When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Sunday 31st May Pentecost

From Derek

Well, somewhat unusually I am opening with 'Good evening' from the Vicar's Study. And I want to begin by asking you whether or not you have ever stood outside and watched the International Space Station (ISS) fly overhead? If not... you should!

I am writing this now (i.e. this evening) because I have just come in from watching it passing overhead. It is a source of great amusement to my children that I often make such a big thing of this occurrence.

It first came into sight this evening in the West at 2207hrs... at which point it was some 920 miles away from Dorking. It passed (almost) directly overhead 3 minutes later... at which point it was more or less 265 miles above our heads and travelling at some 17000mph. It finally disappeared from view at 2215hrs (5 minutes later). At this point... it was approximately 1287 miles away from Dorking; it was, as closely as I can estimate, somewhere over Brno in the Czech Republic as it finally disappeared from view here in Dorking. That's worth stopping and thinking about for a moment or two: a manmade object, orbiting some 265 miles above the earth was still visible from Dorking as it passed over Brno in the Czech Republic!

OK... so... by now you are probably wondering what on earth this has got to do with anything? Well, it's this. Although this particular thing (the ISS) may be manmade it is (in my humble opinion) still a miracle... and I marvel at it... in much the same way that I marvel at the sight of a Boeing 747 making the transition from ground to air during its take-off roll... every time! Sorry if you think that's weird. But I think that it is so important to be able to appreciate the everyday miracles that surround us continuously. If we drift through our lives failing to marvel at what is miraculous around us, how can we be adequately prepared to appreciate those moments that some would more readily label 'miracles'?

The Feast of Pentecost marks, what is for me, one of the great faith miracles: the Holy Spirit descending, very tangibly, upon the disciples ten days after Jesus' ascension. To those of you reading this who do not have a faith, what does this mean to you? What do you think might have been happening here? To those of you with a fledgling faith, how does it sound? Scary? Awesome? Confusing? And to those of you who have been going to church all of your lives, what emotions does this stir up in you? Does it stir up any emotions in you?! Or has Pentecost become, perhaps, just another date on the Church's calendar? Whichever of these (maybe none of these) might apply to you, I would commend to you Jenny Firth's sermon to us in this coming Sunday's Eucharist service from St Martin's.
