Here's the thing: sheep will always be at risk. And, yes, a closed gate will keep the sheep safe; but it will also stop the sheep from gaining access to the lifegiving pastures, and they will then starve! The open gate is the means by which the good shepherd may enter and lead the sheep. So, then, what is our gateway? Could it be, perhaps, the wood of the cross?

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

New Testament Reading 1 Peter 2:19-25

NT Pg: 250

For it is to your credit if, being aware of God, you endure pain while suffering unjustly. If you endure when you are beaten for doing wrong, where is the credit in that? But if you endure when you do right and suffer for it, you have God's approval. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps.

'He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth.'

When he was abused, he did not return abuse; when he suffered, he did not threaten; but he entrusted himself to the one who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed. For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.



Gospel Reading John 10:1-10

NT Pg: 110-111

Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers.' Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them. So again Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.

Message From Derek

Hello, once more, from the vicarage Study. As I typed that I thought to myself: "I really must come up with a new opening sentence next week!"

Last week I commented on how the readings set inevitably drew one to the topic of journeying. And I want to follow on from that and think a little about one of the more important things needed when undertaking... some means of knowing how to find the place that you wish to get to.

If you are a fell-walker, that would be something along the lines of a map and a compass. If you are a holiday-maker and exploring new destinations, that might be a knowledgeable tour guide. If, however, you are a sheep and you need to get to good pasture... good pasture that is also safe pasture... then you are probably going to need the services of a good and reliable shepherd; a neat segue into this week's readings, don't you think?

Most of this week's readings, and particularly the gospel reading from John, speak in terms of sheep and shepherding:

1Peter2:25 has this... "For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls." John 10:1-10 is a parable told using sheep as shepherds as the primary devices for teaching wisdom.

Now, in each of the examples that I mentioned at the outset it isn't actually enough just to have the map, for example; it needs to be the correct map. It isn't sufficient to have a compass; you need to know that it is a correctly calibrated and true compass. And if you're the holiday-maker in my example and exploring new places, I think you'll find that it's not really enough to simply latch onto somebody that you have spotted wandering around holding a rolled-up brolly aloft and shouting, "This way, come along, follow me..."and with a gaggle of people wandering aimlessly along behind. I suppose, if you were really adventurous (another word might be foolhardy) you could give it a go... see where you end up... it could be interesting... but it would not be my advice; nor is it Jesus' advice in the parable that he relates!

I love the fact that, in this reading, we learn that the people that Jesus is speaking to don't actually get it first time round. They are focussing, as I have done above, on the shepherd... rather than focussing on the gate! Now that's easily done... especially as, if you look at the lectionary for Easter 4, the psalm set is the 23rd psalm... you may recognise it: "The Lord is my *shepherd*, therefore can I lack nothing...". No mention of a gate there! You could be forgiven for thinking, then, that the point of the parable *must* be the shepherd, rather than the gate. But... is it?
