank. Reassemble in Original configuration. Glue segments to form square blank with elongated cavity.
- 5. Remount in lathe and turn tenon at end of ornament blank to suit chuck. Be sure tenon is centred accurately. Suggested method: Grip lower end with 4-jaw chuck, support upper end with live centre (point removed) in tailstock. Adjust centring at upper (tailstock) end.










- 6. Reverse ornament blank in lathe, grip tenon in 4-jaw chuck, support the lower end with the live centre (point removed). Adjust for accurate centring at the tailstock end.
- 7. Turn the lower end round and reduce the diameter to approximately 1/2" in steps, keeping track of the lower end of the cavity and main- training support with the live centre.
- 8. Move tailstock away. Turn bottom finial in steps, and partially turn lower end of body. Maintain sufficient cross-section to support turning forces. Sand and finish finial progressively.
- 9. Turn bottom portion of body and develop body to finial transition.
- 10. Form upper portion of ornament leaving approx. 1/2" tenon connection to chuck. Sand and finish body.
- 11. Complete top end of ornament and cut off. Finish cut off spot by hand. Drill 1/16" diameter hole at top centre for hanger attachment.
