And, if you'll forgive me, I'm going to stop there as I realise that I am in danger here of going off on all sorts of unhelpful tangents.

Once more... Good Morning from the Vicar's study. Well, the Easter Season is drawing to a close... yesterday was The Feast of the Ascension, and this coming Sunday will be Easter 7. And what about those poor first disciples eh! What they have been through in the recent weeks! Imagine the crazy, wild emotion and mood swings that they must have had to weather! There were the horrors of Good Friday-the anguish that they would have felt for Jesus, and undoubtedly the fear that they would have felt for themselves; not to mention the certain guilt that they would have felt about their individual responses to what had happened and the certain confusion that they would be feeling about the future—about their future—now that Jesus' mission had, to all apparent extents and purposes, failed.

Just as they are trying to process all of that... there are the beginnings of rumours that Jesus was, in fact, alive—imagine, if you can, all the hope and terror and sheer perplexity of that possibility.

And then, a word that everybody is reaching out for right now: normality! They would have thought that normality had returned; they probably anticipated a better normality, in fact; a much more wonderful normality with Jesus back among... talking, teaching, making them feel at the centre of God's world... just as he always did.

Then... having digested this great news and decided how grand everything was going to be from hereon in... they get the news that Jesus will be leaving them, and will not be returning anytime soon. And, moreover, he expects them (the disciples) to carry on without him!

I suspect that many, many people have, during the past seven weeks, gone through (and are still going through) a similar rollercoaster ride of emotions during this time of lockdown. I continually hear the phrase, "I can't wait for things to return to normal." I, then, usually hear someone else chime in with, "Yeah... whatever normal is going to look like!"

As I have been saying throughout the recent weeks... there is an uncanny sense of similarity between what the first disciples were going through and what we are all going through at present. And I imagine, at this point, you're saying to yourselves, "Yes... go on... and..." That's the thing!
