Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, 'Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, "To an unknown god." What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth. does not live in shrines made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For "In him we live and move and have our being"; as even some of your own poets have said, "For we too are his offspring."

Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead.'

Now who will harm you if you are eager to do what is good? But even if you do suffer for doing what is right, you are blessed. Do not fear what they fear, and do not be intimidated, but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defence to anyone who demands from you an account of the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and reverence. Keep your conscience clear, so that, when



you are maligned, those who abuse you for your good conduct in Christ may be put to shame. For it is better to suffer for doing good, if suffering should be God's will, than to suffer for doing evil. For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight people, were saved through water. And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you—not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

Message From Derek

With apologies, I have reverted to my tediously familiar, "Hello from the Vicarage Study" ... perhaps next week the muse will flutter this way and perch on my shoulder awhile!

You may recall that, Last week, there was this real feeling in the air of, "This isn't how it was meant to be." This week our readings, particularly the report of Paul's verbal dust-up with the Athenians, suggest an overturning of things... especially of the cosy ways of the past. They suggest a need to revisit much that is important in our lives... things to do with the way that we live our lives. Once again, I find this to be a strand running in complete parallel with our current situation.

We have, just this week, seen a slight relaxation in this country in the approach to 'lockdown'... and, no, I am still no more comfortable now with that description than I was back in March... hey ho. But, as we contemplate the beginnings of just a little more personal freedom, in the face of a virus that could easily still get out of hand, we too are beginning to be directed to consider just how might those things in our lives that we have for so long taken for granted need to change.

I would suggest that this very same thinking ought to be applied to our approach to faith and religious life... to examine the balance of our faith life... to grow our faith and not just to be content with things as they have always been. With the need to reach people by electronic means, things have already begun to change, and those things that have changed should not, after this is all over, revert to the way that they used to be.

For those already possessing a faith there has had to be a greater reliance on doing the work of theological reflection for oneself—this is a good thing!

For those who are 'searching' there is now such an abundance of worship and teaching—with great variety—available online!

I think that there is also a growing sense of just what we can actually achieve... when we have to. As an example of this I would say that seven weeks ago, I had no idea that I would have to become a competent editor of video and video post-production.

Now is the time, I believe, to embrace the opportunities being presented to us as a by-product of the strategies necessary to fight the spread of this awful virus. To trot out the old saying, "Every cloud has a silver lining" seems extraordinarily crass in the light of the death and suffering that this pandemic is causing. Nevertheless, there are positives coming out of the situation in which we find ourselves. I don't have space here to go into this.
