Brief History Formation of Guild

The Guild started as an idea of several teachers, students and past students of the Woodturning Trade Course at the Sydney Technical College, Ultimo, Sydney. The founding meeting of the Guild was held at the home of George Hatfield on the 4 July 1983, with the first formal meeting being held at the Woodturning Section of the Sydney Technical College on the 8 August 1983.

During the meeting on the 4 July 1983, the title of "Woodturners Guild of NSW" was adopted and used until 31 January 1989, when, after incorporation, it was changed to "The Sydney Woodturners Guild Inc."

Birth of Southern Region

The "South Side Regional Group" had its first meeting at Frank Bollins home on the 2 February 1986, nine members and their wives attended a barbecue lunch. The 9 members in attendance were; Frank Bollins, Bruce Leadbeatter, Jack Hungerford, Les Noble, Mannie Burnham, George Evans, Joe de Fina, Clarrie Snell and George Luster.

Meetings continued at member's homes from February 1986 through till after renovations had been completed at the former Oyster Bay Scout Hall and after the Official Opening of Southern Region, on the 17 February 1996.

As membership increased so did the attendances at members homes increasing to regular attendances of 55 and up to 66, it became necessary to find a hall that would comfortably provide for the growing membership as well as security for tools and machinery as they became available.

Due to our group's community involvement with the Sutherland Shire Council's, Cronulla Fiesta held at Gunnamatta Park, Cronulla during 1993, 1994 and 1995, The Council became aware of our plight to find a convenient meeting place.

Disused Scout Hall

Tim Fong of Sutherland Shire Council suggested the idea of our group using the disused Scout Hall at Oyster Bay and made the necessary arrangements for members to view the hall.

Verbal negotiations between Guild members and Sutherland Shire Council commenced in August 1995 with recorded documentation from the Sydney Woodturning Guild Inc. to Council dated 29 August 1995, signed by then President Frank Bollins.

Correspondence continued between both parties until Council approved tenure occupancy on the 15 November 1995 with specific conditions, one in particular being that the "Management Committee of the Sydney Woodturners Guild Inc., be appointed as a community management committee of Council" and follow Council regulations and conditions.

The nominated Management Committee comprised Guild Members, Alan Bourne, Bert Ponder and Clive Cairns, later known as the "ABC Committee", the "ABC" being the first letter of the Christian name of each committee member.

Extensive renovations were carried out by a very active and enthusiastic group of members. Alan Bourne (deceased) recorded that over 40 volunteers contributed in excess of 2,000 hours of labour, with 95% of this labour performed by members over 60 years of age. The work required licenced tradesmen, electrical, plumbing, builders and carpenters some of which still active in their trade with other talented assistants completed the work for a financial outlay of less than \$1,400, using finances made available on loan from members of our Region



First Open Day at Southern Region

Southern Region's doors were opened to the public on Saturday 10 February 1996, with a "Meet the Neighbours Day" and invited the surrounding neighbourhood to the open day to show them the newly completed woodturning workshop and enlighten them on Guild activities. Attendance for the day was 140 visitors and 35 members.

A Little on the Birth of The Cubby House (cont.)

Official Opening at Southern Region

The Official Opening Day at the new clubhouse was a Maxi-Day on the 17 February 1996, with Convenor Les Noble, welcoming all members and visitors, a total number of 150 people signed the attendance book on this special day. Bert Ponder was Host for the day.

By the end of the day, Southern Region had signed up 9 new members of whom 2 are still active members, Alan Shoebridge and Alan Pentecost.



The Name "Cubby House"

The name came out of a conversation between two of the ABC Committee wives, the 'two P's', Pauline Bourne and Pam Cairns, who suggested their husbands during the hall restoration, that they have bunks down at the hall. The word Cubby House was mentioned and stayed. After which other members then told their wives they were going down to Cubby House. It must be a good name and proof of that is evident, as the name is known throughout Australia and some countries overseas.

Formation of Cubby House Newsletter

The first official newsletter for Southern Region, titled Cubby House News, was published and distributed at the November 1996 Maxi-Day, The editor, 3. Bruce Leadbeatter production manager, distributor of this masterpiece was Alan Pentecost and comprised of 2, A4 size pages.

A Little on the Birth of The Cubby House (cont.)

Incorporation, 13 November 2006

Southern Region had its First Workshop Meeting on Monday 13 November 2006, as an incorporated body. The Club's name changed from the Southern Region of the Sydney Woodturners Guild Inc., to Southern Region Woodturners Inc., an affiliated association of the Sydney Woodturners Guild Inc.

The former position of Convenor was replaced with the new position of President. The incorporation procedure occurred during Ken McEwen's leadership.

Community Involvement

Craft Shows

During the years 1998, 1999, 2000 and 2001 our Craft Shows were specifically targeted as fundraising shows to provide financial assistance to deserving local community services. The shows were held on the last weekend in October, commencing with official opening on the Friday night followed by Saturday and Sunday day activities, demonstrations and sales.

Craft Show: Year 1998

The "Charity Wood and Craft Show", raised \$6,600 that purchased 3 Nitrous Oxide Machines for the local Sutherland Hospital Children's New Emergency Ward.

Craft Show: Year 1999

Our charity "Wood and Craft Show" raised \$9,100 to assist the Sutherland Shires' NSW Rural Fire Service, purchase vital equipment for use when attending fires and other emergency calls.

Craft Show: Year 2000

The "Charity Begins at Home Art and Craft Show" raised \$15,100 to assist the Sutherland Shires' NSW State Emergency Services, purchase necessary equipment for use during their emergency work.

Craft Show: Year 2001

Our "Charity Begins at Home Wood, Art and Craft Show" raised \$20,500 for the Sutherland Shire's Assistance dogs for Independence, who train dogs to help young children and adults with disabilities, achieve an enhanced quality of life.

Government Recognition

State Government Presentation

During March 1999, Lorna Stone, State Member for Sutherland presented a "Certificate of Appreciation" to the Sydney Woodturners Guild Inc, in recognition of our outstanding contribution to the people of the Sutherland Electorate.

NSW Premier Presents Awards, 24 May 2000

In recognition and appreciation for outstanding services to the community, the Member for Miranda, Barry Collier nominated Southern Region for a Government "Community Service Award" in the Legislative Assembly on 6 April 2000.

Toymaking

Salvation Army Christmas Toy Appeal

Years before Southern Region was established the Sydney Woodturners Guild. had been making wooden toys for this Appeal.

During 2006 the Southern Region Woodturners and the Shire Woodworking Club Inc., (formerly Triton Owners Club) combined their efforts and set aside 1 day per month to manufacture a wide variety of wooden toys for both girls and boys.

The toys are distributed to the needy children throughout NSW in time for Christmas.

The Children's Hospital, Randwick

During the past 5 years, 2006 - 2010 the toy demand for the long stay children at the Hospital has dramatically increased. It was necessary during 2007 for our Toymaking group to introduce an additional 1 day per month to cope with the ongoing demand. The wooden toys for both boys and girls are usually delivered to the Hospital 3 to 4 times throughout each year.

Leo & Jenny Leukaemia & Cancer Research Foundation, now known as Cancer Research Foundation

For many years, our members produced turned items and donated them to the Foundation for fundraising purposes at their Annual Dinners. Don Dickson was our delivery boy and regularly attended these annual functions.

Boys Town Festival

For many years, our members produced and donated items together with assisting at their fundraising fetes. Our delivery boy and assistant for this function was Phil Newell who regularly attended these annual events.
