sandals (Matthew 3 v 11). That would normally be regarded as a very menial task but for John, performing that for Jesus, was far too exalted for him. Such was the chasm between John and Jesus. And such is the chasm between each one of us and the Lord Jesus. John had already prophesied that the Lord Jesus had come to bridge that chasm. But he lived this side of the cross and in that sense each one of us if we are trusting Christ has greater privileges than he did. Even when we are at our lowest ebb let's not give up pointing to Jesus. John didn't. He could so easily have just shared his doubts with his closest friends and undermined their faith as well. Instead, he encourages them to take his doubts (and very likely theirs as well) to the Lord Jesus. Let us do the same. There is much that is puzzling and much that we don't understand. Someone once asked Mrs Einstein if she understood her husband's theories and she replied something like, "I don't understand Mr Einstein's theories, but I understand Mr Einstein"! We don't know all the answers, but we can know the One who does in Jesus Christ. Because as we finish, we shouldn't miss those last few words in verse 15, "He who has ears let him hear". That my friends means you and me. Let's keep therefore looking to Him, turning to Him, listening to Him and pointing to Him and, as we do, may we know that we are there by pleasing Him. With our love and prayers to you all Dave and Mary May I run the race before me, strong and brave to face the foe, looking only unto Jesus

Reflection by Dave Cowan

Don't give up! (Matthew 10 v 40- 11 v 15) Which of us can say that there haven't been times when we have been downhearted in the last few months and inclined to give up? So, what better than a reminder that we need to keep going and never give up!

Don't give up looking to Jesus (10 v 40-42) Always look to Jesus and come close to Him so that we can receive more from Him, often through what other people give us and particularly through His Word. It is fundamental that in looking to Jesus we treat one another, in Christ, as very precious and valuable. No matter how "little" someone is in the world's eyes, that person is infinitely precious and valuable to the Lord as you and I are. Remember too that He notices every single thing we do to be a blessing for somebody who follows Him and even the standard courtesy of a cup of cold water, given to somebody who belongs to Him, does not go unnoticed or unrewarded. So even the little acts of "unremembered kindness" are always remembered by Him!

Don't give up turning to Him (11 v 2-3) As Jesus Himself says, John the Baptist was truly the greatest man ever before Jesus came, and yet even he had doubts as he languished in prison for his faithfulness to the Lord. It would have been very easy for John to turn his back on Christ and blame Him for his suffering or get his "own disciples" to do the same, just as you and I can be tempted to blame the Lord when things seem to have gone wrong in our lives. Never forget that at this precise low point John turns to nobody else but Jesus, even with all his doubts: "Just as I am though tossed about with many a conflict, many a doubt, fightings within and fears without, O Lamb of God I come." What a great example for us to do the same even, indeed especially, when we doubt Him. Remember the words of Peter, when people were deserting our Lord in droves and the Lord asked His immediate disciples why they didn't desert as well and He said, "Lord to whom else can we turn? You have the words of eternal life." (John 6 v 68).

Don't give up listening to Him (11 v 4-6) Jesus has a very special message for John as He quotes largely from Isaiah 35 v 3-4 and Isaiah 61 v 1-2. He points John to the overwhelming evidence that He is indeed the One doing precisely the kind of things that were prophesied by Isaiah and yet there was a problem. The problem for John was that those passages in Isaiah also refer to the Messiah judging in vengeance those who defied Him. John too had promised that Jesus would accomplish this and yet so far that part hadn't happened. Significantly when the Lord Jesus quotes the words from Isaiah to John He omits the words of vengeance. What He seems to be telling John is that the time of judgement will come but that is in the future. In the meantime, he (like you and I) must trust in Jesus as we await the completion of His conquest when He returns. (Matthew 11 v 6)

Don't stop pointing to Jesus (11 v 7-15) Notice the accolade that our Lord gives to John. Throughout his ministry John always pointed others away from himself to Jesus. He said he wasn't worthy to untie or carry His
