






Keith Jones Best Displayed Turned Item




John Moss Best Displayed Joinery Item










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

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Food Safe Wood Finishing Part 1

Thanks to Ken McEwen

I have noticed from looking at the items on our show and tell that because many of the items we make will come in contact with food and we are more aware that there are certain dangers such as anaphylactic shock caused by something as basic as the tiniest piece of peanut or peanut oil.

I thought it was time to look at wood finishes from the safety angle and at the same time get the best possible finish on our wooden objects.

What should we look for in the materials we use?

It should be nontoxic and give a durable finish to an acceptable standard.

First a comment on using what seems to be common sense that is the use of cooking oils on cutting boards of bowls etc.

I tried this many years ago and realized that it was not a great idea for the following reasons.

- They are often the thing to which some may have an allergic response.
- As they are edible, they are growth media for funguses and bacteria
- Unless regularly cleaned will stain and spoil the object.

It would be better to leave the wood bare that use food oils and other products.

So, what can we use?

I have looked at a range of substances and have a short list.

Tung Oil – Carnauba wax – Bee's wax – Orange/Citrus oil -shellac – linseed oil

All of these in their pure form are rated safe and nontoxic.

There are many commercial products using these materials in combination and with various solvents.

Tung Oil.

Made from the seeds of the Tung tree originated in China, used as a finish for hundreds of years. It is nontoxic but is not edible.

What does that mean

a) it won't poison you but it's not good to use it as a food it cannot be digested and would pass through. Best not to drink it but ok to use it as a finish coating an if properly applied gives a durable hard semi-gloss finish.

Carnauba wax

Also called Brazil wax obtained from the leaves of the Carnauba palm. The hardest of waxes, melting point 82° C.

Carnauba wax is nontoxic and used in many different common products.

Used to give sugar coated sweets (such as the ubiquitous Jaffa) to give them a gloss. In dental floss, cosmetics and a variety of polishes such as shoe polish and surf board polish etc. It is very hard and produces a high gloss.

It is not digested by the human body and passes out.

Every one of us has probably eaten tons of the stuff in our lifetime.

Bee's wax

Produced by bees from honey by special glands it is estimated that the ratio is about 6 to 1 that is it takes 6 pounds of honey to make a pound of wax.

It is used by bees to create the comb for storage of honey and as an incubator for new bees. Nontoxic hardens with age (not as hard as Carnauba wax and a lower melting point 62 °)

Citrus/ Orange oil

As the name implies an oil derived from the rind of oranges (or other citrus) a by-product of juice production. Its uses include insect pest control, including ants and termites, furniture polish.

Warning care should be taking when handling as it dissolves skin oils and can cause dermatitis.

Smells nice and is anti-bacterial good for treating food surfaces such as cutting boards etc.

There are a variety of commercial products that use these basic components. Most of the commercial finishing oils use Tung oil as the major ingredient.

In part 2 we will have a closer look at tung oil how it works and how to use it. Ken McEwen
